Meteorite said to perhaps be in Dr. Sitton's office, where Mr. James formerly stayed a lot. Dr. C. A. Schultz recalls the meteorite, and thinks it was iron, and about 3-4 x as large as Cleburne iron.

On Aug. trip, Mrs. Lewis Lancaster was interviewed and said she thought the met. was about 12-15" long, and had a depressed groove around it (formerly used as Indian implement?); it was light brown to limestone white in color. Her brother, J. B. James, who lives SE of Grandview on Martin's place, near Gillespie's, says it was 3' long, a light yellow or brown stone, with some limestone spots (?); limestone color on inside. He thinks it was broken into fragments (and so lost?). A man who used to office with his father is Mr. _____, a lawyer, now at _____ Min St., Ft. Worth, at the third door of the second block from the courthouse, on the W. side.
