Gen. Wainwright Makes Us Know There Is No Time For Complacence

At a dinner for Texas former prisoners of war, at the Shady Oak Farm of Amon G. Carter, I happened to be seated next to Gen. Jonathan Wainwright. And I was impressed with remarks that he made quite informally.

As he knew the time was drawing near for him to speak on a special radio hook-up, he pulled a plain gold watch out of his pocket, and placing it on the table beside him, turned to me and said:

"Won't you help me to remember not to forget this watch when I leave? My mother gave it to me before I went overseas in the first World War," he explained in a warm tone of voice.

AND I THOUGHT of how sentimental a great general may be about his mother. I had even greater admiration for General Wainwright because of this.

I saw that he was sentimental about home, too, for as the moon came up through the big, well snapped oak trees under which we sat, General Wainwright, relaxing a bit in his chair, said,

"Isn't this a wonderful place? I would live here, if I owned it." I turned to General Wainwright and asked: "Your home is in San Antonio, isn't it?"

HE REPLIED: "It will be after I retire in August. I have just bought a place there." He then explained that, in all of his life, even from his earliest boyhood when his father also was in the service of his country, that he had not lived in any one place for more than two years.

Home never seemed to have a richer meaning than it did on this occasion, where so many other former Texas prisoners of war and their families had gathered.

AMERICAN BOUNTY never seemed so great either. Amon G. Carter Jr., former prisoner of the Germans, who has been elected president of the Texas War Prisoners, and his father had shown their guests bounty at its best.

First, they were served hot dogs and cold drinks. And next they were served great platters of many foods under a big tent in front of the low white frame of Shady Oaks.

COLORED LIGHTS bordering the long porch of this Shady Oak farm house, so typical of Texas, seemed to represent the new hope that had come to these boys' hearts, now that they were at home to stay. And for the moment it seemed that all America could sit and relax just like this.

But when General Wainwright had concluded his talk on national defense before the microphone, one realized that there would be little time for relaxation or complacence in this world of ours. Not even on such a wonderful occasion as this at Shady Oak Farm.

If we were to guard those things about which even a great general can be sentimental after his years of war, then we could not sleep. Not even now, in the aftermath of a great victory.
