# Clipper Leaves for Antipodes

## Fifteen Listed on First Paid Passenger Flight to New Zealand

Pioneering the first paid passenger flight to New Zealand, the American Clipper took off for Honolulu yesterday at 4:22 p.m. from the Pan American Airways' Cabrillo Beach base.

Aboard were 15 passengers, many of them first fliers. They are scheduled to reach the South Pacific dominion within four and one-half days—compared with 17 days by steamer.

The Clipper took off from the San Francisco Treasure Island base shortly after noon for Cabrillo Beach. In addition to the 15 through passengers, a few persons had passage only to Hawaii. They are to arrive there today.

Boarding the plane here were William Robinson, Milton S. Untmyer and Fred L. Emerson.

The New Zealand-bound Clipper will leave the United States every two weeks. Survey and mail-carrying flights were made previously. In command of the flying boat is Capt. K. V. Beer, veteran Pan American pilot.

# Driver Killed and Woman Injured in Car-Truck Crash

The Sheriff's office reported the truck was driven by James Z. Bird, 24, of Norwalk. He escaped injury.

when a small truck careened over the curb at San Fernando Road and Langley St., Glendale, after a collision with another motor car and knocked him to the sidewalk.

Police said the truck, operated by William L. Owens, 36, of Pasadena, had collided with an automobile driven by William E. Jones, 60, of 1516 E. Orange Grove Ave., Glendale.

Durham, who lives at 420 Porter St., Glendale, was taken to the Queen of Angels Hospital and treated for a crushed chest, punctured lung and fractured ribs.
