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Six Army Aviators Make 100-Mile Flight to Fort Worth From Wichita Falls Despite Severe Handicap.

FACTS ABOUT THE AEROPLANES.

They are parked on the Ryan pasture at the end of the Evans avenue car line.

They will be on exhibition to the public all day Sunday.

The six aviators will leave Fort Worth Monday morning at 8 o'clock for Waco, their next landing place.

There will be no exhibition flights by the pilots other than when they leave Monday morning.

After being cross swept by a strong gale from the southwest for the entire distance of 100 miles airline, the six aeroplanes comprising the First aero squadron of the United States army, commanded by Captain B. D. Foulois, arrived in Fort Worth from Wichita Falls and successfully landed Saturday morning about a minute apart, on the Ryan pasture.

The trip was made in exactly two hours, the first aeroplane landing at 11:14 a. m. This completes the second leg of the cross country flight the squadron is making from Fort Sill, Okla., to its permanent station at Fort Sam Houston, San Antonio, Texas.

The aviators and machines will remain in Fort Worth until Monday morning, when they will start from the Ryan pasture to Waco, their next landing place, at 8 o'clock, weather permitting.

The aviators maintained an average height of from 5,000 to 6,000 feet on the entire trip, the machines flying in pairs, one above the other.

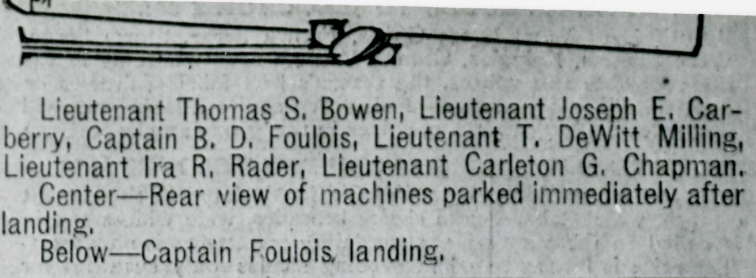
Were Warmly Greeted.

Upon alighting each aviator was greeted by the cheers of some 3,000 persons, who fringed the entire west side of the field, and after all had arrived an informal reception was held for the aviators, who were introduced to Mayor Tyra, R. E. L. Costan, the city commissioners and other prominent citizens.

Although the squadron was due to reach Fort Worth at 10 o'clock, the start was delayed at Wichita Falls on account of engine trouble developing in Lieutenant Bowen's machine.

The first machine was hovering thousands of feet above the aviation field before the spectators were aware that they were in sight. Flying directly over Fort Worth the machines all quickly came into view, and sweeping eastward they described a semi-circle by turning north over Polytechnic, and

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Army Flyers Call Attention to U. S. Unpreparedness

Plain Language Used at Military Dinner—Business Men Appealed to Support Through Congress.

Pointing out the unpreparedness of the United States army and navy to successfully repel an invasion of this country by any one of the European nations, and stating that Germany in ten days' time could land an armed force of sufficient strength at any point on the Atlantic coast to seize all of the munition factories located east of the Allegheny mountains, Captain B. D. Foulois, commander of the First aero squadron of the United States army, appealed to business men of Texas, to send men to congress that would provide adequate defenses. These statements were made in an address Saturday night delivered to members of the Chamber of Commerce, city officials and members of the Southwestern Aeronautical society, who entertained the six aviators of the United States aero squadron at a military dinner at the Metropolitan hotel.

Captain Foulois and his five pilots

were made associate members of the Southwestern Aeronautical association and presented with membership cards by President R. E. L. Costan. Upon suggestion of Light Commissioner Hugh Jamieson, the assembly unanimously voted to christen the strip of ground on the Ryan pasture, upon which the six pilots landed Saturday morning on their cross country flight from Fort Sill, Okla., to San Antonio, the Foulois Landing, in honor of Captain B. D. Foulois, the father of aviation in the United States army.

All Talked of Preparedness.

A number of the speakers of the evening who were called upon by the toastmaster, Mayor Tyra, devoted their talks to the subject of preparedness. Among these were Major Cal C. Elliott of the Texas National Guard, who urged the business men to wake up and see the need for a larger and more thorough military organization, and Lieutenant Joseph E. Carberry, signal corps, United States army, who told of the lack of equipment for bomb throwing and the fact that the United States army did not possess a single rapid-fire aeroplane gun.

The suggestion to Captain Foulois was made by A. B. Case that Fort Worth was the logical place for the establishment of an aero squadron for the entire Southwest and that if congress provided adequate funds to enlarge this branch of the service, Fort Worth would make every effort to secure it.
