HYMN WORKSHOP TO BE SATURDAY

A workshop on congregational hymn singing will be conducted Saturday at Ed Landreth for ministers, musicians and worship leaders. Hosted by Peter Hodgson, the daylong workshop is sponsored by the TCU Department of Music and the Hymn Society of America Inc., headquartered in Ed Landreth.

Workshop leaders will be Austin C. Lovelace, nationally recognized composer and chuch music authority who currently serves as national president of the hymn society, and W. Thomas Smith, executive director of the society and a clinician on hymnody. After 9 a.m. registration, the workshop will include a two-hour morning session on "How to Improve Congregational Hymn Singing," conducted by Lovelace. Afternoon workshops will be "Variety in the Use of Congregational Hymns" by Lovelace and "Hymns in Christian Education" by Smith, both presented at 1 and 2 p.m.

Final event will be a hymn festival conducted by Lovelace and Smith from 3 to 4 p.m. Registration cost \$2 for full-time students and hymn society members, \$5 for all others. 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JAZZ BAND TO PREMIERE 'SOUTHERN EXPOSURE'

Premiere of a major work by Hank Levy, former arranger for Stan Kenton, will high-light the TCU Jazz Ensembles winter concert at 8 p.m. Friday in Ed Landreth Auditorium. The Levy number, "Southern Exposure," is basically a saxophone concerto, says Curt Wilson. Rene Ozuna, TCU junior from Fort Worth, will be soloist.

The concert also will include two other Levy arrangements, "When Sunny Gets Blue" and "Oleo." Levy, who was guest artist for TCU's first jazz festival in 1978, also is the first composer to be commissioned to write a work for the TCU Jazz Ensembles.

Also on the program will be "Royal Blues," written for Stan Kenton's first tour of England in 1956, and a tribute to Duke Ellington that includes such Ellington favorites as "Mood Indigo" and "It Don't Mean a Thing if It Ain't Got That Swing." The first Dixieland band to be formed by TCU jazz band players will be led by David Levy, a professional musician who is a TCU graduate student in business. A pair of jazz combos will be directed by trumpeter William Pena, Fort Worth junior, and saxophonist Adam Lara, Fort Worth sophomore.
