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NEW TCU PROARTS BOARD TO OFFER GUIDANCE, ADVOCACY TO FINE ARTS

Several arts patrons and interested and influential friends of the University have been asked to join a new board designed to promote the achievements and advancements of the fine arts at TCU. The select group will hold its first meetings Feb. 10-11.

The new board's charges include:

- Serving as advisors to the Dean of Fine Arts and Communication on strategic planning, marketing and philanthropic issues;
- Becoming knowledgeable and informed advocates of the fine arts at TCU;
- Increasing public awareness of the quality and breadth of fine arts at TCU and their importance to the Fort Worth community; and
- Helping the College of Fine Arts and Communication secure the financial resources it requires to achieve its goals by helping to identify and cultivate the interest of individuals and organizations capable of supporting the fine arts at TCU.

"The ProArts Board comprises a talented group of individuals who have done much to foster the excellence of the arts in our community as well as at TCU," said Dean Bob Garwell of the School of Fine Arts and Communication. "With the advice, counsel and support of the board, the future of the arts at TCU will shine even brighter and further."

Dean Garwell asked Ron Moore, Class of '65, to chair the board. The two in turn asked prominent friends of the institution and active supporters of the fine arts to serve two-year terms on the board. At press time, 17 had agreed to participate. The number will increase to 30 over the next two years, Dean Garwell said. Board terms will be staggered and members may be reappointed for a maximum of three consecutive terms. A complete list of board members will be listed in an upcoming issue of the *Weekly Bulletin*.

Bujones, who has been called "the greatest American male dancer of his generation," has performed with some of the world's finest ballet companies and has partnered some of the most accomplished ballerinas of the 20th century. He will work with TCU students and present advanced master classes that are open for public viewing Feb. 2-3. On Feb. 4, he will be interviewed by alumna Sharon Benge, arts writer and co-host of WRR's "Art Matters," when they present "An Artist's View on Ballet: An Informal Exchange" from 6 to 7:30 p.m. in Moudy Building 141N.

Master classes will be 9:30 to 11 a.m. on Feb. 2 and 10 to 11:30 a.m. on Feb. 3. Both classes will be in Studio B of the Ballet and Modern Dance Building. TCU MINISTERS WEEK BEGINS FEB. 6

Dr. Eugene Lowry, an educator, minister, author and professional jazz pianist, will be the Wells Preacher for TCU Ministers Week Feb. 6-9.

Ministers Week, an annual event that attracts Disciples from all over the United States, features a variety of lectures, sermons and workshops designed to foster reflection, celebration and learning. Evening worship services and main lectures will take place in the sanctuary at University Christian Church (UCC) during the four-day event.

The Wells Preacher, Dr. Lowry, is William K. McElvaney Professor of Preaching at Saint Paul School of Theology in Kansas City, Mo., and served as preacher/lecturer for the second Granville T. Walker Preaching Festival at TCU/UCC last fall. He will explore the theme "Claimed and Named . . . Again" in sermons that will be given during 8 p.m. worship services at UCC Feb. 6, 7 and 8.

The McFadin Lectures will be delivered by Dr. William Paulsell, senior minister of North Christian Church in Columbus, Ind., and former president of Lexington Theological Seminary. The Scott Lectures will be given by Dr. Justo Gonzalez, an ordained United Methodist elder and prolific writer who has taught at the Evangelical Seminary of Puerto Rico, Candler School of Theology at Emory University and Columbia Theological Seminary.

Several Brite faculty members will offer their viewpoints and expertise during Ministers Week. They include: the Rev. Stephen Sprinkle, who will speak at the Brite Divinity School Luncheon on Feb. 7; Toni Craven, who will speak at the TCU Luncheon on Feb. 9; Gene Boring, Briscoe Professor of New Testament, who will present a workshop, "The New Interpreter's Bible: Matthew," on Feb. 7; and the Rev. Rebekah Miles, who will present a workshop, "Feminist Models of God: Who is God and What Difference Does it Make?" on Feb. 8.

KATHLEEN MARTIN APPOINTED FIRST HOLDER OF WILLIAM AND BETTY F. ADAMS CHAIR OF EDUCATION

Kathleen Martin, associate dean of the School of Education, has become the first member of the School of Education to be appointed holder of the William and Betty F. Adams Chair of Education. The appointment will become effective beginning with the 1995 fall semester.

Kathleen is a graduate of Notre Dame College in St. Louis. She earned her master's degree in education from Tulane University in New Orleans and completed her Ph.D. in curriculum and instruction at the University of Texas at Austin. She has been at TCU since 1985.

Kathleen has received numerous grants in support of her work and several of her projects have been designated as exemplary — statewide as well as nationally. They have involved innovative methods of teaching mathematics and science to children.

The chair, which is TCU's first named chair in education, was endowed in 1993 through a charitable lead trust by William L. and Betty Ann Froehlich Adams. Mr. Adams, a member of the board of trustees, has been honored by TCU with the Corporate Partnership and Honorary Alumnus awards and the William L. Adams Writing Center, which bears his name.

STUDENTS EXPLORE THE TRUE ART OF FILM

The art and art history and radio/TV/film departments, in a conjunction with the University's programming council, have developed a film series to explore the various forms of art that appear in movies. The series debuted last Thursday with a screening of 1979's *All That Jazz*.

David Whillock, professor of radio/TV/film, along with art and art history chair Ron Watson, came up with the idea to bring to light some of the movie subtleties that most people miss. Prior to each film, David will give a short introduction on points of interest that will occur during the movie.

"We want to educate students on some of the more subtle aspects of art that appear in movies," said Ron. "There are a lot of excellent films that deal with some gorgeous cinematic and other forms of art. However, most people don't look for these things; they are more concerned with the glitz and glamour of the movies. By offering this series, we hope to educate attendees on the sometimes overlooked aspects of movie-watching."

The film series will continue with a different film being shown every two weeks through April 20. The next showing on Feb. 2 will be *Camille Claudel*, a 1989 film about the relationship between legendary sculptor Auguste Rodin, best known for "The Thinker," and Claudel, one of his students. Their relationship has been called one of the most important collaborations in the history of modern art.

All films scheduled for review belong to the University's Tandy Film Collection. Admission is free and the screenings begin promptly at 7 p.m. in Moudy Building 164S. For more information, call Shawn Shepherd or Amy Gafford at Ext. 7927.

TCU IN THE NEWS

The men's basketball team continues to receive extensive media coverage. Center **Kurt Thomas** is featured in this week's *Sports Illustrated*. Kurt is in position to become only the third player in NCAA division I-A history to lead the nation in both scoring and rebounding. Kurt currently leads the nation in rebounding — averaging 13.8 boards per game — and ranks second in scoring at 27.9 points per game.

Even though football season is over, the football team is in the news once again. Senior wide receiver **Jimmy Oliver** and defensive tackle **Royal West** participated in the Hula Bowl all-star game as members of the West squad. The game, which featured some of the nation's top senior players, was played in Honolulu over the weekend. Their teammate, center **Barret Robbins**, was also back on the field. He was as a member of the South team in another all-star game, the Senior Bowl, which was played in Mobile on Saturday. Both games were televised on ESPN.

Teammate, small forward **Michael Thoele**, who is the team's third leading scorer, was featured in the Thursday *Fort Worth Star-Telegram's* TCU Extra page. The article described the success Michael is having on the court. Last year he averaged 1.7 points per game for the season. This year, his average has climbed to 13.8 points per game on 48 percent shooting from the field and an impressive 46 percent from behind the three-point line.

Also included on the Extra page were brief profiles on freshman forward/center **Chris Richards**, who ranks third on the team in field goal percentage, and freshman forward **Stacy Price**, who leads the women's team in rebounding and blocked shots.

An article by **Janet Pummill** (music) and a photo of Janet and one of her group keyboard classes were featured in the November 1994 issue of *SoundTree*, a newsletter produced by the Korg USA music technology company. In the article, Janet discusses how installation of the SoundTree Concert Piano Learning System lab, which includes 13 Korg digital pianos and eight Apple Macintosh computers, has changed group keyboard pedagogy at TCU.
