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'MESSIAH' TO BE PERFORMED DEC. 7-8

"Messiah," George Frederick Handel's beloved meditation on the life of Christ, will be performed Dec. 7-8 by the University Symphony and 100-voice Choral Union. The performance, conducted by Ron Shirey, director of choral activities, will be presented in Ed Landreth Auditorium at 7:30 p.m. both days and will be sponsored by the TCU Fine Arts Guild. Mrs. Joe Aguilar is guild president.

Tickets, \$3 with TCU ID, may be obtained from guild members or from the Department of Music in Ed Landreth Hall. Proceeds of ticket sales go toward seven Fine Arts Guild and T. Smith McCorkle scholarships awarded annually in the School of Fine Arts. The guild's scholarship endowment currently stands at approximately \$110,000.

Use of Handel's oratorio as a fund-raiser dates to some of its earliest performances in London beginning in the 1740s, when production of "Messiah" became an annual event for the benefit of the Foundling Hospital. Handel's final appearance was in a performance of "Messiah" during the Lenten season of 1759, only one week before his death.

Student soloists, chosen in competitive auditions before a faculty panel, will be tenor Randy Gremillion, graduate student from Ithaca, NY; baritone David Bennett, Kansas City, MO, senior; alto Amy Detrick, sophomore from Wichita Falls; bass Charles Lopez, sophomore from McAllen; soprano Deborah Poyner, Garland sophomore.

Other student soloists are soprano Clara Dina Hinojosa, senior from McAllen; soprano Melinda Wambsgans, San Antonio freshman; alto Nancy Kammerer, Fort Worth senior; baritone David Grogan, sophomore from Dallas; and tenor Rick Rainey, junior from Odessa.

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WEISS DIRECTS NEW ALCOHOL, DRUG PROGRAM

An Alcohol and Drug Education Program designed to provide education, intervention and referrals has been inaugurated on campus this fall. A part of the Division of Student Affairs, the new unit is headed by Lori Weiss, who joined the staff in October.

A graduate of Pennsylvania State University, Lori served as educator/counselor in that institution's Total Alcohol Awareness Program for three years.

Formerly a drug and alcohol education specialist intern with the Drug and Alcohol Education Section of the Pennsylvania Department of Education, she was a public health analyst intern with the National Institute on Drug Abuse for the U. S. Department of Health and Human Services in 1985.

"Ms. Weiss was chosen to direct this important new program because of her outstanding background and experience as well as her ability to relate well with the college-age population," said Peggy Barr, Vice Chancellor.

TCU's program has as its solid base the University's long-standing volunteer effort that included students as well as faculty and staff members, according to Dr. Barr. "Particularly noteworthy will be the focus on prevention and the use of Fort Worth agencies in our referrals to community resources," she added.

Working with both individuals and campus groups, Lori is concentrating on providing students with factual information regarding the use of alcohol and other drugs and in developing a media resource center for student use. With offices in the Rickel Building, Lori is available to speak to groups on such issues as drinking and driving, women and alcohol, alcohol and Greek life, the cocaine epidemic, myths about marijuana and how to help others with drug/alcohol problems. Her presentations to campus groups during her first five weeks on campus totaled more than 25. She also will work with departments in developing programs for student involvement as well as student activities that do not involve the use of alcohol.

Lori, who holds the B.S. degree in individual and family studies, was presented a certificate of achievement in 1985 by the U.S. Department of Health and Human Services in recognition of contributions in prevention research. She is active in the American Public Health Association and Alcohol and Drug Problems Association of North America.

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JAZZ ENSEMBLES PLAY BLUES TO ROCK

Zanzibar, Fort Worth's old jazz club on the East Side where Ornette Coleman got his start, has been gone for years, but it is recalled in an extended composition to be premiered Friday by the Jazz Ensemble.

Curt Wilson, director of TCU's jazz program, grew up in Polytechnic and as a young jazz fan was fascinated by Zanzibar. That's what he has named his new work, a suite-like composition that displays a variety of jazz styles. Curt, a saxophonist who used to tour with Fred Waring and the Pennsylvanians, will direct his new work at the 8 p.m. concert in Ed Landreth Auditorium.

Jazz Ensemble I, conducted by percussionist Harrell Bosarge, also will perform the Rob McConnell arrangement of "Just Friends;" "What Are You Doing the Rest of Your Life?," featuring graduate assistant Rich Dahl on trombone; "Computer," a rock number with Rene Ozuna on tenor sax and Alan Burton on alto sax; "Blues in the Abscessed Tooth;" and a new jazz arrangement of "My Favorite Things" from "The Sound of Music," with Adam Lara on soprano sax and John Morgan on pflugelhorn.

Dahl will conduct Jazz Ensemble II performing Hank Levy's "Decoupage," "Monterrey Peninsula" and the Count Basie arrangement of "Pressure Cooker."

Dana, a graduate assistant in dance who has performed throughout the U.S., Canada and Europe as a member of the Royal Winnipeg Ballet, choreographed the dance as a symbolic telling of the advent story. "I've tried to draw on the image of Christ as the Light of the World and illustrate that thematically and as movement while emphasizing the role of John as the harbinger of the Light."

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EIGHT NAMED TO COLLEGE BOWL

Eight TCU men have been selected for College Bowl competition. They are Chris Brown of Hurst, Hiram Jackson of Arlington, Alan Dahl of Fort Worth, Jerry Madden of Richardson, Cesar Prieto of Spain, Paul Wood of Corpus Christi, Simon Dabney of Oakland, AR, and Chris Sorenson of Sioux Falls, SD.

Five of the eight will be named as the TCU team and alternate for regional College Bowl competition at North Texas State University in February.

AIR FORCE ROTC NAMED TOP IN REGION

The aerospace studies department has been recognized as the best in its region for the 1985-86 school year. The detachment received three of four regional awards at the fall conference of detachment commanders in the Midwest region, said Capt. Richard Horton. The awards are best detachment, best engineering recruiting program and best field training performance.

The most significant of the awards, Horton said, is the field training award. Each summer cadets in their junior year attend a training camp and are evaluated on their mental acuity, physical fitness and leadership skills. The average score of all cadets from a detachment determines the detachment's rating. Thirteen cadets from TCU's detachment, which includes UTA and TCU students, attended camp last summer; their overall average was the highest in the region and in the country, Horton said. Six of the cadets returned with high honors.

The Midwest region covers 11 states and more than 30 detachments. Nationally there are more than 120 detachments.

Other awards have been given within the department lately. Freshman Amy Drake (nursing) and sophomore Tom Miller (business) have received the Mitchell O. Sadler Jr. Memorial Scholarship for the 1986 fall semester. The scholarships are made each year to the outstanding freshman and sophomore Air Force ROTC students. Sadler, member of TCU's Class of 1965, was killed in action in Cambodia in 1970.
