PERMIAN BASIN TCU SUPPORTERS REACH FOR 'THE NEXT FRONTIER'

TCU officially kicked off the \$5 million Permian Basin phase of its regional "Next Frontier" fund-raising campaign April 18 in Midland. Nearly 100 TCU alumni, friends, supporters and other guests from the Permian Basin area learned about the campaign during a regional kickoff gala and dinner at the Midland Country Club.

Midland independent oil operator and TCU trustee J. Kelly Cox (Class of '77) served as emcee for the gala. Midland business leader and TCU trustee Clarence Scharbauer III (Class of '73) also spoke to kickoff guests. The event also included performances by the members of the TCU Concert Chorale and remarks from Collin Sewell, a senior marketing major from Odessa.

More than 600 TCU alumni live in the Permian Basin area, including graduates from TCU's Brite Divinity School and Ranch Management program. In the fall of 1994, 67 TCU students came from the Permian Basin area.

More than \$70 million in gifts and pledges have been committed to The Next Frontier campaign so far. The regional kickoff for the Dallas area is scheduled for April 27 at the Loews Anatole Hotel.

CAMPUS CAMPAIGN CONTRIBUTIONS CONTINUE TO GROW

Participation in The Next Frontier Campus Campaign continues to grow. As of April 12, more than \$1 million had been pledged and campus-wide participation stood at 34 percent.
