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MONCRIEF GIFTS ENDOW TWO CHAIRS, ATHLETIC FUND

Academic chairs in Texas Christian University's departments of physics and geology as well as a fund for athletics have been endowed by three gifts from Mr. and Mrs. W. A. Moncrief Jr. Totaling \$2 million, the gifts were announced by Chancellor Bill Tucker.

"The magnificent gifts of Tex and Deborah Moncrief are heartening indeed to all of us at the University," the chancellor said. "The two endowed chairs will add significant strength to teaching and research here, and the endowment for athletics also gives a major boost to our drive toward excellence."

Endowed by a \$750,000 gift, the new position in the physics department will be named the W. A. "Tex" Moncrief Jr. Chair in Physics in honor of its donor. An independent oil producer, Moncrief is a graduate of the University of Texas School of Engineering.

Both Mr. and Mrs. Moncrief are donors of \$750,000 to establish the prestigious position in geology. It will be named the Charles B. Moncrief Chair in Geology, honoring their son, who is an alumnus of TCU and serves on its board of trustees.

The W. A. "Tex" Moncrief Jr. Athletic SF Endowment has been established with a \$500,000 gift from Moncrief, who has designated that it be used exclusively for football and golf.

Mr. and Mrs. Moncrief are members of TCU's Addison and Randolph Clark Society. Their long-time support of the University has included such areas as athletics, the Ranch Management Program and Harris College of Nursing.

Mrs. Moncrief is a member of the board of Harris College of Nursing. Her special interests also include the University's Mary Couts Burnett Library. In 1981 she was a member of the committee to select its one millionth volume. Later that year she presented the library with a first edition of Johannes Kepler's "An Incunabulum of the Exploration of Space," published in 1610 and authored by the German astronomer who was the first to speculate on future travels in space.

Moncrief is the son of Mr. and Mrs. W. A. Moncrief Sr. of Fort Worth. The senior Moncriefs were recipients last year of the Royal Purple Award given by the TCU Alumni Association.

FEMALE BRIGADIER GENERAL TO VISIT TCU

As part of her first goodwill tour as regional commander, Brig. Gen. Myrna Williamson will be a campus guest Thursday and Friday. One of only three female brigadier generals in the U.S. Army, General Williamson is in charge of an eight-state, 68-school region of ROTC detachments. She was promoted to the position on Aug. 1 of last year.

General Williamson will tour the detachments at Bishop College, the University of Texas at Arlington and TCU during her visit, said TCU's Capt. Carolyn Knowles. Since the tour is primarily to promote good will and to acquaint her with her new command, General Williamson will concentrate her activities on meeting and speaking to students, faculty and staff at the different universities.

The only presentation open to the general public during her visit will be Friday at 2:30 p.m. in Room 141N of the Moudy Communication Building. Her address will be open to the public at no charge. All faculty and staff members are invited to meet General Williamson following her lecture at a reception in the Faculty Center. The event is scheduled from 3:30 to 4:30 p.m.

General Williamson, a native of Gregory, SD, has been in the Army since 1960. She is a graduate of the Army Command and General Staff College and the National War College. She also holds a Master of Arts degree from the University of Oklahoma. She has served in high-ranking administrative posts in Korea and Washington, D.C., and, until her promotion to brigadier general, was commander of the Troop Brigade, Soldier Support Center, at Fort Harrison, IN. She has been awarded the Legion of Merit, the Meritorious Service Medal and the Army Commendation Medal with two Oak Leaf Clusters.

Her campus visit will begin with a tour of the detachment at 2 p.m. Thursday. After the tour, General Williamson will visit with Vice Chancellor Bill Koehler, and she will speak to ROTC cadets during their regular Thursday lab class. On Friday she will attend a luncheon with student leaders from all areas of the university.

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SMITH TO PLAY ORGAN RECITAL MONDAY

Emmet Smith, TCU's Herndon Professor of Music who received the Chancellor's Award for Distinguished Teaching last fall, will present a TCU Music Department Concert Series recital at 8 p.m. Monday in Robert Carr Chapel. The program will be broadcast live over KTCU-FM, 88.7.

Opening with Guilmant's Paraphrase on a Theme by Handel, Emmet also will play 'Chorale in E Major by Franck, two choral preludes by Brahms, Prelude and Fugue in B Major by Saint-Saens, Symphonic Chorale on "Jesus, Bridegroom of Souls" by Carg-Elert and Mendelssohn's Sonata No. 1 in F Minor.

FACULTY MEMBERS GIVE BOOKS

Three present and former faculty members have made major contributions to Mary Couts Burnett Library.

Landon Colquitt, a member of the mathematics faculty since 1951, has given a fine copy of Leonhard Euler's "Theoria Motuum Planetarum et cometarum," which is considered a fundamental work on the orbits of planets and comets. Euler, an 18th Century Swiss-born mathematician and physicist, worked in the academies of science at both St. Petersburg and Berlin.

Karl Snyder, emeritus professor of English, and his wife have presented the library 37 volumes of British drama in memory of two former TCU English teachers, Mary Beth Williams and Lorraine Sherley. The gift includes an 18-volume set of "The British Theatre or a collection of plays which are acted at the theatres royal, Drury Lane, Covent Garden, and Haymarket," edited by Mrs. Inchbald and printed in 1818. Also included are works by Thomas Southern and George Etherege.

From June Clements, assistant professor of English, have come a run of periodicals of Chinese literature and an ongoing subscription, along with approximately 100 volumes of Japanese and Chinese poetry, fiction and drama in English translations.

The TCU awards range from \$2,000 to \$3,000 per year and are renewable subject to certain criteria for a possible total scholarship of \$12,000 during four years.

The Nordan Scholarships were established 20 years ago by Mrs. L.A. Nordan of San Antonio and the late Dr. Nordan. Applicants in the field of art must submit 35mm slides of original work, and music, theatre and ballet/modern dance applicants will be required to audition on campus Feb. 16.

PRINT INVITATIONAL OPENS TODAY

Kevin Marshall of Fort Worth, who earned the Master of Fine Arts degree at TCU in 1983, is one of 20 artists whose works are included in the 8th University of Dallas National Print Invitational which opens with a reception from 4:30 to 6 p.m. today (Tuesday) in the Brown-Lupton Gallery. The showing continues from 11 a.m. to 4 p.m. weekdays, 1-4 p.m. Saturdays and Sundays, through Feb. 8. Marshall, of 3551 W. Fuller, is represented by three works in intaglio relief.

The only other Texas in the show is Karin Broker of Rice University's Department of Art and Art History, exhibiting three etchings.

The Print Invitational is sponsored in alternate years by the University of Dallas and is curated by its graduate students in art. Prints in the current exhibition were selected from more than 1,200 slides submitted from throughout the United States.

The artists' range of approach to printmaking is wide, and the show features lithographs, handcolored etchings, mezzotints, woodcuts, engravings, silk-screen and monoprints as well as intaglio and etchings.
