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CONTEMPORARY MUSIC FESTIVAL OPENS MONDAY

Fisher Tull, Texas composer whose works range from neo-classical to romantic to experimental, will be the focus of a Contemporary Music Festival Feb. 10-11.

Dr. Tull, a member of the Sam Houston State University faculty and a 1984 Piper Professor, holds three degrees from North Texas State University, where he was the first staff arranger for the NTSU Lab Bands. His first serious compositions were for brass ensembles, then symphonic bands.

The faculty chamber music concert at 8 p.m. Feb. 10 in Ed Landreth Auditorium will include Tull's Fusion for Flute, Trombone and piano, Sonata for Viola and Piano, Colloquy for Saxophone and Percussion, Fantasia for Flute and Harpsichord and Nonet for Winds/Percussion and Piano.

At the Feb. 11 concert, also at 8 p.m. in Ed Landreth, Tull will be commentator for presentation of Cappriccio by the TCU Orchestra, led by Candler Schaffer; Floral Fancy and Indian Prayer, TCU Concert Chorale, conducted by Ron Shirey; and Sketches on a Tudor Psalm and Rhapsody for Trumpet and Symphonic Band, both performed by the TCU Wind Ensemble, led by Bob Blanton. Guest soloist for the Rhapsody will be Steve Weger, principal trumpet, Fort Worth Symphony.

Students will begin their annual contribution to TCU fund-raising Sunday with the start of the 10th TCU National Phonothon. Student chairperson Jack Larson, a senior from Bossier City, LA, has hopes of raising \$200,000, a substantial increase over last year's total of \$174,000.

SERVICES HELD FOR PROFESSOR EMERITUS STANDIFER

Professor emeritus James W. Standifer Sr. died Jan. 24 at his home following a lengthy illness. Funeral services were conducted Jan. 27 at University Christian Church, and burial was at Greenwood Memorial Park.

Before retiring in 1979, Jim was a member of the physical education department faculty for 21 years, teaching health and supervising student teachers in the department. He was well known as organizer of the Texas Driver and Traffic Safety Association and was its president for the first two terms. In 1968 he received its annual Honor Award. He also conducted driver safety seminars here.

The Beaumont native, an alumnus of Lamar Junior College, earned the bachelor's degree from Texas A&M in 1944. Holder of a master's degree from the University of Texas, he completed the Ph.D. at the University of Michigan in 1957. His teaching career included a year at the University of Dayton and Wharton County Junior College when that institution opened in 1946. While he was employed by Phillips Petroleum Company in 1947-52, he organized athletic teams from communities throughout the Texas Panhandle and founded the North Plains Athletic Association.

Jim, member of the board of the American Driver and Traffic Safety Education Association, was a charter member of the educational honor society of Phi Delta Kappa and served on the executive board of the TCU Retirees Association.

Survivors include his wife, Lillian Lela Hill Standifer; a daughter, Jo Lynn Moore of Miami Beach; and a sister, Zena May Johnson of Beaumont.
