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## FOUR CHOSEN FOR NYC CONFERENCE

Four TCU students are among 200 college and university students from across the nation chosen to participate in the Business Tomorrow 25th Anniversary Conference Nov. 18-20 in New York City. All seniors, they are Christopher Hightower and Thomas Thi Phu, both majoring in history; Sara Turman, majoring in speech communication/political science; and Kristen Turner, a political science/English major.

The conference on "Visions of the Future," sponsored by the Foundation for Student Communication Inc., will bring campus leaders from select institutions together with top-level executives to exchange ideas and viewpoints. Keynote speaker will be Malcolm Forbes Jr., president of Forbes Inc. Others will include former Secretary of Defense Frank Carlucci; Wally Kopp, president of Teach for America; Igor Gordevitch, editor-in-chief of ECO Inc.; Stone Roberts, president of Lintas; Robert Neimeth, president of International Pfizer Inc; Mark Rohrbasser, chairman of North America Union Bank of Switzerland; and Reginald Weaver, executive director of National Education Association.

The focus of presentations and panel sessions will be on education and industry, school-to-work transition; environmental policy, government regulation vs. free enterprise; strategies for competitive performance; and restructuring the workforce and corporate globalization. Small group sessions will be led by chief executive officers and presidents of Fortune 500 companies as well as professors and experts in international business.

A summary of each group's conclusions will appear in *Business Today* magazine, which is published by the conference sponsor.

Following a recommendation by the Dean of Students, TCU participants in the Business Tomorrow program were chosen by the conference sponsor on the the basis of applications and essays. The group will represent wide geographical distributions and a variety of different majors, backgrounds and political viewpoints.

## 16 SERVE AS WASHINGTON INTERNS

Fifteen seniors and one junior are spending this semester in Washington, D.C., serving as interns while earning 15 semester hours of credit as participants in the prestigious Washington Internship Program. The students, who are drawn from a variety of majors, test their skills as interns at a variety of public, private and non-profit organizations, often returning to campus with newfound maturity and a sense of purpose.

## WASHINGTON INTERNS (cont.)

All internships are arranged through The Washington Center for Internships and Academic Seminars, a non-profit, independent educational institution that links higher education with public, private and not-for-profit institutions and organizations. Since it began its affiliation with The Washington Center in 1968, TCU has sent more than 200 students through the fall internship program.

Students participating in the program must have a minimum grade-point average of 3.0 and must return to TCU for at least one semester after their internship before graduation. Interns also must attend a non-credit seminar once a week during the spring semester prior to their fall internship. The seminar is designed to help them develop more precise goals and expectations for their internships.

Seniors participating this fall include two speech communication majors, Michelle Owens and Laura Sutherland, who are interning at the White House in the Office of the Social Secretary. Broadcast journalism major Jay Warren also is assigned to the White House in the Media Affairs Department, while another broadcast journalism major, Shannon Sill, serves with the American Civil Liberties Union.

Two interns working for Tribune Broadcasting are Gregory Riddle, a broadcast journalism major, and Ben Johnson, a broadcast journalism/political science major. Other senior interns include three political science majors — Melissa Rodriguez, interning with Caribbean Central America Action; Gena Schallehn, The Electric Association; and Megan Williams, Clifford L. Brody Associates.

Internship assignments also include: Shelly Birdsong, management major, Washington Business Group on Health; Robert Chesney, political science/psychology major, Institute for Foreign Policy Analysis; Chad Edwards, marketing, National Small Business United; Holli Harry, advertising and public relations, National Association of Student Personnel Administrators; John Lamb, Spanish, U.S. Information Agency; and Thad Schaefer, accounting, law office of Gregory B. Macauley. The lone junior intern, business major Ryan Gosney, is working for the American Association for Higher Education.

The Hatton Sumners Foundation's annual gifts to TCU support the Washington Internship Program and also provides partial-tuition grants for political science, history or pre-law majors, or for students intending to teach in the social sciences field. A special \$100,000 gift from the foundation in 1992 established an endowed fund to provide perpetual support for the Washington Internship Program.

Dr. Eugene Alpert, former director of TCU's Washington program, is now vice president of academic affairs at The Washington Center.

## THANKSGIVING EVENT TO BE NOV. 21

Ed Landreth Auditorium will be the setting Nov. 21 for the annual interfaith, intercultural celebration of Thanksgiving. "Unity" is the theme for the ninth such celebration, which will begin at 7 p.m. under the sponsorship of the Tarrant Area Community of Churches (TACC) and the National Conference of Christians and Jews (NCCJ),

While the public program is free, those attending are encouraged to take canned food for the Food Bank of Greater Tarrant County or to make a cash contribution.

Narrators for the program will be Midge Hill, news anchor for Channel 11, and Ralph Waldo Emerson, senior minister of Rising Star Baptist Church. Other participants will be Mayor Kay Granger, co-chairman James F. Schuessler of the NCCJ and John Tuetjen, minister of Trinity Lutheran Church.

The traditional Thanksgiving focus will include Linda Boydstron performing a mime drama of the first Thanksgiving observance. A special guest will be Kevin Locke, a Lakota of South Dakota's Standing Rock Reservation who is a well known traditional flute player and hoop dancer. In 1990 he was awarded a National Heritage Fellowship by the National Endowment for the Arts.

The program will include artistic performances by The Dorothy Shaw Bell Choir, Texas Boys Choir and the Tarrant County Independent Schools' choral representatives. Brief presentations on religious convictions will be given by Elizabeth Lambreth, Christian; Sidney Zimelman and Harvey Anton, Jewish; Jon Maslow, Buddhist; Gwendolyn Pendleton, Baha'i; Naji Hamideh, Muslim; and Craig Roshaven, Unitarian.

## CHORALE WILL SING "REQUIEM"

TCU's Concert Chorale will perform Maurice Duruflé's "Requiem" as the highlight of a Nov. 21 concert at St. Stephen Presbyterian Church, 2600 Merida. The free concert, which is open to public, will begin at 7:30 p.m.

Director Ron Shirey has conducted the plainsong-like "Requiem" several times before, most recently with the Dallas Symphony Orchestra. The chorale will be accompanied on the 40-minute choral work by faculty member and organist Janet Pummill.

A post-game party will be held at University Christian Church under the sponsorship of UCC and the Trinity Brazos Area of the Christian Church.

## **SWIMMERS, DIVERS TO HOST MEET**

Horned Frog swimmers and divers, home after several out-of-town meets, will host Texas A&M University athletes Friday. The competition will begin at 7 p.m. in the Rickel Center pool.

The athletes' schedule included a meet with the Arkansas Razorbacks on Nov. 4. The men's team defeated the Hogs 140-101, while the Lady Frogs lost a close meet 116-127.

The following day the teams competed in the Hendrix Classic and then in the Hendrix Relays on Nov. 6. Both men and women were team champions.

"That was a great weekend for both teams," said Coach Richard Sybesma. "Both learned what teamwork and spirit are all about, and we had very fast times for this early in the year.

"After losing in an upset against the Razorbacks in 1992, the men's team won every event this year, and the women were very close, losing the medley relay by only 3/10 of a second," he added.

The Frogs were the top team in the Hendrix Classic and relay meet.

## **CONCERT WILL FEATURE FACULTY WORK**

A new work choreographed by dance faculty member Susan Douglas Roberts in collaboration with music faculty member Blaise Ferrandino will debut at Contemporary Dance/Fort Worth's fall repertory concert Friday and Saturday in Ed Landreth Auditorium. Performing the musical score will be tenor Vincent Russo and cellist John Burton, both of the music faculty.

Blaise will discuss the creative process of composing music for the piece with audience members for 15 minutes before each performance. The dance, which is an extension of the earlier piece "To Turn Again," is inspired by the poetry of T.S. Eliot and eventually will be developed into an evening-length work. The collaboration is a Mid-America Arts Alliance program made possible in part through support from the Texas Commission on the Arts and through a grant from Meet the Composer, Inc., with support from the National Endowment for the Arts and the Dayton Hudson Foundation.

The 8 p.m. evening concerts will include special guest appearances by the Oberlin Dance Collective of San Francisco, which are sponsored by TCU's New Century Danscene. A matinee without the Oberlin Dance Collective performance will be presented at 2 p.m. Saturday. Tickets may be purchased through Central Ticket Office at 335-9000 or at the door for \$10 (\$8 for the matinee). Tickets for students and senior citizens are \$6 (\$4 for the matinee).

## OLD PLAY HAS NEW 'TEXAS TWIST'

New theatre faculty member George Brown gave Carlo Goldoni's Renaissance commedia dell'arte, "The Servant of Two Masters," the Lone Star treatment before putting it on the University Theatre stage.

As it was originally written, Goldoni's tale follows two lovers who have been separated but are looking for each other without realizing they live in the same inn and share the same servant.

George, who joined TCU as assistant professor of acting/directing this year, kept the plot line but took a few liberties with the play's language and character development. "We've totally transplanted them into a 'B' Western as a kind of tribute to the wonderful cowboy films I grew up with," he said of his first TCU directing effort. "The characters translate perfectly. Instead of being a servant of the Renaissance, Truffaldino is now played in the tradition of Gabby Hayes and Smiley Burnett. The saloon keeper character was a male originally, but we changed that to give it more spice. She's now a mix of Mae West and Miss Kitty."

George also seized the opportunity to make the play more physical. "We poke fun at the high comedy, so we can enjoy the low comedy more," he explained. "It's a farce in the truest sense of the word, even beyond the Three Stooges." Teaching the elements of comedy was an additional benefit. "If anything, the student actors will learn to set up a gag to make it funny," he said.

Student actors include Tim McCanna, Erika Thorp, Tim Shane, Craig Lee, Jamie Burns, Patricio Gonzalez, Jenny Garland, Jen Gerace, Greg Burton, Paul Parkman, Gary Jones, Travis Schuldt and Michelle Ruiz. Longtime theatre faculty member Henry Hammack will play Ol' Tex, a member of the audience.

"Servant" will play tomorrow (Wednesday) through Nov. 21 at the University Theatre. Showtimes will be at 8 p.m. through Saturday and at 2 p.m. on Nov. 21. Admission is free for TCU students and faculty and staff members. Reservations must be made by calling Ext. 7626.

## TRIO TO PERFORM TWO WORKS

The TCU Trio featuring cellist John Burton, violinist Kurt Sprenger and pianist Jill Sprenger will perform two pieces Nov. 22 at 7:30 p.m. in Ed Landreth Auditorium.

The three faculty members will begin the free, public concert with a piece by Los Angeles composer Halsey Stevens, whose music has been described as blending "keen intellectual power and command of form with emotional depth and imagination." Following morning briefings on careers, participants will break for lunch in the Student Center. In the afternoon they will attend a session on scholarship opportunities at the University and tour the physics laboratories. Speakers, in addition to Bruce and Bob, will include Magnus Rittby of physics and Daniel Hernandez of admissions.

The magnet program already has a link with the University. Dunbar faculty member Charles Reidl, who will accompany the visiting students, earned his Ph.D. in physics at TCU. In the last decade, 12 of his students have advanced to Westinghouse Science Talent Search semifinals.

Senior **Amy Bumstead** was named to the pre-season all-SWC women's second team in the Oct. 29 *Dallas Morning News*. The story listed her statistics as 14.4 points with 7.7 rebounds per game. Texas, Baylor, A&M, SMU and Tech each had one player on the first team, and others on the second team were from Houston, A&M, Tech and SMU.

*Novedades*, a Spanish-language newspaper published in Dallas, carried news of **Luis Lara** and other new members of the M.J. Neeley School International Board of Visitors in its Oct. 27 issue.

## EVENT TO BENEFIT QUAKE SURVIVORS

An annual Fort Worth festival celebrating the culture of India will double this year as a fund-raising event for survivors of the September earthquake that struck the western state of Maharashtra.

"Experience India" will open at 11 a.m. Saturday in the Student Center ballroom and continue until 4 p.m. Admission is \$10 for adults and \$5 for children with free admission with all larger donations. Participants will see performances of traditional dancing, hear live and recorded music, sample foods and view a showing of Indian fashions. Proceeds will be sent to the Prime Minister's National Relief Fund.

The quake, which measured 6.4 on the Richter scale, resulted in India's worst natural disaster in 50 years, killing between 10,000 and 15,000 people, injuring 10,000 and destroying the homes of 150,000.

For the last decade Vichar Manch, a local Asian Indian group, has presented annual cultural festivals; this will be the first held at the University and the first to focus on an urgent cause. On-campus sponsors are University Ministries, the journalism department and a newly established organization, Students of Asian Indian Descent.

"I'm glad to see the activity involving Asian Indian culture on this campus, and I am glad to see students getting involved in a humanitarian effort which fits hand-in-glove with the Hunger Week campaign," Anantha Babbili, journalism chairman, said. He noted that the celebration is consistent with the University's reputation for demonstrating "concern for human suffering at home and abroad."

At a session titled "Innocents Abroad No Longer: Designing Creative Classes for American Students in Britain," **Nowell Donovan** (geology) in his "Interdisciplinary Summer Programs: The Scottish Enlightenment" introduced the notion of interdisciplinary courses taught under a single theme, exemplified by the summer 1993 Edinburgh studies. **Kathryne McDorman** (history) read her paper, "Student and Faculty Enrichment: Cooperative Models for Interdisciplinary Themes Abroad," examining the joint presentations and debates that were written into programs such as TCU at Oxford. **Linda Hughes** (English) expressed her creative notions of how a site influences course design in her paper, "Topography as Hypertext: Designing Study Abroad Programs." **Anantha Babbili** (journalism) presented "Post-colonialism and British Cultural Studies," commenting on the learning experience for American students who find many of their comfortable notions of a culture deconstructed by a visit to Britain.

Two staff members of the Air Force ROTC detachment on campus recently were honored by AFROTC regional headquarters. Master Sgt. **Robert Frasier Jr.**, was selected as the Region Senior NCO of the Quarter, and Staff Sgt. **Frederick (Dale) Gow** was named Region NCO of the Quarter for July-September 1993. "Competition for these awards was extremely intense, and the fact that both awards went to the same unit (one of more than 40 in the region) indicates the high caliber and expertise displayed by the recipients," Capt. **Davis Holloway**, executive officer of the detachment, noted.
