CONCERNING FINAL EXAMINATIONS January 24-29

1. Each examination is scheduled for a period of two hours, and should begin promptly on the hour assigned.

2. Instructors will turn in to their department heads grade sheets on each class as rapidly as possible, not to exceed 48 hours after each examination. Department heads will turn all grades to their deans by 9:00 A.M. Monday, January 31, who in turn will get all grades to the Registrar's Office by noon on that day.

3. Teachers are urged to assign numbers to students and to post grades outside their offices as soon as grades for each class are completed.

4. Any variations from the schedule must be cleared with the Registrar before being announced to the students.

Examinations on SENIORS AND ON GRADUATE STUDENTS scheduled to complete their work for their degrees as of January 29, 1949, may be given at the discretion of the teachers, but preferably on the regular schedule as there is no graduation at this time.

6. Any class not regularly scheduled in the prepared schedule may be given an examination at the discretion of the teacher within the week of exams.

METHOD OF SECURING GRADES AT THE END OF THE SEMESTER FOR A TRANSCRIPT THAT MUST GO OUT SOON AFTER THE END OF THE SEMESTER

The student should first apply for the transcript at the Registrar's Office at least a week before the end of the semester.

At the time of application or at some time prior to the time of the final exam, the student should pick up an especially prepared card and an inter-office envelope for each of his or her courses.

The card will have on it a space for the essential data, and should be filled out except for the grade and the signature of the teacher. This card and an inter-office envelope should be presented to the teacher at the time of the final examination.

After the papers are graded and the grade is determined the teacher may either send the grade in by Faculty mail or give it to the student to return in the sealed envelope if such an arrangement has been made with the student.

SPECIAL NOTICE TO TEACHERS: Do not assume that since the grade sheet is prepared it will not be necessary to follow this procedure. The grade sheets come to this office, but they are immediately checked and then start through a process which includes an operation in the IBM Office, and so it is not possible to look up each student's grades to clear the transcripts. Please follow the instructions and give us the grade on the grade sheet and the additional grade on the 3 x 5 card to help speed up the process.
