SUPPLEMENTARY NOTICE ABOUT METERED MAIL

1. MAIL MUST BE IN THE MAILING ROOM by 4:00 PM, Mondays through Fridays, and by 11:30 AM on Saturdays if it is to be metered in time to make the delivery truck. The mail has to be metered, bundled, and a report prepared for the Post Office before it can be delivered to the delivery truck. The delivery truck leaves our Post Office at 9:00 AM and 4:35 PM Mondays through Fridays and at 9:00 AM and 12:20 PM on Saturdays. If mail is to make the morning delivery truck, it must be IN THE MAILING ROOM by 8:30 AM.
2. AIR MAIL, SPECIAL DELIVERY MAIL, REGISTERED MAIL, etc., must be separated from other mail and marked distinctly. Please do not indicate this where the metered stamp must go.
3. Please do not place any kind of mark, typewritten or otherwise, where the metered stamp is to go. WE WILL NOT ACCEPT ANY MAIL ANY MORE that has such marks. The government requires that there be no marks defacing the metered stamp.
4. If parcels are to be insured, sender must so indicate and also indicate THE AMOUNT FOR WHICH IT IS TO BE INSURED. Departments will not have to pay insurance fees separately. Insurance fee is included in amount of postage run off on meter machine. Insurance receipt will be sent to department of origin.

This is also true for REGISTERED MAIL.

5. It is not necessary to send mail to the mailing room unsealed. Departments may do as they prefer on this matter. The meter machine will seal the envelopes if you wish or run them only for postage. The machine can also SEAL ONLY. That is, envelopes can be run through the machine and sealed without stamping or making any other mark. You may use this service for any large mailings.
