

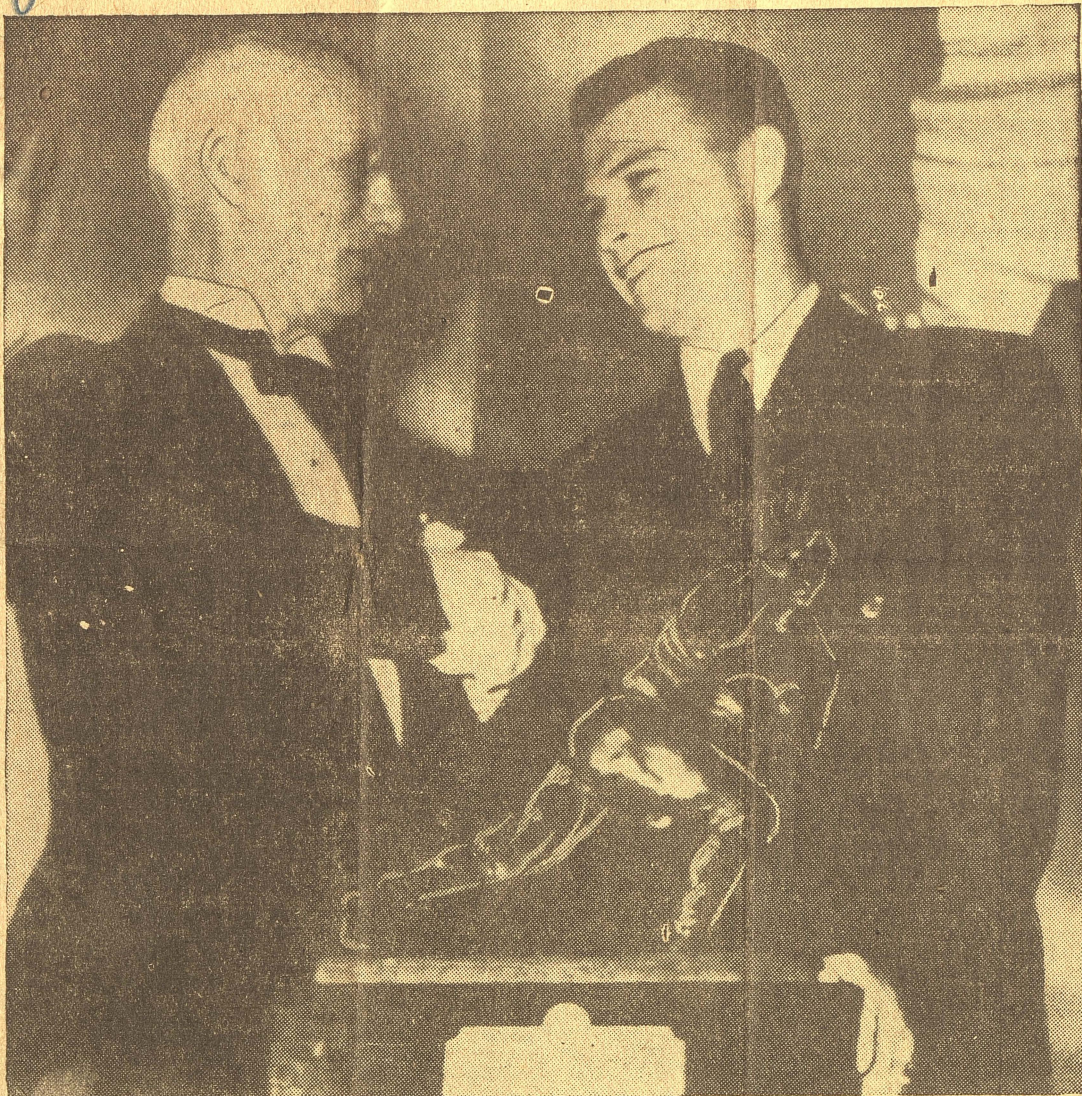

L'IL DAVEY GETS TOP HONOR

Also present were such notables as Postmaster General James A. Farley, Mayor Fiorello LaGuardia of New York, Lieutenant Governor Walter Woodul of Texas and Amon Carter, Fort Worth publisher, who had accompanied Davey from Texas.

Before the trophy was presented to him by Walter P. Holcomb, president of the downtown A. C., O'Brien saw a few of the sights. Accompanying him were two of his biggest teammates, I. B. Hale and Ki Aldrich, who served as an unofficial body guard when crowds got thick.

Hale and Aldrich, according to O'Brien, deserved most of the credit for his success. In accepting the trophy won in previous years by Jay Berwanger of Chicago, Larry Kelley and Clint Frank of Yale, Davey said, "It is wasn't for their playing, I wouldn't be here."

"New York City has shown us Texans a big time," he added. But it didn't last long. The TCU party of 12 was scheduled to leave by air early today to return to Fort Worth, where Davey and his teammates have a big task ahead preparing for their Sugar bowl game against Carnegie Tech Jan. 2.
