## TO ALL INSTRUCTIONAL STAFF MEMBERS:

Last week I received the following communication from DeanRichardson's office, and I wish to pass it on to you fellow staff members in order that we might all carry out most adequately our administrative responsibilities with regard to the two suggestions made:

"It has come to my attention, from several reliable sources that systematic plans are under way to cheat on final examinations, at the end of this term.

"It seems to me that it would be in order to write a letter to all faculty members, or department chairmen, or to all Deans, to be communicated to chairmen and faculty, suggesting at least two precautions:

- 1. Change examinations.
- 2. Take all mimeograph work home with them or at least get it out of the offices.

"I believe that such a letter should appropriately come from your office."

I believe it would be well for staff members to cooperate directly with the office of the respective deans to clear up any special problems which they might have. Your full cooperation will be sincerelyappreciated.

The student must secure a permit from the Registrar before the teacher can receive work to make up the "I" grade. (Read all of page 51 referred to above for further detail.)
