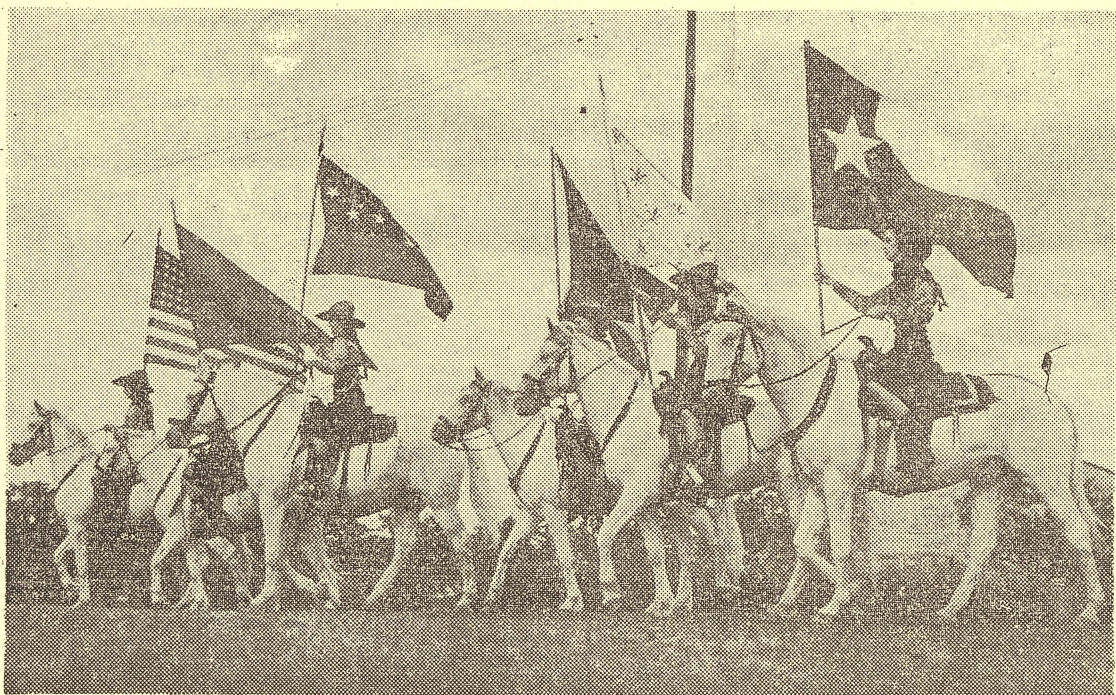

Tommie Kirby, 3½-year-old son of Mr. and Mrs. J. L. Kirby, 530 Clairemount Avenue, suffered a fractured skull Friday at 6:30 p. m. while playing with a broken lawn-mower in the rear of his parent's home. Attendants at St. Joseph's Hospital said his condition was critical late Friday night, after an operation had been performed.

Exact circumstances of the accident were unknown. Mrs. Kirby had left Tommie playing near the lawn-mower with his 2-year-old sis-
