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NOTED PHILOSOPHER HOLDS GREEN CHAIR

Dr. Hans Lenk of West Germany's Karlsruhe University, world renowned in the field of the philosophy of technology, will be in residence this fall as holder of the endowed Green Honors Chair. He will be hosted by the philosophy department.

Nine other persons distinguished in their academic and/or professional careers have accepted multi-day appointments as Visiting Green Professors for 1987-88.

To date fifteen persons have held the Cecil H. and Ida Green Honors Chair since it was endowed in 1969 by a gift from Dr. Cecil H. Green and his late wife, Dr. Ida Green, of Dallas. Some 100 writers, scientists, educators and other notable persons have been guests at TCU as Visiting Green Professors, a position also funded by the Dallas couple. Public events as well as class lectures and seminars are included in activities drawing on the varied talents and fields of expertise of the guests.

Dr. Lenk, past president of the International Philosophic Society for the Study of Sport and member of its board since 1972, chairs the Institute of Philosophy at Karlsruhe University. Formerly dean of the College of Humanities and Social Sciences there, he is the author of more than 30 books in various languages in addition to more than 300 scientific and philosophic articles.

An Olympic rowing champion in 1960 and twice European champion in rowing, Dr. Lenk is a member of the National Olympic Committee for Germany and honorary member of the International Olympic Academy. In 1966 he was amateur coach of the world champion eight-oar crew. In 1980 he was named president of the International Olympiad Union and of the European Forum Baden.

Dr. Lenk, active in the American Academy of Physical Education, was a distinguished visiting professor at the University of Massachusetts at Amherst in 1976 and held a similar position at the University of Illinois-Urbana in 1973. An honor graduate of Kiel University in his native Germany, he also has been a visiting professor at South American universities in Sao Paulo, Santa Maria, Belo Horizonte and Caracas as well as in Oslo, Norway. He is a frequent lecturer throughout Germany on physical education.

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In 1979 Dr. Lenk was presented the outstanding academic book award by the United States' Association of College and Research Libraries. The previous year he received UNESCO's Philip Noel Baker Research Prize.

While here Dr. Lenk will conduct a study of "Ethics of Science and Technology" in the philosophy department and will lead the Honors Program section on international philosophical inquiries.

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TCU IN THE NEWS

Vice Chancellor PEGGY BARR was one of the area institutions' administrators quoted in the July 30 Star-Telegram story entitled "AIDS scare puts brakes on free-wheeling attitudes on campus." Persons from UTA and SMU described those schools' comprehensive programs.

FUSILLO AWARDED UNIQUE FULBRIGHT

Lisa Fusillo of ballet and modern dance, who is leaving tomorrow (Wednesday) to teach at Taiwan's National Institute of the Arts in Taipei, has received the first Fulbright Scholarship ever awarded for the study of dance in the Orient.

Lisa will be in Taipei during the fall semester, teaching classical ballet and ballet variations as well as choreographing for both the institute and for Taiwan's only professional dance company, the Cloudgate Taipei Contemporary Dance Theatre. The company has toured the United States and has received glowing reviews from Dancemagazine.

Directors of the Taiwan institute first contacted Lisa in 1986 after she had been on a European dance tour. Since then she has been working out details of the Taiwan trip with the institute and with Fulbright officials in Washington, who view Lisa's grant-supported trip as the opening of an important new avenue for the Fulbright.

Lisa looks forward to her study of the background and training of the Taiwan dancers. While dance in mainland China shows a strong Russian influence, Taiwan has resisted that influence, she said, and has based its own dance in traditional Chinese opera, which she will be studying as part of her research project. They also have had Australian, British and some American teaching, she said.

Lisa's husband, Rob Smith, also a professional dancer who holds a master's degree from TCU in art, will be making the trip with her and hopes to study at the institute.

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MUSIC PREP CLASSES STILL OPEN

The Music Preparatory Division got underway last week with some 250 students of all ages, but faculty and staff members interested in private lessons for themselves and/or their children still have a chance to enroll, said Leanne Hedges, program director.

Non-credit private instruction is available in guitar, piano, voice, percussion, woodwinds and brass. The preparatory division's 15 teachers are faculty members and, in a few cases, graduate students completing their master's degrees in music here.
