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PUBLISHER TO SPEAK AT CONVOCATION Chancellor's Award Recipient Will Be Announced

Fort Worth Star-Telegram president and publisher Richard L. Connor will be the speaker for TCU's fall convocation Sept. 13. His address will be titled "Choices and Dreams."

The event begins at 11 a.m. in Ed Landreth Auditorium with an academic procession. The entrance of faculty members and university staff in full regalia marks the official opening of the University's 122nd academic year.

Connor has been the newspaper's president and publisher since July 1986. He joined the *Star-Telegram's* parent company, Capital Cities/ABC Inc., in 1973 and has worked at three of the company's newspapers in Illinois, Michigan and Pennsylvania. Connor has worked as a reporter, photographer and editor during his career.

Although Connor has worked solely as a publisher for the last eight years, he still continues to work as a writer. He produces a weekly newspaper column which, along with other material in the Star-Telegram, is distributed nationwide to more than 600 newspapers by The New York Times Wire Service.

A highlight of the convocation will be the announcement of the seventh recipient of the Chancellor's Award for Distinguished Teaching. Endowed by an anonymous alumni couple, the honor, which recognizes outstanding ability and accomplishment, includes a \$14,000 check to cover expenses the recipient believes will most enhance his or her scholarly contributions. The first teaching award was given in 1982. The Chancellor's Award for Distinguished Research and Creative Activity has been presented in alternate years since 1983.

Classes will be dismissed from 10:30 a.m. to 12:15 p.m. to allow faculty, staff and students to attend the convocation. The procession will form in front of Ed Landreth Hall at 10:45 a.m. Faculty and eligible university staff planning to participate in the academic procession should return a response form by Monday, Sept. 12.

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CHRISTMAS BREAK DATES SET

The University will be closed for Christmas break at the end of the workday on Dec. 23 and will reopen on Jan. 3.

From Dec. 26 to Dec. 31, the University will remain open on a limited basis. Only essential personnel as defined by the chancellor and vice chancellors will be required to work during this period.

The University's seven officially recognized holidays include: New Year's Day, Martin Luther King Jr. Day, Good Friday, Independence Day, Labor Day, Thanksgiving Day and Christmas Day. According to University policy, if any of these days fall on a Saturday, the Friday before is considered a holiday. If the day falls on a Sunday, the following Monday (for example, Jan. 2, 1995) is considered a holiday.

TCU's newest music students will kick off the fall 1994 series of Wednesday Student Recital Hours in two free performances this week and next (Sept. 7 and 14).

The 50-minute musical programs included in the series usually offer a variety of vocal and instrumental music. The first two showcase performances that traditionally start off the recital series show off the talents of first-year music students as well as transfers and entering graduate students. More than 100 of the purple-and-white street signs featuring Texas Christian University's name and horned frog mascot were installed by the City of Fort Worth in early July. The signs were a cooperative effort between the city and TCU.

INTERNATIONAL STUDENTS WELCOMED

Faculty and staff members are invited to attend a 5 p.m. reception for new international students Thursday (Sept. 8) in the Student Center ballroom.

The reception, which is hosted by International Student Affairs and the International Student Association (ISA) each semester, gives TCU's new international students an opportunity to introduce themselves to the TCU community, said Al Mladenka, International Student Affairs director. ISA plans for the semester also will be discussed and ISA board members will be introduced at the reception, he added.

This year, about 90 new students representing 48 countries have enrolled at TCU, Al said. Students from Slovakia and the Ukraine — two cultures never before represented at TCU — are among the incoming international students. About 60 different countries are currently represented in TCU 's international student body, he added.

'AFTER HOURS' WRITING SERVICES AVAILABLE

Representatives from the AIDS Outreach Center and Senior Citizens' Services spoke to 21 community social workers who attended a fall orientation session for agency-based field instructors Aug. 26 in the Student Center. The social workers, who work with TCU students in their agencies, learned how to prepare those students for their first days in the field.

An earlier orientation session prepared TCU students for field education. During the 1994-95 academic year, 25 TCU seniors majoring in social work will enter field education. Students work some 16 hours per week in one of 17 area social service agencies.

The five already-existing call boxes are solar-powered and expensive to operate, he added. The new phones are wired into the administrative phone system, which make them more affordable.

Each fall he hosts Red Steagall's Cowboy Gathering and Western Swing Festival, which draws about 10,000 people to the Fort Worth Stockyards National Historic District.

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TCU PRESS TO HOST RECEPTION

North Fort Worth will celebrate its history Thursday when the TCU Press and the North Fort Worth Historical Society host a reception in honor of author J'Nell Pate and her new book, North of the River: A Brief History of North Fort Worth. The reception is open to the public and will be held in the Fort Worth Stockyards National Historic District at the Stockyards Museum, located in the Livestock Exchange Building, 131 E. Exchange Ave., from 5 to 7:30 p.m.

Published by TCU Press with a foreword by Bob Schieffer, North of the River begins in 1848, when the York and Gilmore families stopped their covered wagons north of present-day Fort Worth. A century-and-a-half later, the settlement they founded is North Fort Worth, with a colorful history centered around livestock, tourism, and family life. Now incorporated within the city of Fort Worth, the community continues to contribute to the unique atmosphere and history essential to one of Texas' most diverse and fascinating cities.

A Northside native, J'Nell Pate is the author of Livestock Legacy: The Fort Worth Stockyards, 1887-1987. Professor of history at Tarrant County Junior College, she received a Ph.D. from the University of North Texas and is a Fellow of the Texas State Historical Association.

Comments from **Spencer Tucker** (history chair) were included in a Sept. 1 *Star-Telegram* article on the Irish Republican Army's cease fire agreement.

Also on Sept. 1, TCU's football program received attention in a *Star-Telegram* special section and in Southwest Conference football preview articles in the *Dallas Morning News*.

TCU swimmer Walter Soza is currently in Rome, Italy, competing in the World Swimming Championships for his native country, Nicaragua. Walter is competing in the 400-meter individual medley today (Tuesday) and will compete in the 200-meter butterfly and 200-meter individual medley later in the week. In the swimming world, the World Championship meet is second only to the Olympic Games.

Chalice Press just published Out of Mighty Waters, the second book by Darryl Trimiew (Brite). The book is a collection of sermons from African-American ministers of the Christian Church (Disciples of Christ). Anantha Babbili (journalism) was the sole U.S. participant in a recent conference on "Turbulent Europe: Conflict, Identity and Culture," which was organized by the British Film Institute (BFI) and attracted media scholars from around the world. Anantha served as respondent and moderator for a conference panel on "Public Sphere: Religion and Broadcasting." Anantha's research paper, "U.S. Television Representation of Bosnia and Islam," will be included in a book edited by the BFI and published in four languages.

Anantha's research on Hispanic media in the United States was translated into Spanish and was included in a volume published by the Universidad de las Americas-Puebla last month. He also has been invited by the editors of the London-based *Media*, *Culture and Society* journal to be a guest editor for a special issue on post-coloniality and Indian cultural studies.

Gregory Clemons (music) conducted three separate concert bands comprised of more than 300 outstanding high school musicians from 50 states at the University of Kansas' Midwestern Band Camp in July. In addition to his role as the camp's resident conductor, Greg also served as guest conductor for the nationally known Lawrence Civic Band. Greg's other summer activities included working with more than 30 high school band directors from around the state as director of the Band Directors Workshop at TCU's Summer Music Institute, and attending the Texas Bandmasters Association convention in San Antonio. In May, he got a firsthand look at the talents of Texas high school musicians when he served as clinician and judge for the Texas State Solo and Ensemble Contest, which was hosted by the University Interscholastic League.

Roger Rainwater (library) and Robert Seal (University librarian) attended a seminar in special collections management at the Rare Books School of the University of Virginia in Charlottesville July 25-29. Participants included library directors and special collections coordinators from the United States and Great Britain.

Emmet Smith (music), who is serving his third year as president of TCU's chapter of Phi Beta Kappa, represented the chapter at the national Triennial Council in San Francisco in early August. At one of the council meetings, Emmet was asked to share information on the TCU chapter's efficient operations strategies. In 1971, TCU became the third Texas university to be awarded a Phi Beta Kappa chapter.
