NINE TO BE HONORED AT ALUMNI EVENT

Distinguished professional careers, notable civic leadership and service to TCU by nine persons will be recognized publicly Saturday at the 13th annual TCU alumni awards dinner. Recipients honored will be Betty Lynn Buckley of New York City; Mabel Clark Reed of Austin; Jeff Horn, Dr. and Mrs. Granville Walker and Mrs. James L. West, all of Fort Worth; Tommy R. Kimbrough of Plano; and William Ross Kennedy Jr. of Canton, MO. Also to be recognized is Lindy Berry of Fort Worth, who currently heads the TCU Alumni Association.

The black-tie event will be held at The Worthington Hotel, beginning with a 7:15 p.m. reception. Making presentations following the dinner will be Chancellor Bill Tucker. Master of ceremonies will be Stephen Christie, alumni association president-elect.

Miss Buckley, Class of 1968 member, will receive the distinguished alumnus award in recognition of a career that has achieved prominence and brought credit to both the recipient and the University. Currently appearing in the Roman Polanski movie "Frantic," she won a Tony Award for her role as Grizabella in "Cats" and was an Emmy nominee for the after-school special "Bobby and Sarah." On Broadway she recently starred in Andrew Lloyd Webbers' "Song and Dance" and in the Shakespeare Festival's "The Mystery of Edwin Drood." Miss Buckley appeared in such movies as "Tender Mercies" and "Carrie." On television she is best known for her portrayal of Abby on the "Eight Is Enough" series. She will appear in the musical version of "Carrie," due to open soon on Broadway.

The valuable alumna award for outstanding and continuing service to TCU and its alumni association will be presented to Mrs. Reed, a board of trustees member since 1977. She was graduated in 1926, becoming the first female to earn a degree in business administration at TCU. She was married to Warren Clark, nephew of TCU's founding brothers Addison and Randolph Clark, and, after his death, to Hiram Reed, son of TCU trustee Dave Reed, for whom a major campus building is named. A number of TCU scholarship programs bear Mrs. Reed's name.

Jeff, who retired in 1984 after 28 years on the School of Education faculty, will receive the honorary alumnus award in recognition of service, loyalty and support of the University. Holder of bachelor's degrees from Texas A&M University and Centenary College and the master's and Ph.D. from the University of Texas, the retired Army lieutenant colonel is past president of the Tarrant County Teachers Association, TCU chapter of Phi Delta Theta honor society, Fort Worth Area Reserve Officers Association and Austin Teachers Association. A TCU scholarship fund for graduate education bears his name.

The Royal Purple Award in recognition of extraordinary service and support of TCU will be presented to Dr. and Mrs. Walker. Members of the Class of 1935, each holds two earned degrees from TCU, and he was awarded the honorary Doctor of Divinity degree in 1947. Minister of University Christian Church for 30 years before retiring in 1973, Dr. Walker chaired TCU's religion department before going to Yale University for the Ph.D. degree. Past president of the international and Texas conventions of Christian Churches (Disciples of Christ), he has been a member of TCU's board of trustees since 1945 and serves on the board of Brite Divinity School.

Mrs. Walker was ordained in 1937 and is known nationally for her teaching and lecturing on the role of ministers' wives. Past president of the Texas Ministers' Wives Association and the TCU Woman's Club, she has been honored for her service by such churches as National City Christian in Washington, DC, Country Club Christian in Kansas City and Fort Worth's University Christian.

Known for her lifelong philanthropy and her involvement with the James L. and Eunice West Charitable Trust since her husband's death, Mrs. West will receive the alumni association's special award in recognition of her interest in the University. Last year she was honored as distinguished philanthropist for "her willingness to share and her delight in being able to help others" by the Greater Fort Worth Chapter of the National Society of Fund Raising Executives. A TCU scholarship fund was established earlier by Mr. and Mrs. West.

The Frog o' Fame honor for accomplishments in sports will be presented to Kimbrough, whose Plano High Wildcats were named the No. 1 high school football team in America in 1987. Graduated from TCU in 1968, the Valley Mills native was chosen Texas High School Coach of the Year in 1977 and again in 1987, when he also was named as the nation's high school coach of the year. Kimbrough-coached teams have won three of four state championship games, and the Plano team is the only one to win back-to-back state titles in the last 20 years. Associated with Plano athletics for 20 years, 12 as head football coach, he has a coaching record of 133-19-6, the best winning percentage in Texas.

Kennedy, currently working toward an M.B.A. degree, will receive the Distinguished Student Award, based on both academic accomplishments and service to the University. A tutor in the economics department, he is president of TCU's chapter of Mortar Board. He is active in Student Foundation and the national phonothon, admissions committee and good neighbor program of the TCU Annual Fund. Former president of Sigma Alpha Epsilon fraternity, Kennedy has been named to the Dean's Honor List for academic accomplishments and was chosen for listing in Outstanding Young Men in America last year.

Recipient of the president's service award, Berry is vice president and general manager of Steamatic Inc. Consensus all-Southwest Conference selection in 1948 and 1949, he was captain of the team as a senior and has been president of the TCU Letterman's Association.

Service awards for their roles as alumni association directors will be given to William C. Ferebee and Ann Davis Gray of Houston, Donald Pierson II and Alan Winter of Fort Worth.

Herndon Professor of Organ Emmet Smith and Kerry Hughes, trumpet instructor, will play a TCU Music Series recital at 8 p.m. Monday in Robert Carr Chapel.

The program will include Prelude to "Te Deum" for Trumpet and Organ by Marc-Antoine Charpentier, Bach's Prelude and Fugue in C Minor, Toccata for Trumpet and Organ by Giambattista Martini, Etude: Canon in B Major by Schumann, Giuseppe Torelli's Concerto in D Major for Trumpet and Organ, Chorale in A Minor by Cesar Franck, excerpts from Sept Chorals pour Trompette by Jean Langlais and John Stanley's Trumpet Voluntary in D Major.

Emmet performs internationally, most recently playing recitals at Notre Dame Cathedral in Paris and at the Kreuzberg International Organ Festival in Bonn, West Germany. Kerry has played with the Dallas Chamber Orchestra, the Joffrey Ballet, Fort Worth Opera, Dallas Wind Symphony, Denton Bach Society and the Richardson Symphony.

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DIVERS HOST CHAMPIONSHIP

The TCU Club Divers will host the 1988 Texas Age Group Indoor Diving Champion-ships Saturday and Sunday in the Rickel Building pool. Several Junior Olympic finalists will compete with others in age groups ranging from 9-and-under to 16-18 years. At the 1987 Junior Olympic National Championships, Texas placed third overall. The weekend's free events will begin at 9 each morning.

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CADETS WIN RANGER CHALLENGE

Nine Army ROTC cadets narrowly defeated Texas A&M for the second time this school year and took top honors at the March 19-20 regional Ranger Challenge competition. The cadets beat all opponents at a two-day marathon of rigorous events such as a 10 kilometer march in full rucksack and an all-night patrol.

Held at Fort Riley, KS, the competition pitted champion teams from nine states against one another in eight events. In addition to the march and patrol, events included the Army physical fitness test, grenade throw, weapons assembly, land navigation, target shooting and building and crossing a one-rope bridge. The events began Saturday morning, continued throughout the night and ended Sunday with the 10K march.

As the march began, TCU was neck-and-neck with Texas A&M, who had placed second behind TCU in a state competition in November. For TCU to win, it had to finish the march first and Texas A&M had to finish third. Bruce Stacy of military science reported that TCU's cadets crossed the finish line "like a unit"—in step, chanting and with rifles held high. When second-place Texas A&M was forced to halt and regroup because team members had dropped their rifles, another team passed, leaving A&M with a third-place finish in the march and a second-place finish overall. TCU won the competition by one point.

Team captain was Brian Foley, senior finance major from Lawton, OK. Other team members were Larry Lewis, a junior political science major from Fort Worth; Michael Petty, senior speech communication major from Cleburne; Geoffrey Ballou, sophomore business premajor, and Troy Neasbitt, junior political science major, of Arlington; Jon Hayhurst, senior economics major from Amarillo; Gary "Chip" Balk, sophomore premajor from Nevada, MO; Dirk Plante, junior physics major from Edgewood, MD; and Ward Ferguson, freshman premajor from Thousand Oaks, CA.

TCU FILMS INCLUDED IN EXHIBITION

A wide array of Texas films—two of them from TCU—will be included in the 1988 Texas Film and Video Makers Exhibition, scheduled April 15-17 as part of this year's Main St. Fort Worth Arts Festival. Free and open to the public, the showings will be held from 1 to 10 p.m. in the Caravan of Dreams Theatre.

The new exhibition is sponsored by Southwest Public Communications in cooperation with TCU's Gwendolyn P. Tandy Memorial Film Library and the Caravan of Dreams. The program is made possible in part by the Southwest Film/Video Tour, a program coordinated by the Southwest Alternate Media Project (SWAMP) with partial funding from the Texas Commission for the Arts.

Two of the films—"Lili" and "Wishes"—to be shown during the exhibition are from TCU's Tandy Memorial Film Library, a gift to the University from the Jesse Upchurch family and the Benjamin F. Johnson Foundation in memory of Mrs. Upchurch's mother. Curator of the library is John Freeman of radio—TV-film.

A 28-minute documentary about internationally famed pianist Lili Kraus, "Lili" was directed by Ken Harrison and Mitchell Johnson. The late Madame Kraus, former artist-in-residence at TCU, gained international fame in the 1930s, spent much of World War II incarcerated in a Japanese prison camp and rebuilt her career to even greater worldwide acclaim during the next three decades.

The 60-minute film entitled "Wishes" is the work of Fort Worth native David Allan Hall, who was graduated from TCU last December. It is the story of a college-age cartoonist who lives out his fantasies from the confinement of a wheelchair by making his cartoons come alive.

OPTICS EXPERT TO LECTURE MONDAY

Dr. Y.R. Shen, professor of physics at the University of California at Berkeley and an expert on nonlinear optics, will be on campus April 18 as Visiting Green Professor in the physics department. He will present a public lecture entitled "Nonlinear Optics and the Surface Science" at 4 p.m. in Lecture Hall 4 of the Sid Richardson Building.

Author or co-author of about 200 publications in fields ranging from nonlinear optics to laser chemistry to condensed matter physics, he is author of "The Principles of Nonlinear Optics" and editor of "Nonlinear Infrared Generation." He is a member of the American Physical Society and the Optical Society of America. Dr. Shen served as program chairman of the International Quantum Electronics Conference in 1980 and as general co-chairman of the conference in 1984. He received his Ph.D. in solid state physics from Harvard University.

The entire cast did an excellent job, wrote reviewer Joanna Haynes, but "the supporting cast stole the show." She called special attention to DWIGHT GREENE as the aging servant Panthina, to TIM WILKENDORF's amusing portrayal of Thurio, to "loads of talent" displayed by ALAN BAKER as Speed and by KELLY SMITH as Launce and to Alexis the cuddly sheepdog. All in all, Haynes concluded, the production, directed by GALYN COLLIER, "is a wonderful show."

"TCU students help university pick drug-abuse counselors" was the headline for the Star-Telegram's March 21 story on the new campus mentor project of the drug and alcohol abuse education program. The project, funded by a \$63,294 grant received last fall, was described in the story by Assistant Vice Chancellor DON MILLS.

The March 4 issue of the Los Angeles Times quoted MARK TOULOUSE (Brite) in an article on Pat Robertson by John Dart, the Times religion writer. Mark did research in the Christian Broadcasting Network archives last summer.

"It's never too late to learn, say two graduating at age 64" was the Star-Telegram EXTRA's headline for the March 30-31 story on <u>SID PADGETT</u>, director of facilities from 1971 until he retired last December, and his wife, Gloria. Two years ago they graduated at the same time, she with a bachelor's degree and he with a master's.

"TCU students win acclaim for world hunger efforts" was the headline in the April issue of The Disciple for the feature that detailed the successful effort on campus that has raised more than \$102,000 in the last six years. Quoted was JOHN BUTLER, minister to the University, who oversees Hunger Week.
