Since a gas is commonly given off when artifial iron is dissolved in hydorchloric acid. Because of that odor I was sure enough that it was a man-made product though no tests were made for nickel.

The ektachrom transparences showed no features of a meteorite. I do not know what this stuff is but it looks like a place where some molten metal escaped and solidified quickly in the air. I am returning the picture with this letter.
