MASTER SARGEANT HUBERT CARROLL

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Sgt. Hubert Carroll, a Native of Paris, Texas, and orderly to General Wainwright. He was a prisoner of war of the Japanese with the General for three years. He is a regular army man, having been in the service for 12 years. Carroll became Wainwright's orderly in 1940

LIEUTENANT COLONEL TOM DOOLEY

Lt. Colonel Tom Dooley, native of McKinney and Aide to General Wainwright. Graduated from Texas A & M in 1935 and was the first man decorated in the Philippines where he was awarded the Silver Star for meritoricus action under fire at Clark Field on the day of the Japanese sneak attack. He became a Japanese prisoner May 6, 1942, at the fall of Corregidor and had been overseas one year prior to his capture. He will continue his duties as Aide to General Wainwright who has been assigned to the Eastern Defense Command and will be stationed at Governor's Island, New York in January.

Colonel O. I. Holman

Col. O. I. Holman, native of Pottstown, Penn. Served as executive officer to General Wainwright from 1938 to 1940 when Wainwright commanded the 1st Cavalry Brigade at Ft. Clark. Colonel Holman has been in the army for 32 years and came up from the ranks. During the war he was executive officer of the Cavalry Replacement Center at Fort Riley, Kan. Maj. Gen. John P. Lucas, Commanding General, 4th Army, Fort Sam Houston, Texas, was born January 14, 1890, at Kearneysville, West Virginia. He graduated from the U. S. Military Academy at West Point and was commissioned a second Lieutenant of Cavalry on June 13, 1911. He served for several years in Texas and in January, 1918, was named Commander of the 108th Field Signal Battalion, 33rd Division, at Camp Logan, Texas.

In May, 1918 he sailed for Europe where he was wounded near Antens, France in June 1918. In May, 1943, General Lucas was assigned to Headquarters, North African Theater of Operations. In September of 1943 he assumed command of a Corps in Italy.

LT. GEN. BARTON K. YOUNT

Lt. Gen. Barton K. Yount, Commanding General of the Army Air Forces Training Command, began his Army career at the age of 19 when he was appointed to the U. S. Military Academy from Ohio, his native state. Upon graduation in 1907 he was appointed a second lieutenant of the Infantry. Shortly afterwards he was sent to Camp Columbia, Cuba, where he remained for two years.

Later he served three years in Tientsin, China, before being transferred to Aviation Service in the Signal Corps at Kelly Field, Texas. This was his first contact with the Air Corps. During the war he commanded various aviation organizations in Texas and acted as a member of a board of officers serving in connection with the reorganization of the air service.

General Yount sailed for France in August of 1925 where he served as assistant military attache for aviation at the American Embassy in Paris until August 15, 1929. In August of 1936 General Yount sailed for Hawaii where he was assigned as Wing Commander, 18th Composite Wing. In 1938 he was made Assistant Chief of Air Corps and in 1940 assumed command of MacDill Field, Tampa Florida.

From July 31, 1941, to January 26, 1942 he held command of the West Coast Air Force Training Center with headquarters at Moffet Field. At the end of that time he was selected to head the new Flying Training Command at Washington, D. C.

LT. GENERAL WALTON H. WALKER

Lt. Gen. Walton H. Walker, a native of Belton, Texas and Commanding General of the Eighth Service Command, took over his present duties after leading the XX Corps of the Third Army in its drive from the Normandy beachhead across France and Germany into Austria.

As senior corps commander in General George S. Patton's Army, General Walker led his "Ghost Corps" of infantry and armored divisions to spearhead the Army's campaign in Germany after liberating scores of French cities and towns.

General Walker was born in Belton on December 3, 1889. He attended the old Wedemyer Military Academy in Belton for one year and studied at Virginia Military Institute, which he left to accept an appointment to West Point. Upon graduation from the Military Academy in 1912 he was assigned to the 19th Infantry at Fort Sherdan, Illinois. Later he returned to Texas and was a member of the Vera Cruz expedition under General Funston.
