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## DORAN IS PIPER PROFESSOR FOR 1989

Mathematician Bob Doran, member of TCU's faculty since 1969, is one of 10 Texas professors selected as a Piper Professor of 1989. Chosen for "superior teaching at the college level" from educators nominated by accredited institutions throughout the state, he will be recognized publicly by Chancellor Bill Tucker during May cormencement.

The San Antonio-based Minnie Stevens Piper Foundation, founded in 1950 as a non-profit charitable corporation, established the Piper Professor awards in 1958 to give recognition to outstanding achievement in the teaching profession in Texas colleges and universities. Each of the 10 awardees is cited as "the well-rounded, outgoing teacher, devoted to the profession, who has made special impact on his students and the community."

Bob, who has been a visiting scholar at Massachusetts Institute of Technology and last semester at England's Oxford University, received the 1988 Chancellor's Award for Distinguished Teaching last fall. In 1986 he was one of three TCU faculty members who received initial Burlington Northern Foundation Faculty Achievement Awards for teaching "both significant and meritorious." His other honors include a teaching excellence award from the House of Student Representatives and being named a preferred professor by Mortar Board, both in 1987.

On the board of trustees of the Institute for Advanced Study at Princeton University, Bob has been described by an MIT mathematics colleague as "perhaps the discipline's most prolific writer of research-level works in the world today." He is co-author of "Pure and Applied Mathematics," issued last year by Academic Press. A number of his studies have been published in the Bulletin of the American Mathematical Society, Manuscripta Mathematica and Tamkang Journal of Mathematics. His work entitled "A 'Care Package' for Undergraduate Mathematics Students" appeared in Mathematics in College last year.

Bob, holder of two degrees each from the universities of Iowa and Washington, has been a visiting professor at the University of Texas at Austin. He was a member of the faculty at Washington and the University of Northern Iowa before coming to TCU. A member of the Society of Fellows, Bob is an editor of Cambridge University Press. He is active in a number of learned societies.

Bob is the eighth TCU faculty member to be named a Piper Professor. Others include A.T. DeGroot, in 1959; the late Mabel Major, 1964; the late Lorraine Sherley, 1965; the late Willis G. Hewatt, 1969; Ben Procter, 1973; Emmet Smith, 1974; and the late Michael Winesanker, 1976.

## SKIFF WINS TIPA'S SWEEPSTAKES AWARD

The Daily Skiff came away from the April 22-23 meeting in Denton of the Texas Intercollegiate Press Association with the sweepstakes award for Division 2 newspapers in addition to 16 individual awards for its staff members. The student newspaper placed second in the overall category.

IMAGE magazine ranked third in general magazine overall in Division 1 with honors going to Todd Camp and MariCarmen Eroles. Three of its staff members received individual honors.

These awards, based on issues of the publications prior to Jan. 1, along with three for on-the-spot competition during the two-day meet, were presented at an awards banquet, according to publications adviser Mark Witherspoon.

In newspaper competition, honors went to Michelle Releford, honorable mention in news feature; Michael Hayworth, honorable mention, general column; Lisa Touye, first, humor column; Troy Phillips, first, sports news; Scott Hunt, third, sports feature; Brian McLean, first, and Rob Robbins, second, news photo; McLean, honorable mention, feature photo; Jim Winn, first, sports feature photo. Brenda Welchlin, Robbins and Diane Wooldridge received second place in picture story; David Andriesen, second, and Jerry Madden, honorable mention, critical review; Welchlin, third, picture page design; and wooldridge, second, illustration.

For his color feature picture in the magazine competition, Monard Nichols won second place; Nhan Pham, third, illustration; Camp, third, best single general magazine issue; and Saul Torres, second, best general magazine cover design.

Winners in the "live" competition were Leanora Minai, second place in newswriting; Welchlin, second, editorial writing; and Julie Barnhouse and Jenni Romero, honorable mention in two-person team photo essay.

During the Denton meeting, sophomore Susan Besze of Irving was elected secretary of TIPA.

STUDENT WINS 2ND CONSECUTIVE INTEGRATION BEE
Sophomore chemistry/physics major Doug Strout echoed his prize-winning form last week when he won the math department's integration bee for the second year in a row. He won $\$ 50$ for beating 22 competitors over 11 rounds. Participants, ranging from freshmen to graduate students, worked calculus integrals rather than spelling words, as in the traditional spelling bee.

Second-place went to sophomore math major Chris Oehrlein, who also took second last year. Melissa Phillips, a junior secondary education major, won third prize.

Faculty members administered the event, which was part of Mathematics Awareness Week. Charles Deeter was the time and score keeper; graders were David Addis, Landon Colquitt, Peng Fan and Alexandra Kurepa. Roy Combrink was photographer, and Bob Doran served as organizer and master of ceremonies for the sixth annual bee. Bob brought the idea of the bee from MIT, where he was a visiting scholar in 1982.

## CHANGES MADE IN EMPLOYEE TUITION PROGRAM

Two important changes have occurred which will affect the Employee Tuition Assistance Program.

For those employees, dependents and spouses who have pre-registered for the summer sessions, there is a requirement that all fees must be paid 10 days prior to the beginning of class. This means that employees wishing assistance must have their tuition assistance application in the financial aid office at least 10 days prior to the beginning of classes and insure that the student fees are paid to the controller's office no later than 10 days prior to the start of class. Failure to complete these requirements may result in the cancellation of pre-registration.

Second, the tuition assistance policy requires that the student be admitted to the University through the regular admissions process. Students who are applying as transient students through the Office of Extended Education are not eligible to participate in the Tuition Assistance Program. For example, an employee dependent who is attending another university and makes application to TCU on a form labeled "Visiting Student" will not be granted tuition assistance. The "Visiting Student Application" is not a part of the regular admissions process required for tuition benefit.

## MAY 9 DATE FOR CONSORTIUM EVENT

Nineteen private colleges and universities throughout the South, including TCU and SMU, will offer discussions and information about their academic programs May 9 during a free session for high school students and their parents. Sponsored by the 19 -member Southern Consortium, the public event will be held in Dallas at the Doubletree Hotel, 5410 LBJ Freeway at Lincoln Centre, from 7:30 to 9:30 p.m.

Formal presentations as well as personal sessions with representatives of the independent colleges and universities will be included in the evening session. The diverse educational opportunities of member institutions, all of which practice selective admissions, will be discussed.

High school counselors in the Fort Worth/Dallas area also are invited to the May 9 program to meet with the consortium representatives.

Members of the Southern Consortium, which was founded in 1979, all subscribe to an ethical code assuring good practice and selectivity in college admissions. The institutions include Rice and Trinity universities along with TCU and SMU in Texas. Other members are Agnes Scott, Davidson, Hollins, Rhodes and Rollins colleges in addition to Emory, Furman, Sewanee, Stetson, Tulane, Miami, Richmond, Vanderbilt, Wake Forest and Washington and Lee universities.

## NFL TEAMS PICK BENSON, ANKROM

After four years as teammates, Mitchell Benson and Scott Ankrom will be competitors when they don the National Football League uniforms of the Indianapolis Colts and the Dallas Cowboys, respectively.

Graduate of Fort Worth's Eastern Hills high, Mitchell was chosen in the third round of the drafts last week. At the close of the 1988 season he was named to the first team of the Associated Press 1988 All-Southwest Conference team after a career record of 278 tackles with 162 of them unassisted, $211 / 2$ tackles for losses and 31 quarterback pressures. He is one of only a few defensive tackles ever to have two career pass interceptions.

Scott, selected by Dallas in the 12 th round, was honorable mention AllAmerican and All-Southwest Conference choice by the Poor Man's Guide to the NFL draft. The quarterback from San Antonio, who also played free safety, halfback and receiver during his Frog career, rushed for 639 yards and six touchdowns, threw for another 377 yards and a touchdown and caught six passes for 54 yards last season. He recently ran a 4.45 in the 40 -yard dash.

## WASHINGTON CENTER HONORS ALPERT

Gene Alpert, outgoing chairperson of political science and director of the M.L.A. program, will be honored by The Washington Center May 9 as winner of its Campus Liaison Award. He will receive the award from First Lady Barbara Bush during a dinner at the Corcoran Gallery of Art.

Gene has headed TCU's Washington internship program since its beginning in 1977, and, counting next fall's interns, some 175 TCU students have participated. He estimates another 100 have attended symposia sponsored by The Washington Center. Gene also served as academic director for the center's Republican and Democratic national convention classes in 1984 and 1988.

In inviting Gene to accept the award, William M. Burke, president of the center, said: "Your leadership and active involvement in program development have greatly enhanced the educational quality of our academic seminars. Your contributions to the success and growth of The Washington Center have been invaluable."

TCU won the center's Honor Roll Educational Award last year for being "most instrumental in providing experiential education opportunities for this country's students." Chancellor Bill Tucker accepted the award during a reception at the home of the Japanese ambassador.

## STUDENTS WIN TWO DISTRICT COMPETITION ANARDS

Two awards in the American Advertising Federation's 10th District National Student Advertising Competition belong to TCU students who were named to first place for best presentation and second runner-up in the overall competition during the district's annual convention April 19-22 in Fort Worth. Fourteen universities from Texas, Louisiana, Arkansas and Oklahoma were entered in the competition. First place overall was won by Texas Tech. The University of Texas at Austin was first runner-up.

This is the first time TCU has won an award in the annual competition, according to Jerry Grotta, who is adviser to the presentation team and teaches the campaigns class. The presentation team included Susan Goiser, Lance Lyda, Jane Napier, Barbara Neily and Robin Williams. Other members of the campaigns class which produced the award-winning campaign were Michelle Cheuvront, Marian Hart, Elizabeth Hudgins, Randy Johnson, Stephanie Millard, Mary Patterson, Kathleen Ryan, Susannah Sparks, Tabbatha Taylor, Shelley VanDall and Lisa Zimmerman.

The students designed a complete campaign for a new breakfast cereal for Kellogg's, including picking a name, developing a package, developing a comprehensive marketing plan and creating a national advertising and promotion program.

FUTURE TEACHERS ARE ON A ROLL
Even before commencement, Texas school districts are sending contracts to a number of the senior education students they interviewed on campus this spring.

In marathon interview sessions in March and April, representatives of 84 school districts came to talk to TCU students. Placement director Dale Young said the feedback from those interviews was superb. One interviewer, who came here after talking to prospective teachers at two major state universities, told Dale if his school district had enough openings, he would hire every TCU student he interviewed. Both Jo Ann Priest of the Plano Independent School District and Peggy Black of Spring ISD commented that TCU students perform better in their first year of teaching than any others they have hired.

Acceptance rate for TCU education majors usually runs in excess of 97 percent by Aug. 1, Dale said, and those who started teaching this year are averaging $\$ 21,500$ in beginning salary.

## 'EATS' COMBINES FOLKLORE, HISTORY

Poke sallet had to be "parebiled" or it was "pizen," at least that's what folks used to think and some still do to this day. From the just-published book, "Eats: A Folk History of Texas Foods," readers will learn that, far from being poison, poke leaves are a tonic and restore youthful vigor, making you feel "frisky as a snake that has shed its skin." Prepared correctly, they are sweet and delicious. And make no mistake--it's s-a-1-1-e-t, not s-a-1-a-d. Early settlers no doubt poured hot bacon grease over greens and called it sallet, a folk term still common today in East Texas.

Written by Ernestine Sewell Linck of Commerce and Joyce Gibson Roach of Keller and published by TCU Press, "Eats" is less cookbook than history, although it contains more than 150 recipes for everything from squirrel stew to ambrosia. Behind the book lies the firm conviction that the way we eat tells historians and sociologists more about us than our museums, libraries, governments and churches. To understand Texas and Texans, you must understand Texas food and foodways.
"Eats" is made lively by liberal sprinklings of old sayings, an occasional verse of song or poetry, riddles and jokes and quotes from travelers, pioneers, cooks and critics like Edward King of New York who reported in 1874 that Texans have "a hearty scorn for anything good to eat."

But "Eats" is much more than an amusing compilation of quaint customs and sayings. The first section of this definitive study challenges, "Tell me what you eat and I'll tell you where you live." Dividing the state into five "eats" areas, the authors trace the foods of those areas to the immigrants who settled there. The second major section of the book examines seasonal celebrations, such major holidays as Easter and Christmas and particularly Texas celebrations like the Black-Eyed Pea Festival in Athens and the Yamboree in Gilmer.

Both Linck and Roach are native Texans and folklorists. Linck is a former professor of English at the University of Texas at Arlington who has published widely on topics ranging from education, linguistics and modern literature to Southwestern life, literature and lore. Roach, TCU alumna and twice winner of the Spur Award fram Western Writers of America, is author of "The Cowgirls" and "Texanna," an outdoor drama which celebrated the Sesquicentennial.

The 272-page cloth-bound book, priced at $\$ 23.50$, is available in the University bookstore.

In singles play, Frogs Tony Bujan, Sandon Stolle and Gerard Ronoan defeated the University of Arkansas' Johan Dysholm, J.P. Mien and Cha Hoon Im, respectively. Clinton Banducci and Eric Lingg teamed to defeat Razorbacks Mike Brown and Augusto Solano, and Luis Ruette and Sandon Stolle completed the Frog victories by defeating Dysholm and Keith Burford of Arkansas. The NCAA tournament is the next competition for the TCU men.

The women's title was taken by Texas 5-4 over Texas A\&M. It was the Lady Longhorns' seventh title in eight years.

## SWC HONORS COACH, PLAYERS

The Southwest Conference has honored tennis coach Tut Bartzen and three of his outstanding players. Now in his l6th year as head coach, Tut was named SWC coach of the year for a second consecutive year. He was inducted into the Collegiate Tennis Hall of Fame in 1985 and into the Texas Tennis Hall of Fame two years earlier. Tut was NCAA coach of the year in 1982.

The 1989 tennis team made Frog history by winning the SWC regular-season championship and then repeated as the SWC tournament champion. They will compete in the NCAA playoffs this month in Athens, GA. The Frogs are ranked No. 9 in the Intercollegiate Tennis Coaches Association poll.

Named to the SWC singles team are Clinton Banducci and Luis Ruette. Clinton and his partner Eric Lingg are on the all-SWC team. This is the second year for Clinton to be named to both teams.
