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## SECRETARY CAVAZOS WILL SPEAK AT CONVOCATION

Dr. Lauro F. Cavazos, secretary of the U.S. Department of Education, will be the speaker Sept. 11 for fall convocation. Marking the official opening of the University's 118th year, the public assembly will begin at 11 a.m. with an academic procession into Ed Landreth Auditorium. Chancellor Bill Tucker will preside.

A highlight of the assembly will be announcement of the Chancellor's Award for Distinguished Teaching. Endowed by an anonymous TCU alumni couple, the honor includes a \$12,000 check in recognition of outstanding accomplishments as a teacher and to cover the variety of expenses the recipient feels will enhance most fully his/her contributions as a teacher and scholar.

The first teaching award was presented in 1982 to English Professor Betsy Colquitt. The Chancellor's Award for Distinguished Research and Creative Activity is given in alternate years.

Welcoming remarks and introductions at convocation will be made by Vice Chancellor Bill Koehler. Music provided by the Concert Chorale, under the direction of Ron Shirey, will be "Bird of Youth" and "God Of Our Fathers," the latter accompanied by the the TCU Wind Ensemble directed by Bob Blanton. The processional and recessional will be played by Emmet Smith, Herndon Professor of Organ and Church Music. Minister to the University John Butler will give the invocation and benediction, and the Alma Mater Hymn will be led by Associate Professor Sheila Allen.

Dr. Cavazos, holder of two degrees in zoology from Texas Tech University and the Ph.D. in physiology from Iowa State University, was named secretary of education in 1988 by then-President Ronald Reagan. He was asked to continue in that role by President George Bush.

A member of the faculty at Medical College of Virginia and dean of the Tufts University School of Medicine for five years, Secretary Cavazos returned to Texas Tech in 1980 to become its 10th president. He was the first alumnus and first Hispanic to hold that office.

Secretary Cavazos, consultant to national and international health organizations, including the World Health Organization, has been widely recognized for his efforts in education. Presented the President's Medal from the City College of New York and Medal of Honor from the University of California at Los Angeles last year, he received the National Hispanic Leadership Award in education from the League of United Latin American Citizens in 1988. Earlier honors included the Distinguished Service Medal from the Uniformed Services University for Health Sciences and an award for outstanding leadership in the field of education in 1984 from former President Reagan.

Author or co-author of more than 75 publications, Secretary Cavazos has initiated a consumer-protection approach to federal student assistance programs and targeted federal resources to improve opportunities for those most in need. He also initiated special programs to combat drug and alcohol use. A strong advocate of parent involvement in education, he has provided leadership to encourage both parental and community participation in education reform.

Classes will be dismissed from 10:30 a.m. to 12:15 p.m. for convocation.

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TCOM ADDED TO EXTERNAL DATABASES

The library at Texas College of Osteopathic Medicine has been added to Mary Coats Burnett Library's external databases, joining the University of Texas at Austin and StarText.

Beginning this week, said Lottie Meador, head of special formats, persons dialing into the library system will be prompted to enter their Social Security numbers when they choose to access the external databases option.

That option requires the use of a limited number of campus modems or limited network lines. To make sure this option is available exclusively to TCU library patrons, its use is restricted to those who have patron records in the library system, including TCU students, faculty, staff and others with TCU ID or library card.

'VOICE OF SOVIET UNION' WILL SPEAK OCT. 2

Ambassador Gennady Gerasimov, chief spokesman for Soviet leader Mikhail Gorbachev who is known as "The Voice of the Soviet Union," will speak on campus Oct. 2. The event, to begin at 7:30 p.m. in Ed Landreth Auditorium, is the sixth in the Distinguished Speakers Forum series sponsored by Team Bank in cooperation with TCU and the Fort Worth Star-Telegram.

The series was inaugurated in March of 1988 with a presentation by former Secretary of State Henry Kissinger. Other speakers have been Ted Koppell of ABC News, syndicated columnist George F. Will, Wall Street Week host Louis Rukeyser and Adm. William J. Crowe Jr., former chairman of the Joint Chiefs of Staff.

"The Smiling Russian Bear: Is It Dangerous?" will be the topic for the presentation by Gerasimov, who has headed the information department of the Soviet Union's Ministry of Foreign Affairs since 1986.

The veteran foreign affairs correspondent has been described as "much in the mold of the 'New Soviet Man' he says Gorbachev hopes to create." He was trained in international law at the Moscow Institute of International Relations and at Moscow University, but Gorbachev's former classmate was "disappointed with international law because it's a weak law." He entered the field of journalism and became a diplomatic correspondent in the United States for Nuvosti Press Agency, an assignment that included living in New York in 1972-78. Recipient of a Vorovsky Prize, equivalent to the Pulitzer Prize, for journalist achievement, he was appointed editor in chief of the influential Moscow News Weekly.

Gerasimov, whose titles include ambassador plenipotentiary and extraordinary for the U.S.S.R. and chief press secretary for the U.S.S.R. Ministry of Defense, accompanies Gorbachev as spokesman on foreign and often domestic travels. He is chief spokesman for Foreign Minister Eduard Shevardnadze and, in that position, receives information that flows into foreign ministry desks from nations throughout the world.

Described in Centerpiece magazine as an "effective communicator" who has become "a charismatic -- occasionally wiseacre -- international celebrity," Gerasimov focuses his attention on glasnost, perestroika, the changing world population and survival in the nuclear age. He is considered a strong candidate for appointment as ambassador to the United States.

Gerasimov, an adviser to the Central Committee earlier in his career, edited World Marxist Review, the official magazine of the Communist Parties, in 1961-64.

ART IN METROPLEX OPENS SATURDAY

The eighth annual Art in the Metroplex show, sponsored by TCU and The Committee for an Artists' Center, opens Saturday in Moudy Building Exhibition Hall with a reception from 2 to 8 p.m. The show's nationally known juror, Ned Rifkin, will lecture on contemporary art at 2:30 p.m., followed by awards presentation at 3:30 p.m.

Rifkin, chief curator for exhibitions at the Hirshhorn Museum and Sculpture Garden of Smithsonian Institution, selected for the show 30 works by 25 artists in Dallas, Tarrant and Denton counties. Art in the Metroplex 1990 drew 704 entries from a total of 279 North Texas artists, compared to 184 artists last year. The juror selected works by 13 Dallas County artists and six each from Tarrant and Denton.

Regarded as one of the nation's leading authorities on current trends in contemporary art, Rifkin formerly was curator of contemporary art at the Corcoran Gallery in New York, curator and assistant director of New York's New Museum of Contemporary Art and assistant professor of art at the University of Texas at Arlington.

Tarrant County artists in the show are Deedra Dedman of Arlington, an untitled photograph; Nicholas Wood, Arlington, pastel on paper; and, from Fort Worth, Patrick Kelly, an oil on wood and a mixed media work; Robert Rodriguez, second prize winner in last year's Art in the Metroplex; Ron Tomlinson, an oil; and Steven Watson, two silver prints.

Chosen from Dallas were an oil on paper by Andrew Bennett; two photographs by Paul Greenberg; a mixed photo process by Caryl Herfort; a galvanized steel work by Jimmie Hudson; and three acrylic on wood pieces by Otis Jones. Other Dallas residents in the show are Mike Kennedy, a wood installation; Manuel M. Mauricio, a mixed work of flowers, granite and wood; John Pomara, oil and enamel on paper; Nicholas H. Ruth, gouache on intaglio; David Szafranski, mixed; and Kevin Young, wood/mixed. Also from Dallas County are Kathleen Raymond of Richardson, a print/collage, and Jennifer Spenser of Garland, gouache/colored pencils/paper.

Denton artists in the show are Andrew Daleo, a wood and paint work; Robert McAn, gelatin silver print, wood, paint; Don Van Radke, acrylic; Tom Sale, wood; and Don J. Scaggs, linocut/mixed media. Also from Denton County is Wister D. Lamb III of Carrollton, a black acrylic installation.

A total of \$2,200 in prize money will be presented. First prize is The Fifth Avenue Foundation Award, \$1,000, followed by Mr. and Mrs. F. Howard Walsh Award, \$500; John L. Clardy Award, \$300; Robert E. Fiesler Award, \$200; and Mrs. Robert M. Bass Award and Claud M. Vance Memorial Award, \$100 each.

"Publisher gives authors latitude" was the Star-Telegram headline for the Aug. 3 feature on ROBERT BONAZZI (publications) and his wife, Elizabeth, who are editorial director and publisher, respectively, for Latitudes Press. Now observing its 25th year of serious literary publishing, the press publishes a literary quarterly, Vortex, and the JHG Editions, featuring works by John Howard Griffin, Elizabeth's late husband, and his colleagues.

LONDON VIOLINIST TO PLAY MONDAY

Dona Lee Croft, a professor at London's Royal College of Music, will open the 1990-91 TCU Music Series with a violin recital at 8 p.m. Monday in Ed Landreth Auditorium.

Ms. Croft has performed throughout Europe, the United States and Mexico since making her solo debut at the age of 14. On a recent tour of Italy, she was privileged to play on Cremona's Stradivarius violin of 1715, an honor accorded to only a few gifted musicians.

Ms. Croft's TCU program will open with Handel's Sonata in D Major and Schumann's Sonata in A Minor. She also will play Notturmo and Tarantella and La Fontaine d'Arethuse, both by Szymanowski, and Four Pieces by Suk, Danse Espagnole from "La Vida Breve" by De Falla/ Kreisler and Souvenir d'Amerique by Vieuxtemps.

Piano accompanist will be Christopher Ross, recent winner of Great Britain's National Federation of Music Societies competition. In addition to his work as an accompanist, Ross has toured widely in England and Europe as a soloist, has broadcast live from Cologne Radio and has recorded several programs for the BBC.

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SWIMMING LESSONS BEGIN SEPT. 8

The first of two sessions of Saturday morning swimming lessons begins this week with subsequent sessions on Sept. 15, 22 and 29. This fall's second series is planned for Oct. 6, 13, 20 and 27, according to Coach Richard Sybesma. All will be held at the Rickel Building pool.
