TCU HOSTING THREE CRAFT SHOWS

The works of top Texas designers and nationally known craftsmen are filling TCU's art gallery spaces starting this week. The University is hosting the Texas Designer/Craftsmen 1986 Juried Membership and Invitational Exhibit as well as shows by Dallas ceramicist Lee Akins and mixed media artist Kenneth Havis of Hubbard.

Opening yesterday (Monday) in Moudy Building Exhibition Hall, the Texas Designer/Craftsmen show will run through Oct. 19, culminating in a weekend conference on campus for the designer/craftsmen. Beth Thomas of art is conference chairperson.

Invited artists are Jens Morrison of San Diego, whose ceramic sculpture is influenced by his research into Mexican folk ceramics and clay dwellings; Colleen Barry-Wilson of Chico, CA, mixed-media artist who uses books as contemporary reliquaries for society's discards; and Ray Schultze, professor of sculpture and glass at Kearney State College in Nebraska.

Of 24 Texas artists whose works were selected for the show, 12 are from the Metroplex. Fort Worth artists chosen are Beth, David Edgar and Lynne Dees. Dr. Joel Eide, professor of humanities and director of the art gallery at Northern Arizona University, juried the show and will present his juror's address at 8:30 p.m. Oct. 17 in Moudy Building Room 132N. The artists will be honored at a reception from 7 to 9 that evening.

In Brown-Lupton Gallery the opening reception will be held from 4 to 6 p.m. today (Tuesday) for a showing of terra cotta vessel forms created by Dallas ceramicist Lee Akins. The exhibition continues through Oct. 17. Akins, who teaches at Eastfield College and has had half a dozen solo shows in the Metroplex, has selected vessel forms ranging from eight inches to three feet for the show.

Also on view in Moudy Building Exhibition Space #2 during the Texas Designer/Craftsmen show will be mixed media works by Kenneth Havis of Hubbard. All the shows are open from 11 a.m. to 4 p.m. weekdays and from 1 to 4 p.m. Saturdays and Sundays.

The award was conferred by Psychologists Interested in Religious Issues, Division 36 of the American Psychological Association and was presented at the association's annual meeting, where Richard presented a paper on the psychology of religion in decision-making.

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TWO NEW COUNTRIES REPRESENTED BY INTERNATIONALS

Sixty-two new international students bring the total number of internationals at TCU this fall to 194. New countries represented this year are Morocco and Scotland, said International Student Affairs Director Al Mladenka. Countries with the largest numbers of students are West Germany with 20, India with 17 and Taiwan with 12. Altogether 54 countries have students on campus.

The new students include undergraduate, graduate and Brite Divinity students. Of the total number, 120 are male and 74 are female.

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PARENTS WEEKEND DISPLAYS "NEW WORLD"

Explorative parents will discover a whole new world when they come for Parents Weekend beginning Friday. Through mini-lectures, residence hall open houses and a pep rally, parents will see university life through their whildren's eyes. The weekend's theme is "It's a Whole New World."

Following the run will be the Chancellor's Reception, at which administrators and faculty members will welcome parents. The reception will begin at 9:30 a.m. on the front lawn of Saddler Hall. With the collective goals becoming part of TCU's overall budget-supporting total of \$3.2 million, volunteers direct their efforts to alumni, business leaders, foundations, parents of current students and other friends of the University.

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NOTED NURSING EDUCATOR TO SPEAK OCT. 9

Dr. Holly Skodol Wilson of the University of California at San Francisco, an internationally recognized nursing educator, will present a public lecture Oct. 9. "Magic, Alchemy or Science: An Update on Psychiatric Nursing Diagnostic Practice" will be the topic for the event, which will begin at 7 p.m. in Lecture Hall 141 North of the Moudy Building.

The free program, part of the TCU Research Foundation Grant Lectureship Series, is being presented in cooperation with Harris College of Nursing and the Psychiatric Institute of Fort Worth. Because of limited space, reservations should be made with Judy Bray at (817) 921-7651.

Dr. Wilson, associated with the University of California since 1978, is a professor in the mental health department, community and administrative nursing, of its school of nursing. She also is a member of the affiliated faculty for its Institute for Health and Aging. Holder of the Ph.D. degree from the University of California at Berkeley, Dr. Wilson was honored earlier this year with the book of the year award from the American Journal of Nursing for her "Research in Nursing." In 1984 she received the award from AJN and Nursing 1984 for "Handbook of Psychosocial Nursing."

A member of the American Nursing Association's panel of specialists to identify and classify psychiatric nursing phenomena, Dr. Wilson has achieved international recognition as lecturer and consultant. She has been an official visitor to the psychiatry department at the University of Helsinki, Finland, and last year was a consultant to Madam Kan Lan Chun of the People's Republic of China, to Dr. Elousia Tamez, chief nursing administrator for the veterans' hospital in San Juan, Puerto Rico, and to Canada's Edmonton-Alberta Psychiatric Hospital. She has made visits to Australia's Cumberland College of Health Science and the Harm Siemens Psychiatric Nursing Facility in Amsterdam, Holland.

Last year she gave the keynote presentation at the first Southeast Asia Regional Nursing Conference and Exhibition held in Hong Kong. A presenter for National Nurses' Day at the Mathari Psychiatric Hospital in Nairobi, Kenya, in 1984, she has spoken at leading nursing and health-related meetings throughout the United States. In November she will be coordinator for the keynote and closing addresses at the National Conference on Psychiatric Nursing in Washington, DC.

Dr. Wilson, recipient of a Kellogg Foundation award for study of "International Approaches to Care for the Mentally Disordered Elderly," is author of some 30 research studies in professional journals in addition to book chapters and editor or co-author of 16 books.
