
INSTRUCTIONS REGARDING DAY STUDENTS WHO DESIRE TO CARRY AN EVENING COLLEGE COURSE:

It will be helpful if all department heads and student advisors keep clearly in mind the established procedure under which a student may enroll for a course in the Evening College concurrently with the enrollment in other units of the University.

The student should discuss his proposed plan with his major professor or counsellor, obviously. If it is desired that a course be taken in the evening, the admit-to-class card should be completed by the student and initialed with an OK by the major professor or counsellor.

Then, if the class is scheduled in the day, the head of the department (or his representative) must give his approval by a like indication.

Then, after the requisite approvals are obtained, the student must bring the approved admit-to-class card to the Evening College table or office for enrollment.

This policy is the one that has long been in force; it is repeated for our newer personnel.

DEVELOPMENTS IN THE EVALUATION OF THE EDUCATIONAL PROGRAM OF THE COLLEGE OF ARTS & SCIENCES OF TEXAS CHRISTIAN UNIVERSITY

I. General Faculty Meeting.

The faculty of the College of Arts & Sciences met on April 14th at 4:00 P.M. in response to a request from Dean Jerome Moore. The meeting was called for the purpose of discussing plans for the evaluation of the educational program in the College of Arts & Sciences.

Following some discussion concerning ways of proceeding with respect to such a study, a motion was made that a steering committee, made up of representatives from the social sciences, the natural sciences, and the humanities, be selected by faculty vote. The motion was seconded and passed. Dean Moore acted as temporary chairman, and a committee consisting of Drs. Dinkins, Hardt, LaGrone, Mundhenke, and Moore (ex-fficio) was selected.

II. First Meeting of Steering Committee.

On Tuesday, April 19th, at 2:00 P.M., the Steering Committee, in response to a request from Dean Moore, held its first meeting. All members were present. The first matter discussed was that of selecting a chairman. Dean Moore was nominated, but after some discussion by Dean Moore and others concerning the desirability of an administrative officer of the University serving as chairman, it was decided that a faculty member without administrative office would be desirable. Dr. LaGrone was then nominated and elected as chairman.

The committee then took up the question of a general plan for the study program. It was agreed that the study should include all of the major phases of the educational program and that the logical first step was that of a consideration of educational objectives. Dr. Dinkins was selected to prepare and have mimeographed for distribution a bibliography of useful references concerning educational objectives.

The Steering Committee wished to avoid any commitment at the outset concerning the degree of integration which should characterize the organization of the curricula. The committee did feel, however, that in the various subdivisions of the study plan, departments as such, will have to be given consideration.

In outlining the general plan of study, the Steering committee set up three divisional committees; these committees and their membership in part, were named. They are: (1) curriculum and instruction (Drs. Crenshaw, Hewatt, and Porterfield). (2) objectives (Drs. Cheverton, Sherer, and Cecil), and (3) student personnel services (Dr. Richardson).

III. Meeting of Steering Committee with Divisional Committee Members.

On Friday, April 29th, at 2:00 P.M., members of the three divisional committees met with the Steering committee for the purpose of discussing further plans for the study. Those present included Drs. Dinkins, Hardt, Mundhenke, Moore, and LaGrone from the Steering Committee; Drs. Crenshaw, Hewatt and Porterfield from the committee on curriculum and instruction; Drs. Sherer and Cecil from the committee on objectives (Dr. Fowler substituted for Dr. Cheverton), and Dr. Richardson from the committee on student personnel services.

As chairman of the Steering Committee, Dr. LaGrone presented to the group an outline of the study plan as developed by the Steering committee. The selection of personnel for each of the divisional committees was announced. Discussed also were the views of the Steering committee that (1) the study should include ultimately all members of the faculty, (2) it should include all the major phases of the educational program, and (3) it must begin by considering educational objectives. Dr. Dinkins distributed to the group a bibliography dealing with objectives which he had been requested to prepare.

The tentative subdivisions of work which each of the divisional committees was assigned to coordinate was then discussed. The possibility of further dividing the work of the committee on curriculum and instruction into three groups (i.e., the natural sciences, the social sciences, and the humanities) and these in turn into departments was indicated. Likewise, the inclusion under the supervision of the committee on student personnel services of different groups concerned variously with counseling, student employment, dormitory life, and freshman orientation was pointed out. The opinion was expressed that the next step would involve that of (1) the divisional committees naming the membership of the various sub-committees whose work it would be their immediate responsibility to coordinate, and (2) that all groups should begin with the formulation of educational objectives at the various levels involved.

STEERING COMMITTEE MEETING

The Steering Committee recently chosen by the Liberal Arts faculty suggests that maximum participation in the program of studying curriculum and objectives may best be achieved if all members of the teaching staff do some of the reading outlined in the list below. Early in the next fall term all will be called upon for expression of opinion concerning this program; and the books indicated provide information and discussion concerning some of the major issues involved.
