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## PEPSICO GRANT TO FUND RECITAL HALL

A grant of \$1 million from The PepsiCo Foundation will fund a 350-seat recital hall that will be the centerpiece for a new performance facility planned for construction immediately south of Ed Landreth Hall. The grant was announced by Bronson Davis, vice chancellor of University advancement.

The new structure will include rehearsal spaces for choral and instrumental activities, studios and practice rooms for the institution's expanding piano program, an experimental theatre and a new shop for scenery construction.

"The gift from The PepsiCo Foundation will provide an intimate and inspirational setting for faculty and student recitals, chamber music and the weekly broadcast of the Faculty Recital Series on KTCU-FM," said Dean Bob Garwell of the College of Fine Arts and Communication. "Indeed, this fine gift from The PepsiCo Foundation will provide an additional resource in pursuit of the 'competitive edge' for the study of music and theatre at TCU."

Plans call for the new recital hall to be large enough to accommodate small chamber groups as well as solo recitalists. In the construction, careful attention also will be given to acoustics and isolation from surrounding sound. Adjacent areas will include performers' dressing rooms, recording or broadcast control room, lighting controls, warm-up area and small equipment storage space.

"A state-of-the art, readily accessible rehearsal and performance space is critical to TCU's commitment to arm music students to excel in a highly competitive profession," Dean Garwell added. "Department graduates have achieved local and national recognition as performers and directors, church musicians, faculty in universities and schools, executives in the music business and administrative arts organizations.

"A new recital hall will provide the extra incentive such dedicated young artists seek to assist them in preparation for their professional careers," he said.

Additional grants from The PepsiCo Foundation have established and maintained a corporate scholarship for Master of Business Administration students. J. Roger King of Ridgefield, Conn., a TCU graduate and member of the University's board of trustees, is senior vice president for personnel for PepsiCo Inc. He also serves on the international board of visitors of the M. J. Neeley School of Business.



## NEELEY BOARD TO MEET APRIL 8-9

The M.J. Neeley International Board of Visitors will gather Friday and Saturday for its annual spring meeting, and two board members will arrive early to participate in the Neeley School's Executive-in-Residence program.

M.B.A. Admissions Director Peggy Conway will present an overview of graduate student recruitment. Assistant Dean Linda Smith will discuss the summer internship program and placement, and Jack Barrett, director of the Charles Tandy American Enterprise Center, will talk about activities being coordinated by the facility. Dean Kirk Downey also will provide the board with an update on other existing business school programs and ones under consideration.

Olden Lee, senior vice president for human resources and chief personnel officer at KFC Corp., is scheduled to meet with the Neeley School chapter of the Society of Human Resource Management and will address the business school's undergraduate council on the subject of mentors for diversity. Lee also will meet with the M.B.A. Council on Cultural Diversity.

Charles Ansley, vice president of marketing operations and the Worldwide Center of Competency for the IBM subsidiary Integrated Systems Solutions Corp., will lead a talk with a management information systems class. He also will give the keynote address for Business Communication Day, hosted by the Center for Productive Communication.

Both Lee and Ansley will attend a luncheon with M.B.A. students Thursday and will discuss "Career Choices & Outlook."

The 27-member board of visitors reviews and advances recommendations on Neeley School programs and goals. Board members include local, national and international leaders recognized for their exceptional stature in a field relevant to the mission of the Neeley School.

A fried chicken lunch followed by a baseball game and tennis matches are on Saturday's schedule for the Spring Tailgate Party for alumni, parents of students and friends.

In case of rain, the tailgate party will be moved to the Rickel Building, according to DeVonna Tinney, director of alumni relations.

This the 15th year for the lectures, which are made possible by Mr. and Mrs. C. Jones Russell of Columbia, Mo.

On April 12 Dr. Campbell will discuss "Whether Ecumenism: Claiming the Higher Calling," in Robert Carr Chapel. On April 13 she will speak on "The Body Still Broken: Toward the Third Millennium" in Weatherly Hall.

Both lectures will begin at 11 a.m. and will be followed by complimentary lunches and discussions for Disciples students and ministers in the Student Center. Reservations for the luncheons are needed by Thursday and can be made at Ext. 7580.

Dr. Campbell also will hold a session on "Called to be Disciples (and disciples) of Christ" April 12 from 7:30 to 9 p.m. in University Christian Church's second-floor activities room. She will answer questions after her presentation, which will be preceded by a coffee "hour" beginning at 7 p.m.

## COMMUNICATION DAY IS THURSDAY

Southwest Airlines and *The Business Press* are among sponsors in the 1994 Business Communication Day. Thursday's event will be hosted by the Neeley School's Center for Productive Communication in the Tandy Hall atrium.

The third-annual event will feature the Southwest Airlines "Let's Talk Business" speaking contest, *The Business Press* "The Business Beat" writing contest and an information technology fair. Communication Day will conclude with a keynote address by Charles Ansley of the IBM subsidiary Integrated Systems Solutions Corp.

Following an intermission, Andy Paquet of biology will guide talks by geology major Pamela DeGroat, "Cambrian Basic Intrusive Rocks in the Blue Creek Canyon Area of Southwestern Oklahoma"; physics major Shawn Gay, "A Study of Anharmonic Effects in the Vibrational Motion of Small Silicon-Carbon Clusters"; and political science major Rochael Soper, "Managed Competition and National Health Care Reform."

April 12 talks also will begin at 2 p.m. in Moudy 141 N and will be presided over by Donna Hall of speech communication and Ron Watson of art and art history. Speakers include psychology major Jenny A. ## ETHICS SPECIALIST WILL BE GUEST

Cornell University's Dr. Kenneth A. Strike, a specialist in ethics in education, will be a Green Honors Professor in the School of Education April 11-12. Strike is author of six or more books and has edited volumes on facets of educational ethics. His latest is *Ethics for Professionals in Education: Perspective for Preparation and Practice*. A member of the Cornell faculty since 1980, he has headed that institution's philosophy and sociology of education division and educational administration since 1986.

Editor of the *Professional Ethics in Education* series issued by Teachers College Press, Strike is credited with some 100 articles in leading educational journals and book chapters on ethics and related subjects. He is president-elect of the Philosophy of Education Society.

A former National Defense Education Act Fellow at Northwestern University, he received that school's award for distinguished service in teaching and research. Strike is associate editor of *Educational Theory* and serves on the editorial board of *Studies in Philosophy and Education* and *Journal of Personnel Evaluation*.
