To All Faculty Members
T.C.U.

Dear faculty members:

The week of May 1-6, 1950 will be a most important and significant one on our campus. That is, it can be if we all co-operate, for this is the week that has been set aside for the World Student Service Fund Campaign at T.C.U.

First, may I give you a brief explanation of W.S.S.F. and its purposes. This organization is world-wide in membership. Each year one of its main projects is to carry on a great drive soliciting money to be used in aiding needy students all over the world. This year T.C.U. has decided to send half of the money which it collects to the University of Djakarta in Batavia, Indonesia for the purpose of buying books and supporting the students of that University in other ways. The other half of the money collected here will go into the general fund to be used throughout the world for university students. Out of the general fund approximately 25% of the money this year will be used in China, 25% in Europe, 25% in the rest of Asia for rehabilitation of the students in devastated areas, and the remaining 25% for various smaller projects such as Emergency Relief Needs, Displaced Persons Program, etc.

Next week a group of students will speak to each class on the campus concerning this vital issue. This will require approximately five minutes at the beginning of each period. Any assistance which you can give them will be greatly appreciated. As a preparation for the coming talks, and the collection of money, which will be taken up at that time, we feel that a much greater success will come of the drive if some time this week you would make mention of the coming plans and urge that they have their financial contribution with them at that time.

In order that the faculty, too, may have a part in this great plan, we urge that you also contribute to this cause as liberally as possible.

We feel that you will be behind us in our endeavors and wish to thank you in advance for your co-operation in this plan that is designed to aid in making a more peaceful Christian world in which to live.
