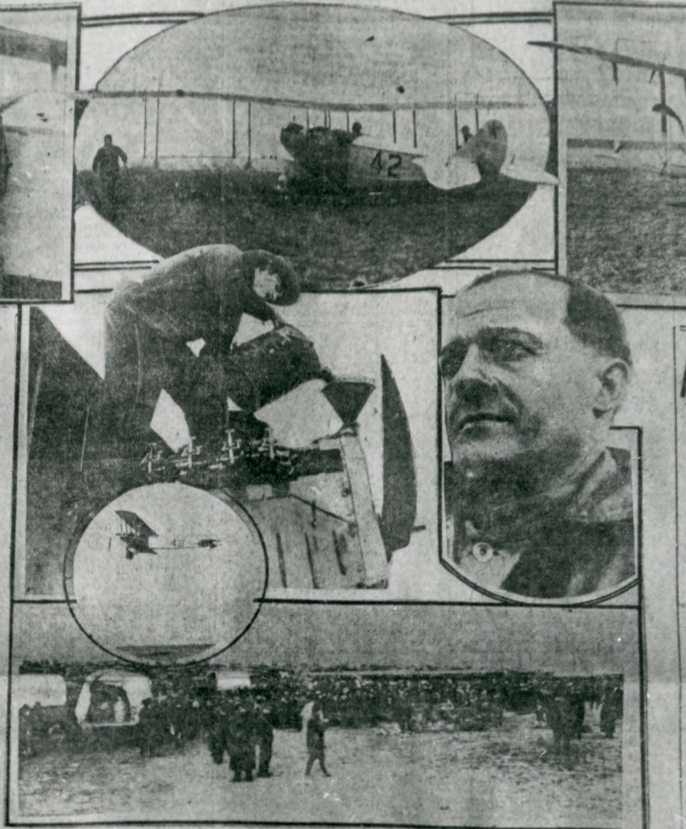

WASHINGTON, Nov. 21.—Officers of the battleship Zephyrus, at Progreso, Mexico, have reported that the American steamer Zozulanda was one-quarter of a mile inside the three-mile limit when recently forcibly searched by a boarding party from a British cruiser. 10,000 See Six Aeroplanes Off

Crowd Causes Delay in Departure by Blocking Starting Track—Waco Reached in an Hour and 36 Minutes.

FIRST PLANE LANDS AT WACO AT 10:26.

WACO, Nov. 22.—With Capt. B. D. Foulis in charge, the first aerial squadron of the United States army, consisting of six airplanes, which left Fort Worth at 8:51 this morning, arrived here today. The pilot machine, driven by Lieut. T. S. Bowen, appeared at 10:26.

The pilot came to a redoubt speed on account of the hazy atmosphere. They encountered a choppy south wind, which impeded their progress. They averaged about sixty miles per hour and flew at a height of about 4,000 feet.

Ten thousand early fliers who lined the hills surrounding Foulis Landing, the army aviation camp at the southeastern edge of the city, Monday morning, were treated at 8:51 a. m. Carberry, left the ground at 4:31 a. m. The six military aeroplanes, half a mile off before the machines began pairing off and heading south for Waco on their way to permanent quarters at Fort Simp Houston, San Antonio.

ALLIES ESTABLISH GREEK WAR ZONE TO FORCE DEMAND

ROME, Nov. 22.—Germany and Austria-Hungary are understood to be asking Rumania to preserve her neutrality and at the same time offering certain concessions to her if she will intervene in the war on the side of the central powers, according to information received here today from reliable sources.

LONDON, Nov. 22.—A report from Salonika says the entente allies have decided to carry the commercial blockade against Greece to the extent of establishing a war zone around Greece and cutting off all supplies. Greeks express the hope that no such drastic action will be taken.

The Associated Press has learned that the French army is officially made the strongest representations to the throne respecting the necessity that Greece give assurances of more active co-operation with the allies.

Denys Cochin, French minister without portfolio, who has been conferring with the Greek officials, has gone to the front.
