## HONORS COLLEGIUM TO DRAW 69

Sixty-nine prospective honors students from 13 states will be on campus Thursday through Saturday for Honors Collegium VI: Bicentennial Celebration of the American Constitution.

The 36 men and 33 women are from Arizona, Tennessee, Arkansas, New Mexico, California, Missouri, Louisiana, Oklahoma, Florida, Nebraska, Kansas and Georgia as well as Texas. They will be housed in dorms with Honors Program students.

The collegium, dubbed the "sleeping bag seminar" by Honors Program director Jim Kelly, officially opens at 7 p.m. Thursday in the Faculty Center, where a student mixer will take place from 8 to 10 p.m.

Friday morning will be devoted to campus tours and giving the visitors a chance to attend classes of their choice. After a luncheon in the Woodson Room, the collegium moves to Sid Richardson Board Room, where Don Jackson of political science will deliver the keynote address, "Three Constitutions for the Price of One: 1787-1987," followed by discussion groups and a panel discussion.

Other events include a candlelight dinner Friday night, followed by an Honors Fireside with deans and faculty in the Faculty Center and "An Almost All-Nighter" from 9 p.m. to 3 a.m. in the Student Center. The Saturday morning breakfast buffet and wrap-up begins at 9:30 a.m. in the Faculty Center.

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## MINISTERS WEEK OPENS MONDAY

Dr. William Sloane Coffin Jr., one of this nation's best-known peace and civil rights leaders, will be a Ministers Week speaker Feb. 9-12. Featured with Dr. Coffin, who is senior minister of The Riverside Church in New York, will be Dr. George Rupp, president of Rice University, and Dr. John Deschner of SMU's Perkins School of Theology.

Dr. Coffin will deliver the annual Wells Sermons at 8 p.m. Feb. 9, 10 and 11 in the sanctuary of University Christian Church on the theme "What Is Spirituality, Anyhow?" A Yale graduate, he attended Union Theological Seminary, where his uncle, Henry Sloane Coffin, had been president, joined the CIA when the Korean War started and from 1950 to 1953 trained anti-Soviet

Russians for operations in the Soviet Union. Dr. Coffin earned the B.D. at Yale and served chaplaincies at Phillips Academy, at Williams College and for 18 years at Yale. In 1961 he was named by Sargent Shriver as an initial advisor to the Peace Corps and organized and directed the Peace Corps Field Training Center in Puerto Rico.

A leader in civil rights and peace movements of the 1960s and 1970s, Dr. Coffin was one of seven Freedom Riders arrested and convicted in Montgomery, AL, while protesting local segregation laws in conflict with Supreme Court decisions. The Supreme Court overturned their convictions.

At Riverside Church, where he has served since 1977, he established a Riverside Disarmament Program to advocate reversing the arms race. In 1979 Dr. Coffin was one of three U.S. clergymen invited by the Iranian government to hold Christmas services for American hostages there.

Delivering the Scott Lectures at 11 a.m. Feb. 10-12 will be Dr. Rupp, who became Rice's fifth president in 1985 after serving as dean of Harvard Divinity School for six years. He holds the A.B. from Princeton, B.D. from Yale Divinity School and Ph.D. from Harvard. His topics will be "Beyond Authoritarianism" Feb. 10, "Beyond Civil Religion" Feb. 11 and on Feb. 12 "Beyond God the Father--Again."

Dr. Rupp began his academic career as a faculty fellow in religion at the University of Redlands, where he was vice chancellor in 1973-74. After teaching at Harvard Divinity School from 1974 to 1977, he served as dean for academic affairs and professor of humanistic studies at the University of Wisconsin-Green Bay before returning to Harvard as divinity school dean.

McFadin Lecturer at 9 a.m. Feb. 10-12 will be Dr. Deschner, native Texan who earned his B.A. degree at the University of Texas and the B.D. from Yale. His subjects will be "Baptism, Eucharist and Ministry" on Feb. 10, "The Unity of the Church and the Renewal of Human Community" Feb. 11 and "Towards the Common Expression of the Apostolic Faith Today" on Feb. 12.

Holder of a doctorate from the University of Basel, Dr. Deschner was executive secretary of the United Student Christian Council in the USA from 1946 to 1952. He has been moderator of the Commission on Faith and Order of the World Council of Churches since 1983.

An ordained minister in the United Methodist Church, he has taken part in the national Roman Catholic-United Methodist bilateral dialogue. Dr. Deschner joined the SMU faculty 30 years ago and is Lehman Professor of Christian Doctrine at Perkins as well as serving on the SMU graduate faculty in religious studies.

Those sessions will be in University Christian Church. Other special events of Ministers Week will include the Brite Divinity School luncheon at 12:15 p.m. Feb. 10, when David Gouwens of Brite will be the speaker, and the TCU luncheon at 12:15 p.m. Feb. 12, with Brite's Joey Jeter as speaker. Both will be in Student Center ballroom.

The departments of physical education and recreational sports began the spring employee fitness program yesterday with the start of Fitness Week, which will include two health-related lectures and a Fitness Fair. The departments are offering physical fitness courses in walking, body conditioning and low impact aerobics.

Lori Weiss, program advisor for the Alcohol and Drug Program, will speak at 12:15 p.m. today (Tuesday) in Room 203 of the Student Center. Her topic is "Responsible Use of Alcohol." Jerry Landwer of physical education will speak on "Exercise Facts, Fads and Fallacies" tomorrow at 12:15 p.m., also in Student Center 203.

Thursday's Fitness Fair will be held in the Rickel Building from 4 to 7 p.m. Fitness assessments--including blood pressure check, skin fold measurement and flexibility measurement--will be made in Room 249. Demonstrations of fitness activities will include swimnastics at 5:30 and 6:30 at the pool; aerobics at 4, 5 and 6 in the gymnasium; and relaxation at 5 in Room 231. Weightroom demonstrations will be at 4:30, 5:30 and 6:30 in Room 108, racquetball at 4 and 5 at the racquetball courts and tennis at 4 and 5 at the courts outside the Rickel Building. A volleyball demonstration will be at 4:30 in the gymnasium.

The latest NCAA national rankings include three TCU swimmers for the first time in the University's history.

Freshman Judy O'Leary of Tucson is third in the 200 backstroke with a time of 2:02.26. Paige Eaton, Carrollton sophomore, is 14th in the 200 breaststroke with 2:22.95. A time of 2:01.23 put senior Todd Zummallen of Dallas first in the 200 breaststroke.

Recent victories included TCU men 103 to 78 and women 112 to 71 over New Mexico State in Las Cruces and TCU men 64 to 37, women 72 to 29 over Austin College.

NOTES ON FOLKS

DALE PITTS (athletics) has been named to a two-year term as one of five members of the national executive board of directors of the National Association of Academic Advisors for Athletics. He was elected at the association's early January conference in San Diego.

Historian DON WORCESTER has written the history of the Texas Longhorn as the eighth volume in Texas A&M University Press' Essays on the American West. Title is "The Texas Longhorn: Relic of the Past, Asset for the Future."

Harris College's DENISE ZANECCHIA has a study of the needs of high risk teenage prenatal patients included in "Nursing research as a diagnostic approach in nursing education, administration and practice," recently published by the Atlanta Southern Council on Collegiate Education for Nursing.

Neue Medien will carry Anantha's portrait and bibliography in the 1987 Who's Who in New Media.

MARCUS BRYANT (Brite) recently made a keynote presentation at the Centers and Training Workshop of the American Association of Pastoral Counselors meeting at Long Beach, CA. Theme of the workshop was "The Mission of the Pastoral Counseling Center: Our Corporate Ministry." Brite's Pastoral Counseling Center, one of only three such centers in the nation when originally certified in 1974, was re-certified as an AAPC Service and Training Center this fall. LOUIS ADAMS is its director and a clinical supervisor; HOWARD STONE and Marcus are professors and also clinical supervisors.

A study of contemporary novelist and short story writer Ann Beattie by CHRISTINA MURPHY (English) was published in December by G.K. Hall and Co. of Boston as part of Hall's Twayne's United States Authors Series.

LEE DANIEL (modern languages) has been notified that his book, "Basic Conversational Spanish," will be published this spring by the Kendall/Hunt Publishing Company of Dubuque, IA.

CYNTHIA FOLIO and SHEILA ALLEN (music) performed at the Dallas Museum of Art Jan. 24 with the chamber music group Amistad. On Jan. 26 Cynthia played alto flute in a concert of contemporary music with the group Voices of Change at SMU.

WILLADEAN WILLIAMS (nursing) has been accepted for the Nurse in Washington Internship March 8-13. Focus will be on learning more about the agencies and congressmen who determine the health policies for this nation and how nurses might become more politically involved.

TCU IN THE NEWS

KRLD radio interviewed HERB BRUBAKER (financial aid) on the ballooning student loan situation for a program broadcast on Jan. 2.

A number of RESIDENT ADVISORS got on-the-spot training regarding fires at the fire department's downtown training center on Jan. 7. The training session was covered by both KXAS-TV and WFAA-TV.

"The color purple is 'all in the family'" was the title of the feature story of BILL and JEAN TUCKER that appears in the January-February issue of AURA Magazine. A half-page color photo shows the couple in the chancellor's dining room, which they and Jean's two brothers donated to the University in honor of their mother, Mrs. Nellie Jones of Albany.

Elsewhere in the AURA issue, Chancellor Tucker is among six persons featured in "Proud Texans," a story about non-native Texans who "contribute generously to the community" and who "share the spirit of Texas, even though each was born in another state." Others listed are Mayor Bob Bolen, Alyce Caron of KXAS-TV, Executive Director June Cox of the Gifted Students Institute, conductor John Giordano and public relations executive Jane Schlansker.

Admissions counselor KAYE THORNTON was quoted in the Dallas Morning News story Jan. 11 dealing with the number of second-career persons in Harris College of Nursing. The 15 such persons currently enrolled were described as differing "from other university students not only in terms of experience but also in the certainty about their future."

"TCU Planning To Put 'More Clout' Into Core Curriculum--Tucker" was the headline of Irv Farman's Once Over Lightly column that appeared in the Jan. 9 issue of the Fort Worth News-Tribune. The column, to be continued later, ended with the note: "It's nice to know that, academically at least, TCU is on the path to national ranking."

Biology research associate SUSAN DETERMANN was the subject of a story that appeared Jan. 8 in the Dallas Morning News. Susan assists biologist PHIL HARIMAN by propagating worms for his DNA research and has a side interest in propagating orchids and endangered plants.

Also in the Jan. 8 issue of the Dallas paper was a lengthy story detailing the research of Dean JOHN MANGIERI (education) and former faculty member JOHN ARNN on higher education in 15 of 26 states currently under investigation.

The new Texas legislature--especially the budget crunch it faces--was the focus of two radio interviews conducted recently with DON COERVER (history). Don talked to both KLIF and KRLD during the week of Jan. 12.

DON FRISCHMANN (modern languages) was the subject of a six-minute interview on Yucatecan Television's evening news program during his early January research trip to the Yucatan Peninsula. His arrival in Merida was announced in the daily Novedades de Yucatan. Both the interview and the story were to inform the public of his research and interest in the Yucatecan theatre.

MORE TCU IN THE NEWS

Marketing professors DAVE CRAVENS and CHUCK LAMB were quoted by the Star-Telegram in its Jan. 7 story related to the merger of Sanger Harris with Foley's stores. All the stores will be known as Foley's by fall, a change that Dave believes will include some loss in eliminating the Sanger Harris name and its store identity. The change will be easier, according to Chuck since many Texans already are familiar with Foley's. He also was interviewed by Channel 5 Jan. 16 and predicted we'll see more such mergers.

The climbing price of gasoline was the subject of an interview with economist CHARLES BECKER that aired on WFAA-TV on Jan. 14.

Among Jan. 19 activities for the birthday of the late Martin Luther King Jr. shown on area television, the march of TCU students to a service at United Methodist Church on Berry Street was included in the 10 p.m. newscast on KXAS-TV. KDFW-TV also was on campus to film the march.

The 10 p.m. newscast on KDFW-TV, Channel 4, Jan. 19 featured an interview with JOHN MERRILL (ranch management). John discussed the beef industry's new promotional campaign, as he did in an interview for Cable News Network the preceding week.

Career Center director RON RANDALL was interviewed Jan. 21 by the Dallas Morning News regarding stress interviews sometimes done by prospective employers. An old technique that seems to be being revived, such interviews are not conducted by persons coming to campus to interview students, Ron said.

The involvement of American private citizens and companies in foreign affairs was the topic Jan. 16 when RALPH CARTER (political science) was a guest on Channel 13 News Addition.

JIM RIDDLESBERGER (political science) was featured on Channel 5 Jan. 27 and WBAP Radio the next morning as he analyzed President Reagan's Jan. 27 State of the Union address.
