SPEAKER WRIGHT LEADS TCU TOUR

About 75 TCU students will leave tomorrow afternoon (Wednesday) on a trip they'll never forget. They're heading to Washington with a knowledgeable tour guide -- former House Speaker Jim Wright -- for four days of private tours and meetings with legislators. They are scheduled to be filmed by C-SPAN, so stay-at-homes will be able to follow some of their experiences.

Some 60 of the tourists are members of his fall semester class, "Congress and the Presidents," which has an enrollment of more than 130. Also making the trip are other TCU students and five students from a political science class at the University of Texas at Arlington taught by Richard Millsap, who also is an adjunct political science teacher here and assists with Wright's class.

The speaker and Richard are staying with the students at the DC Holiday Inn-Capitol, where they will arrive tomorrow night. Their Thursday schedule begins with a private tour of the White House, followed by a visit to the Rayburn Building, where the TCU group will be addressed by Donn Anderson, clerk of the House of Representatives; John Kasich, Republican congressman from Ohio; and Dr. Nick Masters, economist with the House budget committee. After lunch at the Longworth House of Representatives Office Building, the group will hear talks by U.S. Sen. George Mitchell of Maine; Joe Stewart, secretary of the Senate; and Dr. Marina Weiss, a former Texas A&M professor who now serves on the Senate finance committee.

They will be treated to a private tour of the U.S. Capitol Friday morning before it is opened to the public, then will meet on the floor of the House chamber (usually off limits to visitors) to hear an address by Wright. The TCU group also has been invited to luncheon at the Democratic Club with Wright as host. The club is normally restricted to Democratic congressmen and their guests.

Saturday and Sunday will be devoted to bus and tram tours of Washington and to such sites as Mount Vernon and Arlington, VA. The travelers are due back in Fort Worth at 10 p.m. Sunday.

CITYWIDE EVENT WILL BE ON CAMPUS

"Our Heritage of Thanksgiving -- Seeds of Change" is the theme for the eighth annual citywide Thanksgiving celebration to be held on campus Nov. 22. The interfaith, intercultural event will begin at 7 p.m. in Ed Landreth Auditorium under the sponsorship of The National Conference of Christians and Jews and the Tarrant Area Community of Churches.

Narrators for the community program will be radio-TV personality Bob Ray Sanders and community volunteer/former NCCJ board member Carol Minker. While the event is free, those attending are encouraged to contribute food items or make donations to The Food Bank of Greater Tarrant County.

The program will include artistic performances by The Dorothy Shaw Bell Choir, Texas Boys Choir and Tarrant County Independent Schools' choral representatives as well as a dance presentation by Ballet Folklorico de Azteca. In addition to songs and dances will be the sounding of the Shofar with a reading by Rabbi Sidney Zimelman of Congregation Ahavath Shalom, an Islamic call to prayer, a Native American commentary and a Day of Thanksgiving proclamation by Mayor Kay Granger.

The audience will take part in hymns and prayers of Thanksgiving. The benediction will be given by Dr. Eugene Brice, TCU trustee and minister of University Christian Church.

Adjunct faculty member Sharon Bengel is producer-director of the festival. The script is adapted from the Quincentennial Commemoration, "Seeds of Change," published by Smithsonian Press.

M.B.A. OPEN HOUSE IS SATURDAY

Prospective graduate business students are encouraged to attend an M.B.A. open house hosted by the Neeley School from 10 a.m. to noon Saturday. The free, public event will be held in Tandy Hall 320. Because seating is limited, the M.B.A. office requests reservations be made by calling Ext. 7531.

Bernard S. Appel, senior vice president of the Tandy Corporation and chairman of Tandy's Radio Shack division, will offer a corporate perspective on the value of an M.B.A. degree in today's competitive business environment. Additional presentations will be made by Academic Program Director Rob Rhodes and Admission Director Leslie Neugent. A five-member panel of students in the M.B.A. program also will be available to answer questions.

The enrollment of 237 students in the Neeley School's M.B.A. program during the 1992 fall semester is seven percent higher than a year ago. The gain has taken place at a time when national graduate business school enrollment has declined.

NEW MENTORS NOW ON CALL

"Natural helpers," identified by a student survey taken in the spring, have been honing their skills in listening, advising and referring as active volunteers in the Campus Mentor program. Sponsored by the Alcohol and Drug Education Program, more than 50 students, faculty and staff members named by survey participants currently serve as mentors. They were recommended as individuals to whom students already tended to carry their concerns.

An advisory council oversees the program. Andy Fort of religion-studies, Mary Ruth Jones of residential living, Steve Kintigh of recreational sports, Felix Mira of admissions, Victoria Roper of alcohol and drug education, and Connie Villela of campus police serve on the council along with students Amy Allen, David Box, Christina Chang, Kari Clark, Laurie Hyde, Sean Kennally, Kristen Lieber, Melinda Nasir, Sarah Stoller and Penny Woodcock.

Several faculty and staff members recently led a weekend training program for new mentors, focusing on college patterns of use and abuse, the University social scene, the addiction process, confrontation, referrals, acquaintance rape, communication skills and the helping relationship. They also provided a pharmacological update and guidance in recognizing behaviors of concern. Scott Horton of student activities, Jack Scott of the counseling center, Kay Higgins of residential living, hall directors Mary Dean Keyes and Robyn Summers, Susan Rush of theatre and Barbara Brown Herman, Victoria Roper and Cathi Wentworth of alcohol and drug education conducted the sessions.

COME SEE SCULPTURE ANY TIME

It's fun to invite folks to an art exhibit and not have to tell them what time to show up. TCU's latest showing -- works by upper-level undergraduate and graduate sculpture majors -- is on view all the time from now to Feb. 8.

It's the University's first annual outdoor sculpture exhibition, installed from the back of the Moudy Building into the atrium there. Visitors are welcome any time, but there isn't enough lighting to see much detail at night.

Works on display are by master's candidates Alfred Williams III, Paul Lucke, Heather Murphree, William Scott Keeley and Elizabeth Gonzalez Leal; seniors Fidel Valdez, Laura Michele Gutierrez-Ross and Regina Louise Young; and juniors Douglas Brawn Hopkins and Kimberly Lovelace.

The pieces were chosen by an advisory committee chaired by Dean Bob Garwell and including art chairman David Conn, assistant professor Thad Duhigg and other professors, two students and a visiting artist. Each student had to put together a packet to submit works, Thad said, which is valuable experience for submitting proposals in the art world.

Thad pointed out this gives sculpture students an opportunity to display their large works as well as smaller pieces, which are shown in Mary Coutts Burnett Library each spring. The works in this showing are all new and are diverse in material and subject matter.

RAZORBACKS OUTSWIM FROGS

In a dual meet here Nov. 7, Arkansas Razorback swimmers and divers were better than the Horned Frogs. The Arkansas men won 123.5 to 119.5, while Arkansas women won 145 to 93.

The men's meet was close going into the last event with the 40 freestyle relay deciding the ranking. TCU and Arkansas tied to the 1/1000th of a second to give the Razorbacks a four-point win.

Highlights of the meet for the Lady Frogs included:

- First place with 3:58.20 in the 400 medley relay by Jamie Bobo, Julie Musgrove, Tama Salter, Jill Lakusiak for TCU's best in-season time ever for this event;
- First in 200 back with 2:07.91 for Bobo and second for Saltar with 22:09.46;
- First in one-meter diving for Kelly Crowell;
- Second in 200 breast for Musgrove with 2:26.59.

Places for the men included:

- First in 200 for Walter Soza with 1:54.21 and second for John Dolynchuk with 1:54.61;
- First in 200 butterfly for Soza with 1:53.57;
- First in 100 free for Luke Small with 47.01;
- First in 200 back for Dolynchuk with 1:53.23;
- First in 500 free for Soza with 4:43.84;
- First in 200 breast for Luke Small with 2:10.72;
- Tie for first in 400 free relay by Philip Gauthier, Ted Murphy, Matt Houston and Brian Fell.

"We swam very well," said Coach Richard Sybesma. "It was tough to lose such a close meet on the last event, but Arkansas swam and dove very well. This is a great experience for our team to see how every race counts in the team outcome. All our freshmen learned what college swimming is all about in this exciting meet," he added. "Our men's 400 free relay had three freshmen on it, and they gained a lot of experience in that event. Soza and Bobo had outstanding meets."

The Frogs competed against New Mexico State and Oral Roberts University here before Saturday's football game with Texas Tech.

COACH RECEIVES MASTER AWARD

Richard Sybesma, now in his 14th year as TCU swimming coach, has been honored by the College Swimming Coaches Association of America.

Eligibility is based on a coach producing a national collegiate swimming champion, winning 50 percent of dual meets against recognized collegiate opponents and conducting coaching institutes or schools or having participated in institutes or schools as a member of the faculty. The honorees also must hold a master's degree and have been a CSCAA member for 10 years a varsity coach at a college or university.

To date Richard has coached seven national championship teams and had 12 of his team members named to all-American honors. Holder of the M.L.A. degree from TCU, he was named Southwest Conference Coach of the year in 1981 and again in 1989.

SWIMMERS HONOR HIRSTINE, SNYDER

Alumnus John Hirstine Jr., Class of '32 member, and Karl Snyder, emeritus professor of English, are now honorary members of the Horned Frog swimming team.

"Both of these young men are avid swimmers, and we wanted to recognize them for their dedication," said Coach Richard Sybesma at the Nov. 6 ceremony, where each was presented a plaque and TCU swimming letter jacket. "They are an inspiration to everyone who knows them and rarely miss a day in the pool.
