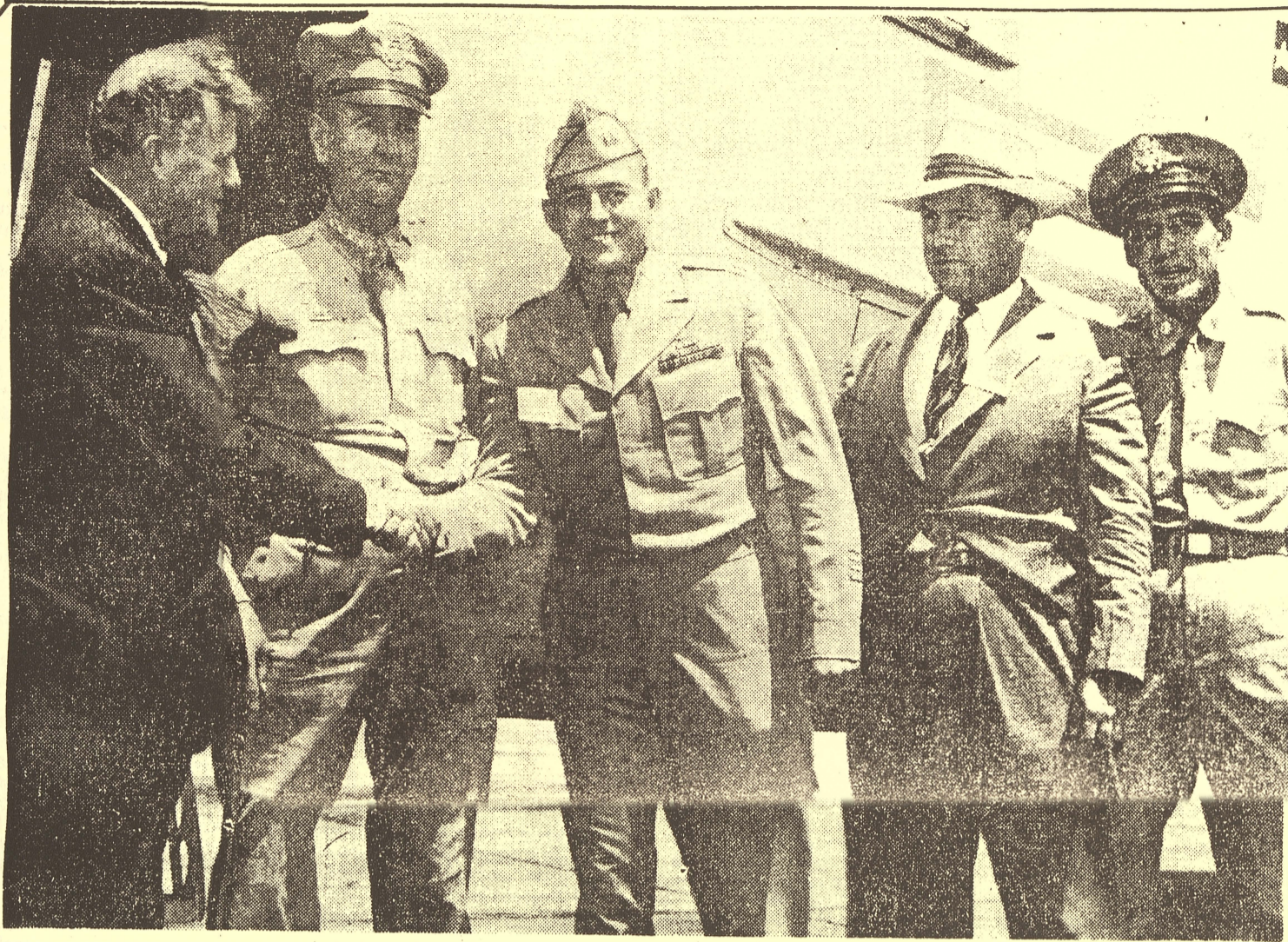

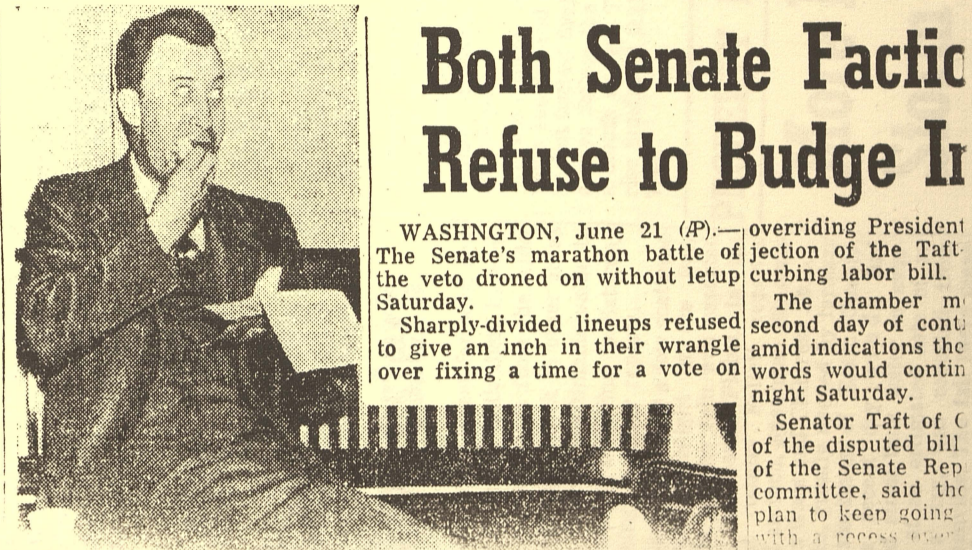

Letup in Rain Aids Harvesters

West Texas wheat farmers, anxious to get on with their harvesting, had a respite from the wide-spread rains which in other areas have been of inestimable value to crop growers, according to Saturday morning's weather reports. There were only a few scattered showers overnight in the Panhandle and no rain was reported in the South Plains. In the east country Follett reported of an inch, Spearman .03, Amato a trace and Childress .19. Rain, greatly needed by farmers and stockmen of Erath County, here recent dry winds had used stock tank water to evaporate at an estimated rate of an inch a day, was reported from Phenixville. The fall there measured 2.10 inches.

SUMMER REALLY STARTS TOMORROW

Sunday will be the first day of summer and the longest day of the year. It will be the day of the summer solstice, timed at 12:19 a. m., marking the sun's northernmost point in the sky before it starts its march southward. From now on, days will become shorter and nights longer, but hottest days of summer always follow the solstice by a month or two. The sun will rise Sunday at 5:21 and set at 7:40.

PROPERTY DAMAGE HIGH

More Rain Likely as Storm Litter Is Cleared

Digging out of tree limbs and shrubbery litter left in the wake of strong winds and heavy rains Friday, Fort Worth residents were warned Saturday of the possibility of more rain. The weather bureau predicted possible widely scattered showers for Saturday afternoon with fresh winds and higher temperatures. Friday afternoon's rain measured 2.24 inches, bringing the year's total to 13.13 inches. Mansfield had 5.7 inches, Burleson 4.0, Roanoke 1.69 and Bridgeport Dam 35 of an inch. The Trinity River, after rising to four feet at 7 a. m. Saturday, had dropped to 2.9 feet later in the morning, less than one foot above its normal stage. Utilities and street repairs were being rushed Saturday after Friday afternoon's winds and rain that caused thousands of dollars damage here. Airplanes Damaged. Winds which averaged 45 miles per hour and reached a peak of 65 miles an hour ripped 15 parked airplanes at Municipal Airport causing damage estimated at \$15,000.

City Street Superintendent Hester reported minor washouts in all sections of the city and street crews worked through the night to remove trees and signs blown down by the wind. An old storm sewer on Brennan Ave. near the Gulf Refinery collapsed and the street caved in. Repairs will take three or four days. Another washout was reported in the 1600 block on Edgewood St. Most dirt streets were badly damaged and many sewers were clogged. Texas Motor Coaches reported that rains held up buses, causing 30 to 40 minutes delay early Friday night. One bus ran off Highway 80 near Grand Prairie and had to be pulled out of the mud about 9:30 p. m. but no one was injured. The line's buses were back on schedule Saturday. Greyhound Lines reported no schedule variations.

Man Who Plunged From Hospital Window Dies

Kassel, 68, of 2001 Fairview, plunged from a third-floor window at Harris Memorial Hospital at 9:30 a. m. Saturday at 3:15 a. m. Saturday. Hospital administrators had not determined exact cause of death. An autopsy would not be held until Monday. Kassel was born in Memel, Germany, and came to America at the age of 7. He had lived in Dallas for 30 years before moving to Fort Worth about three months ago. His wife and a brother, Leo Kassel, died about a year ago. He had been residing with his sister, Mrs. A. B. Gardner, at the Fairmount address. He was a sales representative for a ventilating equipment company. Other survivors include a brother, M. M. Kassel, and another sister, Miss Martha Kassel, both of Fort Worth. The family said Kassel had been suffering from a heart ailment for about two years.

Says Truman Wrong.

He said it "is not so" that an employer can discharge a man on the pretext of a slight infraction of rules, "even though his real motive is to discriminate against the employe for union activities."

"The president says the law will expose unions to suits for acts of violence, wildcat strikes and other actions, none of which were authorized or ratified by them," Taft continued, adding:

"This is not so."

Truman's backers found no outward sign that his veto message and radio speech to the nation had overcome the slim margin by which the Senate Republicans contended on winning. The bill passed on May 13 by a 68 to 24 tally, well over the two-thirds mark.

Democratic Leader Barkley said the veto "will be right hard to sustain."

Another Democratic strategist who declined use of his name, said the president's camp lacked about four votes to reach the one-third-plus-one it needed to uphold the veto.

Alabaman Switches.

The White House, giving every evidence that the president was trying valiantly to make his rejection of the bill stick, was reported to have communicated with Senator Tobey in New Hampshire. Tobey, who was absent on the May 13 vote, was regarded by Republican backers of the bill as an uncertain quantity.

Senator Sparkman of Alabama, who headed the Democratic congressional campaign last year, announced that he was switching to support the president. Senator Lucas of Illinois was reported to be in the same frame of mind.

Senator Fulbright of Arkansas said nothing he heard at a White House luncheon to which Truman invited 13 senators Friday nor anything he read in the president's message had changed his idea of voting to override the veto.

Trial and Error.

"We'll have to go at this by the trial and error method," Fulbright said. "If the bill works

die or next week only after a thorough consideration of the Fort Worth request."

It was expected here that representatives of the city and Chamber of Commerce will make plans to attend the hearing before the War Department in Washington.
