

A FEW ADMINISTRATIVE REMINDERS:

1. Please read once more the opening paragraphs of the registration instruction sheet which was mailed to you some weeks ago and follow through with the examinations in the regular order. Any deviation from this or the printed schedule which came out in The Skiff last week must be cleared through the Registrar's Office before any announcement is made to the student.

2. No early examinations are to be given. Those who are completing degree requirements are to take their examinations at the same time as the other students and on the regular schedule.

3. Remember the grades are to be turned in to the department heads within forty-eight hours after each examination. The last grades are due in the hands of the department heads not later than 8 o'clock January 30. A list of all classes in each department is being furnished the department heads by the IBM office so that you can check this off as they come in. They must be reported in duplicate, then the department heads are responsible for getting all of these grades to the deans not later than 9 o'clock January 30 and the deans, after checking, will keep one copy and turn the other copy to the IBM Office. We feel confident of the sincere co-operation of everyone and appreciate your help in this important matter.

4. Any student who completes degree requirement on January 28 and seeks employment or desires to transfer to another institution will receive courteous service through the Registrar's Office and as promptly as possible.

5. Looking forward to registration on January 30, 31 and February 1, the office force has been completely organized to take care of the registration. The registration instruction sheet, which has been placed in your hand, will give you the routine to follow. The deans, department heads, and necessary staff members will take their places in the library Monday morning, January 30 promptly at 8:30 that the registration may move forward without delay. This is something all of us do together.
