AIR MEN SAIL INTO CITY IN FACE OF GALE

Six Army Aviators Make 100-Mile Flight to Fort Worth From Wichita Falls Despite Severe Handicap.

FACTS ABOUT THE AEROPLANES.

The six were parked on the Ryan pasture at the end of the Evans avenue car line.

They will be on exhibition to the public all day Sunday.

The six aviators will leave Fort Worth Monday morning at 10 o'clock for Wichita Falls.

Traffic will be no exhibition flights by the pilots other than when they leave Monday morning.

After being cross swept by a strong gale from the southwest for the entire day of 100 miles altitude, the first six aeroplanes comprising the first six squadron of the United States army, commanded by Captain R. D. Foulis, arrived in Fort Worth Monday morning at 10 o'clock.

The trip was made in exactly two hours from the Ryan pasture to the city.

The aviators and machines will remain in the Ryan pasture until Monday morning.

The aviators maintained an average height of from 5,000 to 6,000 feet on the trip.

Upon sighting each aviator was greeted by the cheer of some 2,000 persons who had gathered to meet them.

Although the squadron was due to start was delayed at Wichita Falls on Monday night.

It is believed that the aviators will be in sight of the city by 10 o'clock.

Army Flyers Call Attention to U. S. Unpreparedness

Plain Language Used at Military Dinner—Business Men Appealed to Support Through Congress.

Pointing out the unpreparedness of the United States army and navy to repel an invasion of this country by any one of the European nations, and stating that Germany in ten days time could land an armed force of sufficient strength at any point on the Atlantic coast to seize all of the munition factories located east of the Rocky mountains, Captain R. D. Foulis, commander of the first army squadron of the United States army, appealed to congress that would provide adequate defenses. These statements were made in an address Saturday night delivered to members of the Chamber of Commerce, city officials and members of the Southwestern Aeroaeronautical society, who entertained the six aviators of the United States army at a military dinner at the Metropolitan hotel.

VILLA CASUALTIES AT HERMOSILLO REPORT TO TOTAL OVER

Carranza Officials on Border Claim decisive Victory With Rebels' Retreat to Nogales Cut Off.

General Obregon, reporting Carranza's retreat from Hermosillo, leaving 14 wounded and captured, according to official Carranza reports. Carranza forces of General Jose Rodriguez have through the cordón placed around Cananea by General Obregon and are rushing to the assistance of Villa.

General Obregon reported to Carranza that General Rodriguez's force of 1,500 men, including 1,350 cavalry of Colonel Cardenas, eight miles south of Cananea, today and took the town of Cananea, on the main line of the Pacific.

General Obregon said his own force should have been at the border and block the way to Cananea.
