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# ANCHORMAN SCHEDULED TO SPEAK ON TCU CAMPUS

"CBS Evening News" anchor Dan Rather will share a wealth of reporting experience and his iconoclastic style with local audiences when he delivers a free, public lecture on the TCU campus Feb. 13.

In his talk, "Journalism Today and Tomorrow," Rather will discuss the standards, ethics and tradition of quality reporting and what quality means in news. The lecture will be held in Moudy Building 141N. His address is tentatively scheduled to begin at 8 p.m.

While at TCU, Rather also will talk with TCU radio/television/film and broadcast journalism students and is scheduled to do his nightly newscast from Fort Worth. CBS is considering using the press box of TCU's Amon G. Carter Stadium as the site for the live broadcast. The campus or downtown Fort Worth would be the background for the broadcast.

As a guest of the radio/television/film department, Rather holds an appointment as a visiting Green Honors Professor. The Green Honors program brings an impressive array of scholars to the campus each year for public presentations and interaction with faculty members and students.

A Texas native, Rather has interviewed every U.S. president from Dwight Eisenhower to Bill Clinton and international leaders as diverse as Nelson Mandela and Boris Yeltsin. In 1990, he was the first American journalist to interview Saddam Hussein after Iraq's invasion of Kuwait.

Since he joined CBS News in 1962 as chief of the Southwest Bureau in Dallas, Rather has contributed to a variety of "firsts" in broadcast journalism. After serving as anchor and managing editor of "CBS Evening News with Dan Rather" for 12 years, he was joined by co-anchor Connie Chung, making them the first co-anchors on a CBS national evening news program. Rather also anchors and reports for the CBS News Broadcast "48 Hours," making him the first network journalist ever to anchor an evening news broadcast and a primetime news program at the same time.

Seating for the public lecture on Feb. 13 is on a first-come, first-served basis, so early arrival is advised. The lecture also will be shown on screens and large-screen televisions in overflow seating areas in the Moudy Building The 8 p.m. start time of Rather's address is subject to change because of his newscast earlier in the evening.

# GREEN HONORS PROFESSORS TO TEACH CLASSES

Two health care professionals — Susan Calvert Finn, Ph.D., and Anne Davis, Ph.D. — will deliver presentations and work with students and faculty members as visiting Green Honors Professors next week.

Dr. Finn, a highly acclaimed speaker on the issues of nutrition support and women's health, will teach nutrition and dietetics majors about women's health issues in the '90s. She also will speak to community and dietetics professionals in conjunction with the Fort Worth Dietetic Association on Feb. 15 at 7 p.m. in Room 134 of Dan Rogers Hall.

Dr. Finn is director of nutrition/professional services for Ross Laboratories in Columbus, Ohio, and was the 1992-93 president of the American Dietetic Association, the world's largest organization of food and nutrition professionals. While at Ross Labs, Dr. Finn has been proactive in the promotion of healthcare for the elderly in America. She has given more than 800 major presentations and keynote addresses at state nutrition, dietetic and medical associations and has appeared on "The Today Show" and "Good Morning America."

Dr. Davis, a registered nurse who recently retired from the University of California at San Francisco, will discuss current issues in ethical decision-making by nurses on Feb. 13 from 5 to 6:30 p.m. in Dan Rogers Auditorium.

Dr. Davis has written numerous articles and books on ethics. Her work, *Ethical Dilemmas and Nursing Practice*, is in its third edition. She has made presentations and explored ethical issues in Canada, Japan, Australia, Norway, Columbia and China.

Dr. Davis received her B.S. in nursing from Emory University and her Ph.D. in higher education and social psychology from the University of California at Berkeley. She has been granted fellowships from the World Health Organization for study in Ghana and Kenya and by the Joseph P. Kennedy Foundation for study in bioethics.

# FEB. 13 CONCERT TO FEATURE RETIRING FACULTY MEMBERS

Two longtime music faculty members who will end their TCU teaching careers this year will perform a free concert in Robert Carr Chapel on Feb. 13. The concert will begin at 7:30 p.m.

Audiences will enjoy David Graham on recorder and Emmet Smith on organ, accompanied by music faculty member Judith Solomon and emeritus music faculty member Harriet Risk Woldt on viola de gamba.

A TCU graduate, David began his professional association with the University in 1950 when he joined the adjunct faculty to teach clarinet. He played for many years as a clarinetist in both the Fort Worth Opera and the Fort Worth Symphony Orchestras and has regularly presented recorder recitals since the mid-1970s. At TCU, he is perhaps best known as a teacher of musicology and music literature since 1967.

Herndon Professor of Music Emmet Smith also began his association with the University as a student. Throughout his four and a half decades of teaching, he has produced 13 organists who have captured the prestigious Fulbright scholarship, more than any other music teacher in the nation. Emmet, who was also a Fulbright scholar, serves as a church organ consultant and has given more than 100 recitals, master classes and lectures throughout the United States and Europe.

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#### TCU PLAYS ROLE IN NEW BUSINESS CENTER

Among the key leaders attending the ribbon-cutting for the Fort Worth Business Assistance Center last Friday were TCU's Jack Barrett, director of the Charles Tandy American Enterprise Center and Sheryl Doll, the center's assistant director.

Jack served on the executive steering committee and as chair of the education subcommittee on the Economic Diversification Board of Fort Worth, which defined the center's mission. Some other members of the board, which was led by Fort Worth Mayor Kay Granger, included Lockheed Fort Worth president Gordon R. England and longtime TCU trustee R. Denny Alexander.

The center is a "one-stop shop" for services needed by small business owners and entrepreneurs. It houses about 18 representatives from local and federal agencies, including the Small Business Administration's Service Corps of Retired Executives, counselors from Tarrant County Junior College's Small Business Development Center, a permits and licenses specialist and an authority from Fort Worth's Economic Development Corp., who can assist with obtaining loans.

Sheryl also contributed to the creation of the center. As vice chair of the board's information center subcommittee, she participated in the definition of the center's service concept.

#### **BUSINESS COMMUNICATION DAY IS THURSDAY**

Accomplished medical physician and multimedia enthusiast Dr. Bob Lanier will be the keynote speaker Thursday (Feb. 9) during the fourth annual Business Communication Day. The daylong event, sponsored by the Neeley School's Center for Productive Communication (CPC), will be held from 9:30 a.m. to 3 p.m. in the Tandy Hall atrium.

More than a dozen organizations also will be on hand to demonstrate various communication devices and services during a communication technology fair. Among the vendors will be American Airlines, AT&T, the Fort Worth Star-Telegram's StarText, IBM and Radio Shack.

Dr. Lanier, a board-certified pediatrician and allergist-immunologist, is the host of "60 Second Housecall," which is seen by 8.5 million television viewers daily. Dr. Lanier has developed a proficiency in using multimedia computer technology to communicate medical messages to his audiences.

"Lanier has found a way to use relatively inexpensive computer hardware and software to develop a highly effective supplement to his presentations," said Harriet Harral, director of the CPC. "I think any faculty or staff member will find his presentation useful."

In addition to demonstrations of communication technologies, other sessions will focus on interpersonal relations and business writing. Both undergraduate and graduate students will address a group of human resource executives from local businesses judging the "Let's Talk Business" speech contest. Students also will compete for publication in *The Business Press* and a personal computer awarded by SABRE in the "Business Beat" writing contest.

# TCU IN THE NEWS

**Tandy Technology Scholars**, funded by Tandy Corp. and administered by TCU, was mentioned along with other nationally elite teacher recognition programs in the Jan. 25 *New York Times*. The 6-year-old Tandy Technology Scholars program awards \$350,000 annually to students and teachers who excel in mathematics, science and computer science.

Tommy Thomason, Paul LaRocque and Maggie Thomas (journalism) were mentioned in ombudsman Phil Record's Jan. 22 column in the Fort Worth Star-Telegram regarding results of their research about media coverage of rape cases. Tommy and Paul conducted a national survey of newspaper editors and Maggie conducted a national survey of television news directors. Results of their research were presented at a conference, "Sex in the Media: The Public's Right to Know vs. The Victim's Right to Privacy," in December.

TCU's football recruiting class was recently evaluated by the Star-Telegram and the Dallas Morning News. Last week marked the first day high school football players were allowed to sign letters of intent to play football at the college of their choice.
