# Dr. E.K. Hidgon V

Dr. Hidgon is executive secretary of the Philippine Mission for the United Christian Missionary Society, and candidate secretary for the division of foreign missions. He was a missionary to the Philippines from 1917 to 1937. In July of 1945 he returned to the Philippines to represent the Philippine Committee of the Foreign Mission Conference, in a survey of work of Protestant missions and their need in the post war period. All major Protestant mission boards, YMCA and the YWCA cooperate in the Philippine Committee.

He is a graduate of Eureka College, Eureka, Illinois, Yale University, and Chicago Divinity school. Drake University honored him with the D.D. degree in 1943. He is the author of "Jesus and Nationa Asperation", "How To Find God", "Faith Triumphant in the Philippines' and co-author with Mrs. Hidgon of "From Carabao to Clipper". He was for several years the Philippine correspondent of the <u>Christian Century</u>, wrote a weekly column for <u>Front Rank</u>, and has had numerous articles on the Philippines published in various magazines and periodicals.

# Carl Robert Bowers

Carl R. Bowers is a medical missionary candidate to the Belgian Congo. He is now in the University of Oklahoma Medical School and has attended Yale University two summers studying French.

In his undergraduate days Bob was a student leader not only in Phillips University but in Christian circles throughout the state. He is an effective speaker.
