HOMECOMING '94: "HATS OFF TO TCU"

"Hats Off to TCU" will be the theme for Homecoming Thursday through Saturday, as alumni, students and friends gather for a weekend of activities. Here's a look at some of the highlights:

The opening event for Homecoming '94 is Thursday night's Alumni Association Awards Dinner. Twelve individuals will be honored for outstanding contributions in their field of endeavor and to TCU. This year's recipients are: Dr. John D. Oswalt, '68; William G. Blackmon Jr., '43; Genevieve Able Blackmon, '44; Dr. Noel R. Bailey; William L. and Betty Adams; Spencer '59 and Marlene Hays; Bryan H. Engram, '57; Lesbia Word Roberts, '31; Kathleen M. Martin, '94 and Jerrol J. Ray, '58. [Editor's note: Please see Page 2 for a related story.]

On Friday, reunion participants may attend the Homecoming luncheon hosted by the Century Club at River Crest Country Club.

Friday's festivities culminate with the Homecoming Parade at 7 p.m. This year's parade has 47 entries from across campus as well as the community. Radio station KPLX will cover the parade in a live broadcast. The parade route begins in Bluebonnet Circle and proceeds down University Drive to the campus. Alumni cheerleaders will participate in the pep rally immediately following the parade. The evening will conclude with a spectacular fireworks display at the stadium. A Homecoming party at Billy Bob's Texas from 10 p.m. to 2 a.m. will feature the rockabilly band Confederate Railroad. Tickets are available for \$5 in the Student Center. Buses will transport the partygoers.

At 8 a.m. Saturday, alumni and students may meet on the steps of the Student Center to participate in a scenic 5K run sponsored by the Student Foundation. Alumni will then gather at 11:30 a.m. for a barbecue at Daniel-Meyer Coliseum. Chancellor Bill Tucker will recognize the 10 reunion classes during a brief program beginning at noon. The traditional Walk of Frogs also begins at noon Saturday in front of Moncrief Hall as the team makes its way to the locker room. The Horned Frogs collide with the Rice Owls at Amon G. Carter Stadium at 2 p.m.. Fun and games in Frog Alley and alumni receptions will precede the game.

To cap the weekend's festivities, there will be a Homecoming party at the Worthington Hotel Saturday night featuring Vince Vance and the Valiants. A reception begins at 8 p.m. followed by dancing at 9 p.m. A Homecoming concert featuring Trim, Jack Ingram and Dah-Veed Garza begins at 8 p.m. at Caravan of Dreams. Tickets are available for \$7 at the Student Center. Buses will run from the campus to downtown Fort Worth throughout the evening.

ALUMNI AWARDS TO BE PRESENTED THURSDAY

Twelve distinguished University leaders will be recognized Thursday as the Alumni Association presents its 40th annual awards, which will be given during the Annual Alumni Awards Dinner at Fort Worth's Rivercrest Country Club. Chancellor Bill Tucker will make the presentations. Master of ceremonies will be Bridget Guthrie Thomas ('68), Alumni Association president.

The following honorees have been selected for their service and gifts to the University:

William L. and Betty Adams of Fort Worth will be presented the Royal Purple Award for their extraordinary service and support, as Fort Worth citizens, to TCU and the community. Mr. Adams, chair of the board for Union Pacific Resources Company, has been a TCU trustee since 1983. Mrs. Adams is a member of the board of directors of the Fort Worth Symphony.

Dr. Noel R. Bailey of Fort Worth is this year's recipient of the **Honorary Alumnus Award**. Now retired, Dr. Bailey was known in Fort Worth for his obstetrics-gynecology practice that he started in the 1940s. Some 74 students have been able to attend TCU because of his scholarship contributions to the University.

William Blackmon Jr. ('43) and wife, Genevieve Able Blackmon ('44), of Fort Worth will receive the Valuable Alumni Award for outstanding and continued service to TCU. Mr. Blackmon joined with former TCU schoolmate Scott Mooring Jr. ('43) to found Blackmon-Mooring Inc. and served as its board chairman. Mrs. Blackmon served as president of the TCU Women Exes.

Bryan Engram ('57) of Dallas will add the Frog O' Fame Award to his already lengthy list of athletic accomplishments. Engram served as captain of TCU's 1955 Southwest Conference championship team that played Mississippi in the Cotton Bowl. The All-SWC first-teamer received the Dan Rogers Award and was drafted by both the National and Canadian football leagues. Today Engram is an independent real estate developer and investor in Dallas.

Spencer ('59) and **Marlene Hays** of Nashville, Tenn., will be honored with the **Founders Award**. Mr. Hays, majority owner of Nashville-based Southwestern/Great American Opportunities Inc., is a TCU trustee. Mr. and Mrs. Hays recently made a large contribution to fund construction of the theatre complex in TCU's new performing arts center. The couple also has established the Southwestern Scholarship Fund for TCU students.

Kathleen M. Martin, who graduated in May with a degree in history and English, will receive the **Distinguished Student Award**. While at TCU, the Oklahoma City resident was a Chancellor's Scholar for five semesters, a Dean's List member for seven semesters and was named outstanding history student in 1994 and outstanding Panhellenic officer in 1993.

Dr. John D. Oswalt ('68), who will receive the Distinguished Alumnus Award, performed the first successful heart transplant in Central Texas in 1986. The Austin resident pioneered the use of the heart valve operation known as the Ross Procedure. The surgeon also led the effort to establish the Austin heart transplant program.

Jerrol J. Ray ('58) of Austin will be given the President's Service Award for his loyal services as past president of the Alumni Association. Ray has been president of the Austin TCU alumni chapter and a member of the Committee of 100. He is president of Family Sports Inc.

Lesbia Word Roberts ('31) of Fort Worth will accept the Alumni Service Award for continuing and outstanding service to the Alumni Association. Ms. Roberts has served as a member of the an Alumni Association board and Friends of the TCU Library, board member and president of the TCU Women's Exes and board member and president of TCU's reunion group, the Quinq Club.

THE NEXT FRONTIER

UPDATE

CU faculty and staff caught a glimpse of the University's Next Frontier at a gala event Oct. 20 that celebrated the kickoff of the campus campaign. Hundreds gathered amid refreshments and music to see the premiere of The Next Frontier logo and a special video featuring trustees, alumni and faculty. Those in attendance also received a copy of *The Next Frontier: A Vision For The Future*, the campaign case statement. This special addition to the *Weekly Bulletin* is the first in a series of updates that will provide insight into the University's fund-raising effort. The timeline below shows how The Next Frontier campaign is the result of years of planning by TCU faculty, staff and students.

HOW THE COMPREHENSIVE CAMPAIGN FOR TCU WAS



1987-The Academic Initiatives

Three University committees identified five priority areas to focus future development: technology (networks and computers), global education, diversity, graduate studies and an engineering program.

1989-The Master Plan

Consultants met with committees and conducted needs assessments to determine future maintenance and physical campus needs. Their recommendations were adopted as general guidelines for how the campus might develop over the next decade and beyond.

1992—Defining TCU's Character

More than 100 faculty, staff and students met in groups to help identify what makes TCU distinctive. It was found that the values governing the life and work of the University are ideals which were nurtured on the plains and prairies of the American frontier.

1992—The Campaign

More than 70 TCU donors and friends participated in a study to determine the feasibility of a major fundraising campaign to help this University—founded

on the American frontier—shape its next frontier. A goal was ultimately set at \$100 million to be raised over five years.

1994—Campus Campaign Committee

Members from all segments of the University continue to help focus the campus community on the future, involve people in discussions related to future priorities and conduct an on-campus campaign. The committee recommended a series of communications initiatives and a campus goal of \$1.5 million to be raised over five years, half of which is already in hand.

WALSH COMPLEX TO BE DEDICATED

The Walsh Complex, a new weight training and rehabilitation center named in honor of TCU benefactors F. Howard and Mary D. Walsh, will be dedicated Saturday in outdoor ceremonies led by Chancellor Bill Tucker. Ground was broken for the state-of-the-art facility in early 1994.

Located at the south end of Amon G. Carter Stadium, the Walsh Complex doubles the space available for weight and strength training, injury rehabilitation and education of professional athletic trainers. The complex includes a 7,200-square-foot weight and conditioning area and an expanded athletic training facility, including rehabilitation, treatment and examination rooms. Also included in the construction/remodeling effort were a new women's basketball complex, an expanded equipment room and storage area, and refurbished football dressing rooms. The centerpiece of the new facility's entrance is a plaque listing 100 individuals who made donations to the project before Oct. 1.

The Walshes also recently gave the University \$3.5 million for construction of a new performing arts center, the largest gift given for the \$11 million facility. Groundbreaking for the F. Howard and Mary D. Walsh Center for Performing Arts at Texas Christian University could take place during the 1995-96 academic year or sooner.

HOOPS MANIA TO FEATURE ACTION, GIVEAWAYS

The TCU men and women's basketball teams will be slamming and jamming their way into a new era of athletic prowess with the presentation of Hoops Mania tonight (Tuesday) at 8 p.m. in Daniel-Meyer Coliseum.

As many as 1,000 are expected to attend this free public event, which will feature the community's first glimpse of new head coach Billy Tubbs. Participants also will see the new additions that second-year women's head coach Shell Robinson has made for the up-and-coming women's basketball program.

Additionally, indoor fireworks, a slam dunk competition, a 3-on-3 basketball game and 3-point shooting contests are scheduled. Outdoors, fans will dance to live music, participate in interactive basketball booths or climb into a Space Walk and bounce around all evening.

Hoops Mania will give away more prizes than any single TCU student event this year. Among the giveaways will be airline tickets, T-shirts, gift certificates to local restaurants, music CDs and cassettes, basketball posters, movie posters and passes, official TCU Hoops Mania basketballs, food and drinks.

EDUCATION SCHOOL SERVES AS BETA SITE

TCU's School of Education is serving as a beta site for a video project sponsored jointly by the Harvard-Smithsonian Center for Astrophysics.

The Private Universe project, which will utilize input from TCU education students and educators from across the Fort Worth Independent School District, will become a six-part professional development series for teachers. Educators and students will preview taped raw footage at the TAGER-TV studios and send their comments back to Harvard. That feedback will then be used in the editing process for the final series. Groups began watching the footage on Oct. 17. The project will continue through December.

The Private Universe Project is a video series used with teachers to explore students' conceptions about the natural world. It is believed that those conceptions, which arise from the child's natural curiosity and intelligence, could block further learning when they differ from accepted scientific views. Dale Young in the School of Education is coordinating the project.

TRUMPET SERIES BEGINS TOMORROW

A TCU series of trumpet master classes, concerts and recitals by an impressive list of musicians and educators will begin tomorrow (Wednesday) with a free master class/recital by Keith Johnson, Regent's Professor of Trumpet at the University of North Texas. Johnson is a nationally known clinician, soloist and teacher and is the author of several trumpet books. The concert will begin at 7 p.m. in Moudy 141 N.

The series, hosted by Steve Weger, principal trumpet for the Fort Worth Symphony Orchestra and TCU professor of trumpet, also will include a free Nov. 2 performance in Moudy 141 N. by Jonathan Fields, second trumpet for the Fort Worth Symphony. The concert will begin at 7 p.m.

Fields, a new Fort Worth resident, is the 1993 winner of the Toulon International Trumpet Competition in France and 1990 winner of the International Trumpet Guild Solo Competition. In early December, he will compete as a finalist in the Ellsworth Smith International Trumpet Competition in Columbus, Ohio. At TCU, Fields will perform some of the pieces he will play in that competition. The program will include Neruda's Concerto in E Flat Major for Trumpet and Orchestra, Desenclos' "Incantation, Threne et Danse," Fasch's Concerto in D Major for Trumpet and Orchestra and Bellstedt's "La Mandolinata."

John Daniel, professor of trumpet at Pennsylvania State University, will conduct the second master class in the series on Nov. 16 at 7 p.m. in Moudy 141 N. Armando Ghitalla, former principal trumpet for the Boston Symphony Orchestra, will follow up a three-day residency at TCU with a performance with the TCU Wind Symphony on March 27. Clark Terry, world-renowned jazz trumpet artist, will conduct a master class on March 31 and will be a featured guest with famed drummer Louis Bellson and the TCU Jazz Ensemble at the 18th Annual TCU Jazz Festival March 31 and April 1.
