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## SCHOOL HEADS TO STUDY HERE JULY 6-10

Educators already are pedaling as fast as they can to keep up with changes. Predictions are that the changes are only going to accelerate in the 1990s. Forty Texas school executives will come back to school in early July to learn how to instigate and manage those changes--not just react to them.

The July 6-10 session, "School Executives for the 1990s: Developing Agents of Change," is TCU's second annual Academy for Educational Leadership. Last year's academy, with a faculty including Texas education commissioner Dr. William Kirby, explored the concept of change. This year's focus will be on helping administrators develop models and strategies to affect the changes.

Academy participants, selected from nominations by superintendents and other educational leaders in Texas, are from Fort Worth, Arlington, Amarillo, Waco, Grapevine-Colleyville, Watauga, Crowley, Azle, Dallas, Odessa, Houston, Galveston, Allen, Cleburne, Sulphur Springs, Palacios, Richardson, Burleson, Belton, Aledo, Jefferson, Weatherford, Coppell, Killeen, Little Elm, McAllen, Abilene, Garland, San Antonio, Midland, Port Lavaca and Boyd.

Topics will range from politics and education to challenges for leaders dealing with cultural differences, from economics and education to ways in which administrators can empower professionals to be a part of decision-making.

The 1987 faculty specialists will include Dr. Richard Schmuck of the University of Oregon; Dr. Maria Senour, San Diego State University; Dr. Fenwick English of Lehigh University; Dr. Richard Podemsky, University of Alabama; Dr. Leonard Valverde, University of Texas at Austin; Dr. John Brown, an Ohio superintendent; and Dr. John Hoyle of A&M. TCU participants include Vice Chancellor Peggy Barr and Ed McNertney of economics.

Fort Worth ISD superintendent Dr. Don Roberts, who took part in the 1986 academy as superintendent of Amarillo schools, will address this year's session on "A Superintendent's Perspective on Change."

The academy is under the direction of Cherie Lohr, who chairs TCU's curriculum and instruction department. Funding support has come from the Carl B. and Florence E. King Foundation of Dallas and InterFirst Bank/Fort Worth.

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#### HOUSING RESERVATIONS SHOW INCREASE

Total reservations for on-campus housing show a slight increase over a year ago. As of the June 1 report issued by Assistant Vice Chancellor Don Mills, 35 students account for the 1.1 percent rise.

Reservations for summer orientation sessions, which began last week, stood at 604 as of June 1. That figure is a 9.8 percent increase over 1986. Other highlights of the residence hall status report include the following:

- --Men's reservations have increased 2.4 percent (28 students), and women's reservations have increased 0.4 (7 students) from a year ago; --Freshman men's reservations are up 19.3 percent (74 students), freshman women's reservations up 1.8 percent (12 students) and overall freshman reservations up 9 percent (86 persons) from a year ago;
- --Continuing men's reservations are down 6.9 percent (51 students), continuing women's reservations down 0.7 percent (8 persons) and overall continuing student reservations down 3.1 percent from a year ago.

Don also noted that housing reservations on June 1 represented 102.5 percent maximum capacity, while last year's figure on that date was 101.1 percent. Cancellations are 5.7 percent of total applications received compared to 7.1 percent in 1986.

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#### GRADUATE JOINS WRIGHT'S STAFF

Jeffrey Richard, a 1984 graduate in political science and economics, has been named senior staff assistant to House Speaker Jim Wright. Jeffrey joined Wright's senior management team after graduating this month from Harvard's John F. Kennedy School of Government, where he earned a master's degree in public policy.

In addition to his school work, Jeffrey has worked as a legislative assistant, a Senate intern and a budget analyst for the City of Fort Worth. "Jeffrey's academic credentials, coupled with his experiences in the arena of public service, make him a valued addition to my staff," Wright said.

Jeffrey graduated from TCU with a 4.0 grade-point average. He was a member of Phi Beta Kappa, was listed in Who's Who Among Students in American Colleges and Universities and received the Martin Luther King Jr. Leadership Scholarship and Outstanding Student Leader award. He also participated in the Washington Center's internship program.

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#### TCU INSTITUTE DRAWS FROM 19 STATES

Twenty-five school administrators from 19 states have been selected to attend TCU's July 5-25 institute on A Study of Plato, Aristotle, and Machiavelli: Educating Citizens and Their Leaders. A \$106,000 grant from the National Endowment for the Humanities will provide travel expenses, room and board, books and supplies, a \$600 stipend and a \$200 grant to take part in professional conferences for each of them.

Institute participants will come here from Florida, Minnesota, Vermont, Missouri, New York, Illinois, North Carolina, Iowa, California, New Jersey, Utah, New Hampshire, Mississippi, South Dakota, Colorado, Ohio, Virginia, Pennsylvania and Maryland.

Bill Vanderhoof of education will conduct the institute, and faculty members will include Jon Moline, academic vice president, and Edward Langerak, philosophy chair, both of St. Olaf College in Northfield, MN; Grant Mindle of the NTSU political science department; Elizabeth Gooch, who chairs fine arts and humanities at All Saints Parish Day School here; and Cherie Lohr, curriculum and instruction chair.

A 1985-86 NEH grant to TCU funded a similar summer institute in 1985 for 40 elementary school teachers who were trained to serve as "master teachers" to help their colleagues integrate humanities into their curriculum.

Bill said TCU chose to follow that with this institute for principals, superintendents and curriculum specialists because research shows again and again that the quality of leadership is one of the most significant factors in determining the effectiveness of a school.

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#### WOMEN'S ASSEMBLY TO FOCUS ON STEWARDSHIP

"Where Much Is Given" will be the theme for consideration by several hundred women coming to campus Friday for the annual Assembly of Women of the Christian Church in the Southwest. From 300 to 500 participants are expected.

Topics for 24 focus groups on Friday and Saturday will range from effective leadership to issues of teens and from battered women and children to symbols of faith and worship.

Dean Marjorie Suchocki of Wesley School of Theology in Washington, DC, will be the keynote speaker. Formerly associate professor of theology and director of the Doctor of Ministry program at Pittsburgh Theological Seminary, she has a special concern for lay theological education. Her presentation will begin at 7 p.m. in University Christian Church's Fellowship Hall.

Speaking at the banquet will be Doris McCullough, associate regional minister from Northern California and Nevada who will share experiences from her recent travels in the Soviet Union. A two-time visitor to Russia as a participant in the "Church to Church" program, she heads the board of directors of the Pacific Southwest Conference on World Christian Mission and is past president of the Northern California Ecumenical Council.

Preacher for the assembly will be Debra Lynn Huffman, who earned the B.A. degree here in 1977 and the D.Min. degree in 1983 through Brite Divinity School. The Wichita Falls native, who served as youth minister of Highlands Christian Church in Dallas and as interim minister for First Christian Church in McCamey, will speak Sunday morning at 9 a.m. in Robert Carr Chapel. She and her husband, alumnus Lynn Ditto, are co-ministers of First Christian Church in Alpine.

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#### TCU HELPS RYAN PLACE CELEBRATE

The neighborhoods don't adjoin, but TCU will have a big role again this year in the Ryan Place Fourth of July celebration. Even the parade music will come from campus, courtesy of KTCU-FM.

As the 17th annual neighborhood parade begins its march down Elizabeth Boulevard at 4 p.m. July 4, participants will carry portable radios tuned to the TCU radio station. KTCU will broadcast appropriate band music for an hour to accompany the parade along its 1.5-mile suburban route.

The parade, organized by Marcella Daniel '66, will consist of neighborhood groups and families with their cars, bicycles, wagons, skateboards and lawnmowers decorated for the occasion. Parade theme is "Texas Women."

The Ryan Place musical, "Another Bicentennial Year," to begin at 7 p.m. in the schoolyard of Daggett elementary, Page and College, has a distinct TCU flavor. Written and directed by Neil Daniel of English, the play will star Ruth Whitlock (music) as Elizabeth Willing Ryan, founder of Ryan Place. Bill Pohl of modern languages will perform in the three-member orchestra. Still other TCU alumni, friends and students have roles.

Stephanie caught both acts in one weekend and learned that Connie, a Fort Worth native now living in New York, also has played the role of Gladys in "The Pajama Game" off-Broadway, Judy and Christine in "A Chorus Line," Ado Annie in "Oklahoma," Tiger Lily in "Peter Pan" and Gladys in "Pal Joey" in various productions on the East Coast.

According to SWC officials, the change is an effort to attract more spectator attention to the championships. The league, according to a Dallas Morning News report, has changed the format to provide for a regular-season champion and a tournament champion as well. TCI

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## RUNNERS HAVE 'WORLD-BEST' NCAA FINISH

The Flyin' Frogs' 20th straight victory earlier this month in the NCAA Track and Field Championships in Baton Rouge added their second consecutive 400-meter relay crown in what was a stadium record that also set the 1987 world-best time of 38.82 seconds. TCU became the first school since the University of California in 1979-80 to repeat such a victory in one of the meet's leading attractions.

The time, according to records, was the third best in school history, behind the collegiate and NCAA meet record of 38.46 the Bubba Thornton-coached runners had in taking the 1986 title.

Not to be overlooked is the Frogs' third-place finish in overall competition. This is the best TCU finish in an NCAA indoor or outdoor championship.

Sprinter Raymond Stewart, the junior from Jamaica, won the 100-meter championship in 10.14 seconds and took fifth place in the 200-meter dash. The first TCU athlete to win individual NCAA honors, he finished a half point behind A&M's Floyd Heard for meet high-point honors. In addition to his 10 points for winning the 100, he had 2 1/2 points for winning the 400-meter relay and four for finishing fifth in the 200.

Fort Worth sophomore Greg Sholars finished sixth in the 100-meter event, and Jasper sophomore Tony Allen finished ninth in the 100.

Rebecca Allison of Lumsden, New Zealand, set a personal record in the NCAA competition by clocking 4:14.85 to place fourth in the 1,500-meter run, a repeat of her 1986 finish.

The Purple runners' earlier records include the 4 x 100 relay crowns from the Penn Relays in 1986 and '87, Texas Relays in 1986 and '87, SWC championships in 1986 and '87, NCAA championships in 1986, Florida Relays in 1987 and Mutual Life Games earlier this year. Bubba is assisted in coaching by assistant/women's head coach John McKenzie. All the award-winning runners will be back in school next year.

The winning ways of the track team will be featured on a segment of a video magazine series to be marketed by Sports Illustrated. The footage was shot during the NCAA meet, and the cassette is due for release in the fall.

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#### SYBESMA COACHING SWIMMING IN ITALY

Swimming coach Richard Sybesma currently is coaching swimming and conducting a clinic for Italian coaches in Fort Worth's sister city of Reggio Emilia, Italy. He also is coaching a group of 35 Texas Aquatic swimmers who are returning a visit from the Italian swimmers to Fort Worth last summer.

Composed of 180 swimmers from beginning competitive to national level abilities, Texas Aquatics is a United States swimming team with programs in Fort Worth, Arlington, Duncanville and Irving. It will visit Venice in addition to participating in competitive meets while in Italy.

Chancellor <u>BILL TUCKER</u> will serve a two-year term as the Southwest Conference's representative on the NCAA Presidents Commission, a 44-member body of college chief executive officers that has led the NCAA through a series of reforms in the last two years. During its June 29-30 special convention in Dallas, the group will initiate an 18-month national debate on the role of intercollegiate athletics in higher education.

Tennis coach <u>ROLAND INGRAM</u> of the Lady Frogs will coach the East team for the U.S. Olympic Festival July 18-21.
