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## **DUO TO DISCUSS 'LOVE, WAR AND RUNNING FOR PRESIDENT'**

Perhaps the second most well-known working political couple in America—Bill Clinton's chief campaign strategist James Carville and Mary Matalin, campaign political director for George Bush—spent a large part of 1992 in love with each other and at war with each other's causes during the presidential campaign.

Sunday (Dec. 4) they are coming to the Fort Worth Speakers Forum to provide political insights into the recent elections and their own insider views of the 1992 presidential campaign.

The Fort Worth Speakers Forum, sponsored by Bank One Texas, the *Fort Worth Star-Telegram* and TCU, will be held at 7:30 p.m. at Casa Mañana. Tickets are \$20 each at all Ticketmaster locations, or by calling the Ticketmaster office at metro (214) 647-5700, or the Casa Mañana Season Ticket Hotline at (817) 332-2272.

The couple's new best-seller book, *All's Fair: Love, War and Running for President*, has been on *The New York Times* best-seller list for the last eight weeks, and is currently listed at No. 15. In their book, Carville and Matalin offer an immensely entertaining "he said/she said" look at what it was like running opposing presidential campaigns while maintaining an intense personal relationship.

Carville is a founding partner of the political consulting firm Carville & Begala, which specializes in strategy, message development, "earned media" and winning elections for Democrats. He is currently a consultant to the Democratic National Committee, serving as a senior political advisor to the President.

Matalin is the host of CNBC's Washington-based talk show, "Equal Time" and the political commentator for NBC's "Today Show." She has had a long career working for the Republican National Committee and held key positions in Bush's campaigns in 1988 and 1992. In 1992, Bush named her the deputy campaign manager for political operations.

## **CONFERENCE TO EXAMINE MEDIA COVERAGE OF SEX CRIMES**

The ethical and legal problems faced by news media covering sex crimes will be examined at a national conference sponsored by the TCU journalism department Friday and Saturday.

Patricia Bowman, a Florida woman whose rape charge against William Kennedy Smith led to some of the century's most controversial rape coverage, will be among the speakers. The conference, "Sex in the Media: The Public's Right to Know vs. the Victim's Right to Privacy" also will feature specialists in media law and ethics, sex crime coverage and victimology.

The conference will be held at the Radisson Plaza Hotel in downtown Fort Worth and is free and open to the public. Conference hours are 7 to 9 p.m. on Friday and 8:30 a.m. to 4 p.m. on Saturday.

The conference was funded by a \$25,000 grant from the M.G. O'Neil Foundation. It is being directed by Paul LaRocque and Tommy Thomason, TCU journalism faculty members who have researched and written about media treatment of crime victims for nearly 20 years. TCU's journalism department was host to the first national victim-media conference in 1986.

"The right of the victim to privacy and the First Amendment rights of the news media sometimes seem to clash," Tommy said. "We hope this national conference will help foster understanding of those rights."

Research findings from two national surveys of rape coverage — one of daily newspapers and one of television news shows in every major market — will be presented at the conference. The surveys were conducted and interpreted by Tommy, Paul and fellow journalism faculty member Maggie Thomas. For more information on the conference, call the journalism department at Ext. 7425.

## **FACULTY SENATE MEETING SCHEDULED**

Faculty members have been asked to fill out a form detailing what each course is about, how many tests are given, projects to be done in the class and other pertinent information. The Student House of Representatives will help compile the information for students to use when selecting courses.

All University faculty and staff are invited to attend Faculty Senate meetings. Recent Senate topics have included the budget process and retirement issues. Meetings are scheduled for Feb. 2, March 2, April 6 and May 4.

## **BOLDLY GOING... WHERE NO FROG HAS GONE BEFORE**

A silver horned frog figure taken on the September 1994 mission of the Space Shuttle Endeavour will be presented to TCU geologists Art Busbey and Ken Morgan today (Tuesday) during a 3 p.m. public ceremony in Sid Richardson Lecture Hall 4. NASA Mission Trainer Ned Fleming (Class of '78) and Endeavour astronaut Tom Jones will make the presentation.

The figure is symbolic of a newly forged land-mapping partnership between NASA and TCU's geology department and the University's Center for Remote Sensing and Energy Research. Mission specialists use special radar systems to map Earth. The TCU team analyzes the data, identifying geological faults and fractures, studying rock types and looking at erosion areas.

"We take an image from Earth, make it sharper and clearer, and try to identify certain things," Ken said. "Using shuttle imagery, we can map virtually anything on Earth's surface and use it for exploration, pollution studies and many other purposes."

## **MUSICAL TALENT TO SHINE IN TWO CONCERTS**

The vocal and instrumental talents of TCU faculty members and students will shine in two early December performances in Ed Landreth Auditorium. Both concerts begin at 7:30 p.m. and are free and open to the public.

On Dec. 4, more than 200 voices and instruments will fill the auditorium with Francis Poulenc's "Gloria" and other seasonal music in a performance by the TCU Choral Union and the TCU Orchestra. On the next night, the TCU Wind Symphony and TCU faculty member and tenor soloist Richard Estes will present a program of opera arias, Neapolitan songs and selections from the wind band repertoire.
