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\$1 MILLION KIMBELL GRANT TO ENDOW ART HISTORY CHAIR

The Kimbell Art Foundation has awarded a \$1 million grant to TCU to fund the Kay and Velma Kimbell Chair of Art History within the College of Fine Arts and Communication. The grant to establish the endowed faculty chair in the Department of Art and Art History was announced by Chancellor Bill Tucker.

"My colleagues and I are deeply grateful to the Board of Directors of the Kimbell Art Foundation for their expression of confidence in the University. We shall count it a special privilege to honor the trust placed in us," Dr. Tucker said.

The endowment marks the beginning of a three-phase plan to expand the undergraduate art history program and to create a graduate program. Development of a course of study leading to a doctoral degree is a long-term goal.

"The Kimbell Art Foundation grant will provide the opportunity to enhance our current strong program in art history," said Dean Bob Garwell of the College of Fine Arts and Communication. "Furthermore, our future graduate program in art history and museum studies will have special distinction in the United States, given the wonderful resources of the Kimbell and the other outstanding art museums in Fort Worth."

Mrs. Ben J. Fortson, president of the Board of Directors of the Kimbell Art Foundation, said the grant offers "a wonderful opportunity for the Foundation, for TCU and for the community. I feel that in 10 years TCU will have not only one of the best art history departments in the state of Texas, but one of the most popular as well."

The Kimbell Art Museum, which is owned and operated by the Kimbell Art Foundation, is renowned for its extraordinary permanent collection and its ability to attract world-class exhibits. In the years since its opening in 1972, TCU art and art history students have benefited from the museum. Regularly scheduled classes and field trips have been conducted to take advantage of loan exhibits and symposia as well as the Kimbell's outstanding art collection, which includes individual masterworks from Asia and Europe as well as Africa and ancient Mesoamerica.

Construction of the Kimbell Art Museum and subsequent artwork acquisitions were made possible by gifts from the late Kay and Velma Kimbell. The Kimbells made their first art acquisitions in the 1930s and a short time later established the Kimbell Art Foundation with Dr. and Mrs. Coleman Carter to promote the appreciation and understanding of art. Mr. Kimbell, who died in 1964, left his entire estate to the Kimbell Art Foundation. His wife, Velma, later donated her portion of the couple's community property to expedite the realization of Mr. Kimbell's desire "to build a museum of the first class in the city of Fort Worth."

FEGHALI TO PERFORM NOV. 14 AT TCU

José Feghali, an internationally recognized pianist and TCU's artist-in-residence, will perform a free recital Nov. 14 at 7:30 p.m. in Ed Landreth Auditorium. The recital is open to the public.

The 1985 Van Cliburn International Piano Competition gold medalist appears regularly at major concert halls in London, Munich, Frankfurt, Madrid, Amsterdam, in his native Brazil, and at recital venues closer to home, including the Morton Meyerson Symphony Center, Carnegie Hall and the Kennedy Center. José also keeps busy with a heavy schedule of master classes and lectures.

SOLOMONS TO EXPLORE ARCHITECTURE OF MOVEMENT

A degree in architecture seems an unlikely starting place for a career in dance, but like the many facets of his professional life, dancer Gus Solomons jr manages to blend them flawlessly.

The lean, energetic dancer says he devoted a short six months to interior design after earning a bachelor's degree from M.I.T. some 30 years ago. The remaining years have been devoted to his special brand of postmodern dance, which he will bring to Ed Landreth Auditorium Nov. 18 and 19 for three Contemporary Dance/Fort Worth performances. Also performing will be the Sharir Dance Company of Austin.

The similarities between architecture and dance seem obvious to the New Yorker. "Everything about them is the same, except for time; time in architecture is fixed," he says. "All the structural principles, proportions and rhythms are the same."

Recently, Solomons says his choreographic sense has "moved from being more visual to being more kinetic. I'm now more interested in texture of movement than in the visual picture."

As he did this summer and in 1991, Solomons will teach a TCU dance residency prior to his performances. To accomplish this, he'll take a break from his role as a dance instructor at New York University, an adjunct position that recently became full-time. In his "spare" time, he's also a regular dance critic for the *Village Voice* and *Dance Magazine*.

SPEAKER WRIGHT TO BE HONORED

Forty years ago this month, retired Speaker of the House Jim Wright celebrated his first election to the U.S. Congress. This Friday, Wright will be guest of honor during an invitation-only program and reception in the Mary Coutts Burnett Library.

Guests at the program may view portions of the library's Jim Wright Collection, a major research work that chronicles Wright's congressional career. The event also marks the opening of an exhibit of materials on Wright's first campaign.

Another special display to be shown will be a unique North Texas map featuring Wright's "footprints" of accomplishments in the region during his 34-year congressional career.

Wright will comment on his 1954 campaign in a brief discussion. Also scheduled to speak are Chancellor Bill Tucker; Colleen Stewart, president of Friends of the TCU Library; and Robert Seal, university librarian. Guests include members of Friends of the TCU Library, campaign workers from Wright's 1954 election team, Wright's friends and colleagues and TCU faculty and administrators.

One of the highlights of the evening will be the presentation of a limited edition Boehm Patriot Eagle sculpture donated to the Friends of the TCU Library by Jack and Robbie Wilson of Fort Worth. Wilson is a past president of the Friends of the TCU Library.

'THE DIVINERS' WILL PLUMB UNUSUAL RELATIONSHIP

TCU student actors will unravel the story of a disturbed young man and his relationship with a disenchanted preacher Nov. 16-20 in the University Theatre.

Performances of James Leonard Jr.'s award-winning play, "The Diviners," are at 8 p.m. Nov. 16-19 and at 2 p.m. on Nov. 20. The production is directed by TCU theatre faculty member Steven Breese, who says the play imparts "new perspectives, fresh insights and greater understanding of our neighbors and ourselves."

Set in a small southern Indiana town during the 1930s, "The Diviners" tells the story of an ex-preacher who comes to town intent on pursuing a career as a mechanic. The man develops a friendship with his new employer's son, a young boy who is deathly afraid of water but has an uncanny sense of divining for it. The townspeople push the man to continue preaching and when he conducts a "baptism," the play takes a tragic turn.
