Columbia Artists Management is proud to present, in her first North American tour, beautiful and radiant Brazilian pianist Cristina Ortiz. A child prodigy who commenced piano study at age 4, she won the third Van Cliburn International Competition 15 years later, after gathering a fistful of prizes and a wide-ranging repertoire in the intervening years. The gifted pianist entered the Brazilian Conservatory of Music at 8, and the following year was soloist with the Brazilian Symphony. At 15, she achieved first place in the 6th National Piano Contest at Rio de Janeiro, which carried with it a fellowship for study in Paris with the great Magda Tagliaferro, which was interrupted at times for concerts in France and Germany. 1966 and 1967 brought her two additional first awards, the International Piano Contest in Paris and the fourth International Georges Enesco Contest in Bucharest. In 1968, she was presented in two major recitals in Paris; one for the French Radio and TV and the other in Gaveau Hall, both highly acclaimed. The following year (1969), the United States beckoned, and she won the Van Cliburn Competition, and Organization of American States Award as the outstanding contestant of the Americas. Soon thereafter the dazzling pianist played a recital in New York's Carnegie Hall, and another in Washington, D.C., and was heard with the orchestra at Robin Hood Dell in Philadelphia. Everywhere critics and audiences agree that she is exceptional.
