

Geo. James, carpenter, lives on College Hill. Schuttz talked to him reftown; does not remember meteorite.

Mary Ruth Campbell, High School teacher, got old loom & other relics pertaining to early Amer. history, but knew nothing of met.

R. E. Edwards, science teacher at High School, had most of mineral collection, but knew nothing of met.

Ellison James, R 3 Alvarado, operates gin W. of road to Venus, & recalls met. as being about 2' long, 5-6" diam in center, tapering toward ea. end. It had a white (lime deposit?) crust & was black "inside" (primary crust?); heavy, metallic. It was tested by a geologist with acid. Orig found by the elder James while plowing in black land field near Mountain Creek about 1 1/2 miles from gin, weight 60 lbs. Mr. James home place was sold to John Anderson.

Lewis Lancaster, husband of one of the James girls, does not recall any large meteorite, but only a small round one, red & green, which his <sup>late</sup> father called "his meteor". This was app. not > 1" in diam. A geologist from Ft. Stockton once visited James & spent some time with him; he was the man who discovered a very large petrified tree (or forest?) in the Davis Mts. This geologist may have got the meteor.

The home place was sold to John Anderson, who still owns it & rents to the present occupant, Mrs — Graham. The house is on the E side of the square 2 blks to the S, at the NW cor of the intersection. Terry Graham (son) is at the house, & teaches school. Mrs. Willborn, just across st. to the S, has a large fish-shaped rock, resembling a large carp.
