Staubach is currently chairman of the board and CEO of The Staubach Company, an integrated real estate group that specializes in exclusively representing corporations and professional organizations seeking office, industrial and retail real estate solutions.

Members of the Class of 1995 and their families will be honored at a 1:30-2:30 p.m. reception on the east lawn of Sadler Hall. Hosted by the University, the event will be held in Student Center ballroom if it rains.

The Chancellor's Concert will be presented by the TCU Commencement Festival Band under the direction of faculty member Gregory Clemons, director of bands, from 1:30 to 2:15 p.m. on the Sadler Hall lawn. An outdoor carillon recital by Emmet Smith, Herndon Professor of Music, will be given from the Robert Carr Chapel tower from 2:30 to 3 p.m.

Staubach received the Heisman Trophy in 1963 as a junior at the Naval Academy. After graduation, he served four years active duty with the U.S. Navy, including a tour of duty in Vietnam. Following his military service, Staubach played 11 years for the Dallas Cowboys where he had an uncanny talent of leading the team to come-from-behind victories. During off-seasons, Staubach worked for the Henry S. Miller Company. He started his own company in 1978.

A tea for newcomers to the university started in 1926 and was the club's longest standing tradition.

Joan said the club had an impact on the University through its social efforts and its attempts to bring the TCU faculty and staff together as a family. The club's monetary assets will be given to the Friends of the TCU Library.

The Lunch Bunch and a hobby group, both sponsored by the Woman's Club, will continue to meet.
