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11 TO BE VISITING GREEN PROFESSORS

Eleven distinguished persons from across the nation will be campus guests as Visiting Green Professors during 1989-90. Since the position was endowed by a gift from Dr. Cecil H. Green and his late wife, Dr. Ida Green, of Dallas, some 125 writers, scientists, educators and other noted career persons have accepted invitations from the University.

No appointment has been made for this year for the Green Honors Chair, endowed by an earlier gift from the couple for one-semester visits by widely recognized persons.

Dates have been set for four of the guests. Bernard Rands of Boston, composer-in-residence with the Philadelphia Orchestra, will be hosted by the music department Nov. 5-12.

Spring visits are scheduled for Dr. Douglas Russell, Stanford University professor in drama, who will be a Visiting Green Professor in the theatre department March 4-11. The School of Education will host Dr. Arthur Costa, professor of education from the Department of Education Administration at California State University in Sacramento, March 29-31. In conjunction with Honors Week, Dr. Robert Coles, child psychiatrist, educator and author from Harvard University Health Services, will be on campus April 18-19.

Among those for whom dates have not been set are Dr. Harry R. Tennant of Dallas, a Texas Instruments Fellow who will be hosted by the computer science department, and Dr. Kathryn Sullivan, NASA astronaut/mission specialist, invited by the geology department.

A guest of the modern languages department will be David W. Foster of Arizona State University, where he is director of Spanish Graduate Studies and the publications program of Arizona State's Center for Latin American Studies. Currently the Stuart Professor of Psychology at Princeton University, Dr. Edward E. Jones will be a guest of the psychology department.

Stephen J. Brown, professor of finance and Yamichi Fellow in Finance in New York University's Graduate School of Business Administration, will be hosted by the School of Business. Visiting Graduate Studies and Research will be Dr. Jules B. LaPidus of Washington, DC, president of Council of Graduate Schools in the United States. Harris College of Nursing will host Em Olivia Bevis of Statesboro, GA, who heads the nursing department at Georgia Southern College.

AFROTC CADETS WIN TRAINING AWARDS

Of 32 Air Force ROTC cadets attending nine summer field training encampments throughout the United States, one was selected as commandant of his encampment and two others were chosen as vice commandants.

Mike Vogel became commandant by being selected as the top cadet in his field training encampment. He also won an athletic award. Gary Salmans and James Bedgood were named vice commandants for finishing in the top 4 percent of 250 cadets in their encampments.

Eight other cadets won awards during field encampment training. Brad Clark and Teddy Cook were named Superior Performers for finishing in the top 10 percent of their encampments. David Robert and Chris Brockman were Excellent Performers for being in the top 25 percent.

An athletic award went to Joe White for athletic scores in the top 5 percent of his group. Chad Baker and Matthew Lee qualified as marksmen in small arms, while Bret Cockerham graduated in the top 10 percent of his light aircraft training class.

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GRANT APPLICATIONS DUE NOV. 1

Nov. 1 is the deadline for grants up to \$6,000 for new programs or projects through the cooperative Grants Program of the National Association for Foreign Student Affairs. Designed to strengthen and enrich the experience of foreign students and U.S. students studying abroad, the competition is open to campus-based individuals with innovative ideas for international student projects.

The COOP program also includes one or two major grants of up to \$15,000 for programs that introduce foreign students and scholars to volunteerism in U.S. society. A limited number of grants for development of programs to enhance experiences of Fulbright students at American colleges and universities also are included.

SOVIET DEFECTOR TO SPEAK

The highest ranking KGB officer to defect to the United States will speak on campus Thursday. Stanislav Levchenko, who rose to the rank of major in the KGB and was chief of its covert actions group in Tokyo, has been instrumental in uncovering KGB operations and spy networks in the United States and abroad.

Levchenko's exploits in his rise through the ranks of the KGB were chronicled in John Barron's book, "Inside the KGB." Levchenko's own account, "On the Wrong Side," was published in 1987. Brought to campus by the Forums Committee, Levchenko will speak Sept. 14 at 7:30 p.m. in Ed Landreth Auditorium. Tickets, now on sale at the Student Center information desk, are \$1 for those with a TCU identification card and \$3 for others.

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BLOOD DRIVE BEGINS SEPT. 18

With "Good to the Last Drop" as its theme, the annual fall blood drive held in cooperation with the Carter Blood Center will begin Sept. 18 and continue through Sept. 21. The Student Center's lounge will be the setting from 10 a.m. to 7 p.m.

The effort is sponsored by the Residence Hall Association, and donations are put into an account designated for use by TCU students as well as faculty and staff members and administrators and their families.

Virginia Ridgley, president of the Residence Hall Association, noted that more than 93 percent of the donations come from students, while faculty, staff and administrators are prime users from the TCU account. She encourages "doing our fair share and joining in the blood drive for life."

The program will include Bach's "Aus Liebe will mein Heiland sterben" and "Ei, wie schmeckt der Coffee susse"; Sonate by Jindrich Feld; "Serenade aux etoiles," Cecile Chaminade; "Schwalbenflug," Ernesto Kohler; Sonata for Solo Flute by John La Montain; and "Sicilienne et Burlesque" by Alfredo Casell.

Penney Stores; James Bolding, deputy general counsel, E-Systems Inc.; Jerry Sills, ethics program director at General Dynamics Corp.; and Carl Skooglund, ethics director at Texas Instruments.

Among those scheduled to attend are representatives of AT&T, Bell Helicopter, General Dynamics, IBM and Texas American Bridge Bank as well as local government officials.

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'COWTOWN JAZZ' CD DUE THIS WEEK

TCU Jazz Ensembles' first compact disc, "Cowtown Jazz: Where the West Begins and the Swing Ain't in No Hurry," will be released in mid-September, announced Curt Wilson, director of jazz studies.

Featured will be flutist Cynthia Folio on "All the Things You Are," arranged by Cal Lewiston, and on "Blue Bossa." The big bands also will play Curt's arrangement of "Zip-a-dee-doo-dah"; the Stan Kenton arrangement of "Stairway to the Stars," featuring Fort Worth senior Alan Burton on saxophone; "It Ain't Necessarily So," arranged by Michael Tomaro of the U.S. Army dance band in Washington, DC; the Count Basie arrangement of "Moten Swing"; and "My Romance," another Lewiston arrangement. A quintet, Two Much Sax, will play Burton's composition "Side-Out."

Lewiston, a professional trumpeter who has played with the Jerry Gray band and has backed Tony Bennett, Ella Fitzgerald, Tom Jones and Bill Medley, is working toward his master's degree in composition. Before the Fairmont Hotels discontinued their big band programs, Lewiston fronted the band in the Dallas Fairmont's Venetian Room and at the San Francisco Fairmont.

The CD is dedicated to two recent retirees, George Tade, dean of fine arts from 1972 to 1989, and Noah Knepper, a veteran of 21 years on the woodwind faculty, and in memory of Michael Winesanker, longtime music chairperson; alumnus and former Horned Frog band director Lew Gillis; and Dr. A.M. Pate Jr., alumnus, trustee and a great friend of the jazz program.

The album was made possible in part by grants from the Arts Council of Fort Worth and Tarrant County and the TCU House of Student Representatives. It will be available through the band office, Ext. 7640, from members of the ensembles and at Record Town, 3025 S. University Drive.

GEE, MILLS ASSUME NEW TITLES

Assistant vice chancellors Ann D. Gee of development and Don Mills of student affairs have been named associate vice chancellors. Effective immediately, the appointments were announced by vice chancellors William Wehner of development and University relations and Peggy Barr of student affairs, respectively.

A native of Memphis, TN, Ann joined the staff in 1978 as associate director of alumni programs and annual giving after serving as assistant director of alumni at Memphis State University, where she earned the B.A. degree in 1976. She was named director of alumni and special programs the following year and in 1984 joined the development staff as director for Northeast Texas. In 1988 she became assistant vice chancellor for development.

"I am particularly pleased that Ann Gee's abilities and responsibilities in the development process at TCU are being recognized through this promotion," Wehner said. "In my 20-plus years of development experiences, I can truly say that she is one of those rare development professionals who has all the essential ingredients needed in achieving top-notch development officer status."

Don, a New York native who earned the B.A. degree at Harvard and the Master of Divinity at TCU, joined the staff in 1972 as assistant director of programs and services and was named director the following year. Formerly a minister and education director for Christian churches (Disciples of Christ) in Wills Point and Mineral Wells, respectively, he became associate dean of students in 1978. In 1986 he was named assistant vice chancellor for student affairs. Don holds the Ed.D. degree from the University of North Texas.

"The new title more accurately reflects the range and scope of Don's responsibilities," Barr said. "He has done a fine job, and I am happy to see it recognized in this manner through the organization."
