COME CAROL BY CANDLELIGHT MONDAY

The glow of candles and the sound of bells starting at 10:15 p.m. Monday will signal the beginning of TCU's 14th annual Carols by Candlelight festival in Robert Carr Chapel.

Luminarias will mark the way into the chapel as Emmet Smith begins to play the carillon at 10:15 p.m., followed five minutes later by a Brass Ensemble performance on the steps, with Steve Weger conducting.

Organ music and singing begin inside the chapel at 10:30 p.m., and the program will include a pair of Christmas anthems by the Chapel Choir, led by Ron Shirey, and two bell choir numbers under the direction of Betty Boles of University Christian Church. University Minister John Butler will lead a prayer.

Carols by Candlelight is open to everyone, on and off campus. Audience members should come early to get seats.

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NEW SUMNERS GIFTS ANNOUNCED

A new gift of \$20,000 from the Hatton W. Sumners Foundation of Dallas brings to more than \$100,000 the total in grants for undergraduates made possible by the foundation since 1987.

Of the new gift, \$10,000 will fund partial tuition grants to be awarded primarily on the basis of need. Applicants must be full-time students in good standing, preferably those majoring in political science or history, students in pre-law studies or those who intend to teach in the social sciences.

The other \$10,000 goes to TCU's Washington Internship Program to help students defray the extra costs of living in Washington, DC, for a semester.

The initial Sumners foundation gifts in 1987 were \$50,000 for the partial tuition grants, \$10,000 for interns. Last fall the foundation gave another \$12,000 for grants and \$10,000 for interns.

The foundation, designed to aid in the study and teaching of the science of self-government, was created in the 1950s after the death of longtime Texas Democratic legislator Hatton Sumners. One of the foundation's trustees, Fort Worth attorney William C. Pannell, is a TCU alumnus.

ANIMAL NUTRITION IS RANCH TOPIC

The spring Ranch Management evening class will deal with Animal Nutrition and Feeding, taught by Gary L. Wilson. Classes will meet from 7 to 10 p.m. Tuesdays beginning Jan. 16.

The study will include digestion and use of feeds for maintenance and production, selection of feeds based on composition and cost, ration formulation, feed processing and handling, possible limiting factors in feeding efficiency, supplemental feeding on pasture and dry lot feeding programs.

The equipment will reproduce in 8 1/2 X 11 and 8 1/2 X 14 sizes in all colors from both photos and transparencies in all colors. Printing is done on laser paper for truer colors, according to Zoanne Hogg.

Capable of printing in all colors, the easy-to-use equipment allows the user to select the colors wanted and indicate those with a special pen on the black and white original.

The copier currently is being used on a temporary basis. How much it is used will be a determining factor in its being available permanently. Cost for the color printing depends on quantity.

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TCU WILL GO TO OXFORD

Four studies will be included in the TCU-at-Oxford program scheduled June 30-July 23 at Oxford's St. Hilda College. These include International and Intercultural Communications taught by Anantha Babbili and Larry Lauer; Music in England: 1500-Present, Tamas Ungar; European Economic Community/1992, Roger Pfaffenberger; and Monarchs, Rebels and Desperate Men: Profile of Conflict in Stuart England 1603-1714, Kathy McDorman.

Field trips for the three-week study will be coordinated by geologist Nowell Donovan.

In addition to classes and field trips planned by TCU faculty members, Oxford faculty members will lecture on such topics as history and architecture of Oxford, heritage of Britain and importance of scholarship in the context of Oxford University. Both historical and architectural development of the university and the city will be included.

Excluding air fare and tuition for the course selected, program cost is \$1,850. This includes accommodations of a private room and shared bath, meals and course-related travel in Britain. Additional information is available from the extended education office, Ext. 7130.

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FROGS WIN IN OKLAHOMA, ARKANSAS

The Frogs' men's swim team raised its season standing to 4-1 by beating Oral Roberts University and Southwest Missouri State in a mid-November meet in Tulsa and beating the Arkansas Razorbacks the following day in Fayetteville.

Coach Richard Sybesma described his team as "emotionally high" when they won over the Razorbacks for the first time ever in the dual meet. "It was a total team effort," he said. "The only teams in the Southwest Conference that are better than our men are Texas, last year's NCAA champions, and SMU, ranked 14th in NCAA last year."

Frog women swimmers competed only against Arkansas, since ORU and SMS don't have women's teams. While the women's team lost, first-place winners for the Frogs included Lynne Myers, 1000 freestyle and 500 freestyle, and Gretchen Brannon, who set a new TCU record in the 200 butterfly.

Men who finished in first place in Arkansas included Mark Lotz, 1000 freestyle; Mark Graves, 50 freestyle; Kevin Irion, 200 IM; Matt Walters, 200 butterfly; Steve Reed, 500 freestyle; Kyle Bass, 3-meter diving; and Reed, Graves, Keith Ludwick and Steve Kellam, 400 freestyle.
