

# PRESIDENT'S TRIP DETAILS ANNOUNCED

Major Addresses Scheduled  
for Ohio, Kentucky and  
Oklahoma on West Tour.

Chief Executive Will Review  
United States Fleet at  
San Francisco July 14.

HYDE PARK, N. Y., July 1 (AP).—  
President Roosevelt announced de-  
tails today for his coming Western  
trip, including scheduled major ad-  
dresses in Ohio, Kentucky and Ok-  
lahoma.

Leaving Washington July 7, the  
President will speak July 8 at the  
Northwest Territory Celebration at  
Marietta, Ohio, and at Latonia Race  
Track in Covington, Ky. On July 9  
he will make an address at the fair  
grounds in Oklahoma City.

He also will make off-the-train  
appearances at Amarillo, Texas;  
San Francisco, Los Angeles and  
San Diego, Cal., and probably will  
speak at all four.

Roosevelt will review the United  
States fleet at San Francisco on  
July 14.

Speeches already scheduled from  
the rear platform on his train in-  
clude Louisville and Bowling Green,  
Ky., July 8, and Pueblo, Colo., July  
12. A number of other platform  
appearances probably will be made,  
since the President's prearranged  
schedules for trips rarely include all  
stops he actually makes.

#### Claim President's Support.

Roosevelt's plans will take him  
into four States where Democratic  
Senators, claiming his support, are  
seeking re-election. The Marietta  
address will take him into the ter-  
ritory where Senator Robert J.  
Bulkley is campaigning for another  
term.

The three Kentucky speeches will  
place him in the middle of the hot  
fight in which Alben W. Barkley,  
Democratic leader of the Senate, is  
opposed for renomination by Gover-  
nor A. B. (Happy) Chandler.

Arrangements for his Oklahoma  
City speech were made by Senator  
Elmer Thomas, who is opposed for  
renomination by Governor E. W.  
Marland and Representative Gomer  
Smith.

Senator William G. McAdoo was  
active in urging the Chief Executive  
to stop for speeches in California,  
near the end of his train trip, which  
ends July 16 at San Diego. At that  
port he will board the cruiser Hous-  
ton for two weeks of cruising and  
fishing in the Pacific.

#### Talks at Pueblo.

The President's Pueblo, Colo., ap-  
pearance will be in the home State  
of Senator Alva B. Adams, who has  
opposed some of the Administra-  
tion's policies. There has been talk  
that Roosevelt would speak in Geor-  
gia and South Carolina when he re-  
turns from the cruise. In Georgia,  
Senator Walter F. George, an active

# PRESIDENT TRIP DETAILS GIVEN

opponent of many Administration moves, is up for renomination.

South Carolina's Senator E. D. Smith, a frequent Administration foe, also is up for a new six-year turn.

Roosevelt probably will land from his cruise some place close to the Georgia-South Carolina coast and plans a brief stop at his Warm Springs, Ga., cottage.

The cruise will take him to the Galapagos and Coco Solos Islands, crossing the equator for a short distance. Returning, the Houston will go through the Panama Canal to some Gulf of Mexico or Atlantic port.

### Text of Announcement.

The text of the tentative White House announcement concerning the trip follows:

(All times given are local times.)

The President will leave Washington for the West Coast at 10:30 p. m. Thursday, July 7.

The special train will arrive at Marietta, Ohio, on Friday, July 8, at 9 a. m., where the President will participate in the celebration of the one hundred fiftieth anniversary of the founding of the first settlement in the Northwest Territory.

Leaving Marietta at 10:30 a. m. July 8, the next scheduled stop will be Covington, Ky., at 2:20 p. m. where the President will leave the train and speak at the Latonia race track.

The special train will leave Covington at 3:20 p. m., arriving at Louisville, Ky., at 6:20 p. m. for a brief appearance.

The next stop will be Bowling Green, Ky., at 8:50 p. m. for a platform appearance and from there the train will proceed by way of Memphis (passing through about 3:15 a. m., C. S. T.) to Oklahoma City, arriving there at 5 p. m. Saturday, July 9. No prearranged stops are scheduled en route.

At Oklahoma City, the President will leave the train and proceed by motor to the Fair Grounds where he will speak.

### Due in Fort Worth 11 P. M.

Leaving Oklahoma City at 6 p. m. the President is scheduled to arrive at Fort Worth at 11 p. m. Immediately on arrival he will motor directly to the home of his son, Elliott Roosevelt.

The President and party will spend Sunday, July 10, in Fort Worth, leaving Monday morning July 11 at 10 a. m., and arriving at Amarillo at 6:45 p. m., detrain- ing there for a motor trip through the city.

Leaving Amarillo at 8:30 p. m., the train is to arrive at Pueblo, Colo., at 9 a. m. Tuesday, July 12, where a brief stop will be made and the President will make a platform appearance.

Leaving Pueblo at 9:30 a. m., the train will proceed by way of Salt Lake City, which will be reached during the early morning hours, to Crockett, Cal., arriving 9 a. m., Thursday, July 14. Here the party will detrain and motor around San Pablo Bay, making a brief stop at Mare Island Navy Yard, thence to Sausalito and across the Golden Gate Bridge to San Francisco. The President will motor through the city to the exposition grounds at Treasure Island.

### Boards Ship at Oakland.

About midafternoon the President will leave the exposition grounds for the Oakland dock, where he will board the U. S. S. Houston and proceed to a rendezvous in San Francisco Bay to review the fleet.

The President will come ashore and board his special train in Oakland around 11 p. m., proceeding thence to El Portal, the entrance to Yosemite Park, where he is due to arrive about 9 a. m. The party will leave the train and spend the day in the park, returning to the train and making an overnight run to Los Angeles.

At Los Angeles, the President will detrain and motor through the city en route to San Diego. Lunching en route, the party will reach San Diego at 3 p. m. Saturday, July 16, where the President will board the cruiser Houston, which is scheduled to get underway at 4 p. m. for the cruise.

The President will be accompanied on his cruise by his secretary, Stephen T. Early, his naval and military aids, and Dr. Ross T. McIntyre, White House physician.
