# DEAD WEEK JANUARY 16-21

The Administrative Committee and the Deans' Council have jointly asked me to call to the attention of instructors and students the policy of Texas Christian University concerning the work preceding examinations, known as Dead Week, or Week of Restricted Activities, which this semester will be January 16-21. Student and faculty organizations are to schedule no group meetings or activities, the notable exception being a previously scheduled basketball game on January 18.

Instructors are to give no examinations, and are especially asked not to give an examination during that period as a substitute for all or part of an examination which is scheduled for the regular examination period. No new assignments of themes or term papers are to be made during that week, but themes or term papers assigned earlier in the semester may be accepted that week, and quizzes on no more than a daily assignment are considered fair. Teachers who find it absolutely necessary to violate the above understanding are requested to confer with the heads of their departments for approval before doing so. It is to be hoped that such emergencies may be entirely eliminated as early as possible.

You are invited and urged to participate in the Faculty Conference on Religion and Higher Education to be held this weekend, December 10 and 11, on the T.C.U. campus under the auspices of the Regional Christian Associations. Delegates representing many southwestern schools will be here.

The conference opens with registration in the University Christian Church parlors between 5 and 6 p.m. on Saturday, December 10th, followed by a dinner in the University Christian Church dining room at 6 p.m. (The price of the dinner will be \$1.25) After the dinner the conference will go to the Little Theater for the main address of the evening, starting at 8 p.m.

The principle speaker for the conference will be Professor Kirtley Mather, head of the Department of Geology and Geography, and Director of the Peabody Museum, Harvard University. His subject Saturday evening will be "Science and Education in the Modern World;" and on Sunday morning, also in the Little Theater, he will speak on "Religion in Higher Education." Both these meetings will be open to all who wish to attend.

There need be no conflict for those desiring to hear Professor Mather on Saturday evening and the program being presented in the main auditorium at the same time, since the latter program is being offered on both Friday and Saturday evenings. This being the case, may I suggest that those desiring to see the play be sure to attend the Friday performance.
