

A WORK REGARDING "I" GRADES.

October 15 was the last date for the removal of "I" grades left over from the summer term. We have been in correspondence for some weeks with teachers who gave "I" grades to students at the close of the spring semester and also at the close of the summer term, endeavoring to reveal the importance of this matter and to urge that the fewest possible number of "I" grades be given.

Please keep in mind that when a student comes to you as his teacher to make up an "I" grade, you must require of him that he bring to you first of all a permit from the Registrar's Office, authorizing you as a teacher to receive make-up work from him. Then, you are to make the report to the office on the permit rather than handing it back to the student. If the teachers will read carefully the instructions at the top of the permit sheet, they will have no difficulty in this. Of course, the permit when completed by the teachers should be turned in to the registrar's office promptly.

It is now, of course, too late to clear an "I" grade for the summer or for last spring. October 15 was the deadline. We should not be troubled regarding this matter any more until the end of the fall semester at which time the teachers are again urged to give these "I" grades very sparingly and only in emergency.

MID-SEMESTER GRADES

Only "F" grades are to be reported at mid-semester. No official schedule of examination will be set. The mid-semester report on "F" grades will be due in the Registrar's Office at nine o'clock, Monday, November 17. It is to be expected, however, that each teacher sometime during the week preceding that time will give a mid-semester examination or make some provision for an announced examination to give a basis upon which to determine the grade.

A special card will be available in due time on which the "F" grade is to be reported on each failing student. These will be properly processed and placed in the hands of the Deans and Director of Student Personnel for appropriate follow-up.

FIRST SIX WEEKS

Saturday, October 25th marks the end of the first six weeks of school. When a student drops a course after that date, the teacher must write on the "red" drop card "WP" or "WF", which means "Withdrew passing" or "withdrew failing."

In the Administrative Offices on the campus we fall heir to all of the errors and over-sights of our faculty and our entire student body besides the errors we make ourselves, so if we seem a bit slow in clearing up some of these matters, be patient and considerate. We will eventually come through.

Careful attention to details will save everybody unnecessary work.
