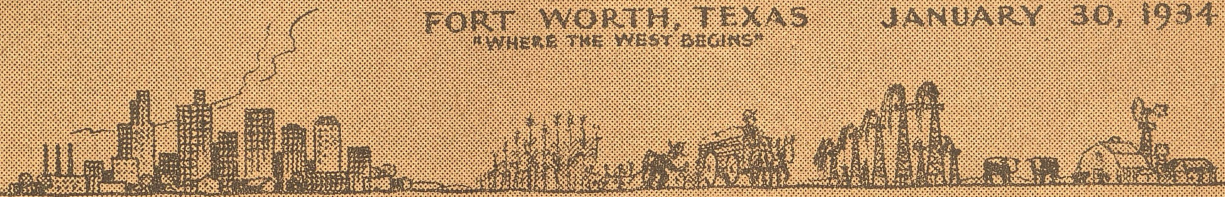

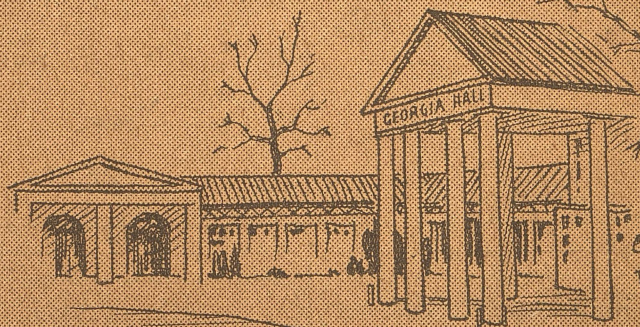

A check for \$25,000, Fort Worth's contribution to the Warm Springs Foundation for Infantile Paralysis, was mailed Monday to President Roosevelt. It represents the entire gross proceeds of the 26 dances held in Fort Worth the night of Jan. 30, the fifty-second birthday anniversary of the President, under the auspices of the committee formed to co-operate with the national movement to honor the President by raising an endowment for the Warm Springs institution.

Fort Worth's contribution represents approximately one-fortieth of the national fund reported. Not one cent of expense was incurred. The Woman's Club, country clubs, hotels and night clubs donated their halls for the dances. The musicians furnished the orchestras and the job printers the tickets. The ticket sellers, clerical workers and organization directors, of course, gave their services. Amon G. Carter was general chairman; J. J. Hurley, vice chairman; Walter B. Scott, finance chairman, and Harry Connelly, secretary of the general committee.
