#### WINTER COMMENCEMENT SCHEDULED FOR SATURDAY

As another semester reaches its conclusion, members of the Texas Christian University winter class of 1994 are preparing to receive their diplomas during the Dec. 17 baccalaureate-commencement at Daniel-Meyer Coliseum. Many of the approximately 420 degree-eligible graduate and undergraduate students will participate in the ceremony. Chancellor Bill Tucker will preside over the event. The call to worship and benediction will be given by University Minister John Butler, who will also lead the litany of thanksgiving. Hymns will be led by music faculty member Richard Estes.

Prior to commencement, the December graduates and their families will be honored by the University at a reception in the Student Center ballroom from 1:30 to 2:30 p.m. An outdoor carillon recital will be given from the tower of Robert Carr Chapel by Emmet G. Smith, Herndon Professor of Music, from 2:30 to 3 p.m.

The afternoon's events also will include the presentation of the T.A. Abbott Award for Faculty Excellence to Mildred Hogstel, TCU's first Abell-Hanger Professor of Gerontological Nursing. Bob Frye of English also will be recognized as Piper Professor of 1994.

Provost/Vice Chancellor Bill Koehler will present the Deans' Teaching Awards to three faculty members. Award recipients are chosen by their schools and recommended by their deans. This year's nominees include Marjorie D. Lewis, English; Rhonda L. Hatcher, mathematics; Linda S. Moore, social work; James O. Duke, Brite; Robert L. Vigeland, accounting; Gail Gear, art and art history; Jack Raskopf, journalism; and Danna E. Strength, nursing.

Others participating in commencement include chief marshal Anantha Babbili, associate marshal James Henley, assistant marshals Toni Craven and Ronald Flowers, faculty marshals Robert Doran, Arturo Flores, Sally Fortenberry and Carolyn Durham, student marshals Al Mladenka, Morrison Wong, Nowell Donovan and Carol Stephenson, and flag bearers David Vanderwerken and Edward McNertney.

Commencement begins at 3:30 p.m. Graduates and marshals will line up at 2:45 p.m. and other faculty and staff at 3 p.m. in the north concourse of the coliseum.

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# EMPLOYEE TO DISPLAY ORNAMENT ON WHITE HOUSE TREE

Although Hillary Clinton picked Ralph Lauren designs for the White House's Christmas decorations this year, the Christmas tree will be adorned with original ornaments submitted by people like Armida Guzman, executive assistant for Addran College of Arts and Sciences.

Armida was selected to make an ornament of two turtle doves in conjunction with this year's White House Christmas theme, "The Twelve Days of Christmas." She is a longtime member of the National Society of Decorative Painting, which was asked to decorate the White House tree with 550 ornaments.

Armida, who is president of the society's 100-member Fort Worth chapter, was one of five chapter members asked to submit an ornament for the tree. She already has a silver-leafed tin angel ornament on display at the Smithsonian Institution. Her decoration for the White House tree is a bisque porcelain, Victorian-style ornament of two white turtle doves on a bed of 14-karat gold-leafed holly with a pastel pink background.

In the past, the society has decorated six Christmas trees in the Smithsonian and the Christmas tree across the street from the White House.

All ornaments for the White House tree must be no more than 5 inches long, weigh no more than 8 ounces and be pastel, gold or silver-leafed, Armida said. Each ornament will be on permanent display at the White House after the tree is taken down.

# JOURNALISM FACULTY DISCUSS RESEARCH RESULTS

Media market size and the gender of decision makers seem to influence newspaper and television executives in making decisions on whether to identify rape victims, say three Texas Christian University researchers.

Two national surveys of U.S. daily newspapers and television stations conducted by journalism faculty members Tommy Thomason, Paul LaRocque and Maggie Thomas indicate that male TV news directors and female newspaper editors are less likely to make public the names of rape victims than female news directors and male newspaper editors. Large-circulation newspapers and TV stations in the top 50 markets also are less likely to identify rape victims than those in smaller markets.

Most editors and news directors surveyed say they routinely do not identify rape victims. Even when the victim is well-known, less than 5 percent of the editors and directors say they would identify the victim. The surveys were sent to 557 television stations in some 209 ADI (Area of Dominant Influence) markets and 1,570 daily newspapers nationwide.

The results were discussed at a national conference examining the ethical and legal problems faced by news media covering sex crimes. "Sex in the Media: The Public's Right to Know vs. the Victim's Right to Privacy" was held at the Radisson Plaza Hotel in downtown Fort Worth Dec. 2 and 3. The conference, sponsored by the TCU journalism department and directed by Tommy and Paul, was attended by attorneys, victim's rights advocates, journalists and others.

Patricia Bowman, a Florida woman whose rape charge against William Kennedy Smith led to some of the century's most controversial rape coverage, was among the speakers. The conference also featured specialists in media law and ethics, sex crime coverage and victimology.

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#### CHRISTMAS BREAK DATES REMINDER

The University will be closed for Christmas break at the end of the workday on Dec. 23 and will reopen on Jan. 3.

From Dec. 26 to Dec. 31, the University will remain open on a limited basis. Only essential personnel as defined by the chancellor and vice chancellors will be required to work during this period.

The University's seven officially recognized holidays include: New Year's Day, Martin Luther King Jr. Day, Good Friday, Independence Day, Labor Day, Thanksgiving Day and Christmas Day. According to University policy, if any of these days fall on a Saturday, the Friday before is considered a holiday. If the day falls on a Sunday, the following Monday (for example, Jan. 2, 1995) is considered a holiday.

#### STEWART RECEIVES ACHIEVER AWARD

Chief of Campus Police Oscar Stewart was recognized as a recipient of the YMCA Minority Achiever's Award for 1994 at a banquet held Nov. 16 at the Worthington Hotel. The award is given to an employee of a company sponsoring YMCA programs. The minority achiever, nominated by their company, serves as a mentor for minority youth during the school year.

The YMCA Minority Achievers program, started in 1991, is designed to honor the accomplishments of minority men and women and challenge minority youth to reach the same high goals. The recipients participate in career workshops for youth and give business tours to help combat the cycle of poverty, low scholastic achievement, violence, drug abuse and crime.

"I believe they (the YMCA) do a lot to help support the development of young people," he said. "My daughters have been involved, and they've encouraged me to stay involved."

Oscar is a volunteer for the Juvenile Center, a member of the Ambassadors Club of Fort Worth (a community service organization of African-American men), first vice president for the Texas/New Mexico Police Association and deacon for the Strangers Rest Baptist Church.

#### **AUTOMOBILE EMISSIONS TESTING TO BEGIN**

Beginning in January 1995, the Federal Clean Air Act will require emissions testing for all gasoline-powered vehicles (1968 or newer cars and trucks) registered in Tarrant, Dallas, Denton and Collin counties. Testing will take place at 25 facilities located throughout the Metroplex. All vehicles must pass the emissions test before license plates are renewed.

The emissions test is required every other year and does not replace your annual safety inspection. Odd-year model vehicles (such as 1973 or 1985) will be tested in odd years. Even-year models must be tested in even years. The cost of testing is \$21, payable by cash or credit card.

If your vehicle does not pass the test, it needs to be repaired. If it continues to fail the test, waivers are available after emission-related repair costs meet certain limits. For more information, contact the Texas Air Care Hotline at 1-800-460-1200 or TCU's Safety Office at Ext. 7220.

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# KOVÁCS WINS SHREVEPORT PIANO COMPETITION

TCU football players and fans aren't the only ones who have Shreveport on their minds. Kriszta Kovács had Shreveport's Nena Wideman Piano Competition on her mind long before TCU's Independence Bowl date was set. Kriszta was awarded first prize at the competition for her performance of the Tchaikovsky Concerto No. 1 in B flat, Op. 23. She competed against more than 40 contestants from numerous U.S. universities and several nations.

The competition, which was Dec. 2-4, is the longest continuous competition of its kind in the United States. Kriszta was rewarded with a \$2,500 cash prize and a chance to perform with the Shreveport Symphony Orchestra in 1995.

On Sept. 16, Kriszta won third place honors in the First China International Piano Competition in Beijing, China. Kriszta, who is working on her Artist Diploma at TCU under the tutelage of Tamás Ungár, said she dreams of becoming a successful performing artist.

Other students who participated in the Shreveport competition were Xia-Bo Chen, Magdalena Grzelak, Pang Bo and Ilonka Rus. TCU had more contestants participating in the contest than any other university.

#### **GRADUATE DIES IN AUSTIN**

Dr. Lewis W. Mondy (Class of '62) died Dec. 3 in Austin at age 55. Funeral services were held Dec. 6 at the First English Lutheran Church in Austin.

The Dr. Lewis W. Mondy Scholarship Fund — part of TCU's middle-income scholarship program — was established this fall. The fund already has already received some \$20,000 in gifts and pledges.

Dr. Mondy received his bachelor of psychology degree from TCU and his Ph.D. degree in clinical psychology from Northwestern University. He later served as associate professor in the maternal health and family planning division at the University of Texas Southwestern Medical Center at Dallas. He then became administrator in the family planning division of the Texas Department of Human Services.

He was a recent recipient of the Irvin W. Cushner Award, which is given to individuals from the family planning community who have demonstrated commitment and leadership over many years. He was vice president of the Texas Family Planning Association.
