My dear General:

My son, Lt. Amon G. Carter, Jr.,
is now stationed in Northern Ireland, having
arrived there on the last convoy.

While I am not sure, the chances
are he will have an opportunity sometime to visit
London and I wonder if you would feel disposed
to write a letter to Ambassador Winant stating
that if Amon Junior should call on him to extend
him any courtesy consistent. If you write the
letter to Ambassador Winant, will you please send
me a copy so that I may forward it to Amon Junior.

Amon Junior is well pleased and
anxious to collect some of the money which I wired
him about on April 1st, as per the enclosed copy.

I realize that the Boss and
all of you are having a tough time in Washington.
Everybody down here seems to be on his toes in
the matter of accumulating scrap rubber, buying
defence bonds, etc. As a matter of fact, we are
going to have a big dinner on July 2nd at which
we hope to sell one to two million dollars in bonds.
With all due respect, I feel certain that if every
state in the union were putting forth as much effort
and energy in cooperating with the President in
an effort to win the war that there should be no
question about the final outcome.
